Increase The Lottery Prizes?

Realising the losses that are likely to be sustained through the Federal Government's action in passing the National Insurance Bill, Mr. Quirk asked the Fremier recently if he was aware of the fact that disastrous, results were likely to happen to Hospitals and other Charitable Institutions through such legislation and would the Fremier give every consideration to the necessity of increasing the Lottery Prizes in order to combat such losses so that our Hospitals would not suffer the heavy losses that are likely to take place. The Fremier, in reply to Mr. Quirk, pointed out that he could only answer the question in accordance with his statement to the House when delivering his speech on the Budget a few weeks ago, and at which time he pointed out that the incidence of the National Insurance Scheme as far as New South Wales is concerned, would be approximately £260,000 a year, and if the Hospitals of the Federal Government's National Insurance Scheme, the Hospitals' Commission will stand by the Hospitals. RECORD WEEK-END FOR NATIONAL PARK.

Indicative of the growing nopularity of the National Park is the fact that on Eight-Hour Day between 20,000 and 25,000 persons visited the Park. On the preceding day between 12,000 and 15,000 persons were present. Cars which passed through the Park totalled 1,407. 
