Mr. Quirk recently asked the Minister for Labour & Industry if he was aware of the fact that no less than 829 families were receiving the dole at Balmain and that during the years of the depression, not one shilling had been spent by the Government in providing work for the unemployed of Balmain, and in view of these facts Mr. Quirk desired to know if he would take the matter up with his colleague the Minister for Public Works, with the object of providing suitable

Hospital President's Report.

Ald. R. Thornton (President), made the following report at Tuesday week's meeting:—The Sorrie Street wall has been completed, and the work has been carried out very satisfactorily. I am pleased to report that the Balmain Municipal Council is now constructing the footpath in Sorrie Street. The roadway into the Hospital grounds is now being proceeded with, and as reported previously, will be constructed as far as the boiler-house. The Hospital grounds are now being gradually cleared up, and should be in readiness for the opening on Saturday next, 22nd inst. I am pleased to report that the following employees rendered voluntary service to the Hospital last Saturday, in cleaning up and endeavouring to prepare the grounds for next Saturday:—S. Southcombe and his two sons; J. Murray (Painter); T. Davis (Laundryman); E. Terry (temporary Assistant Carpenter); J. Callaghan (temporary labourer). It was decided to thank these gentlemen for their services. In order to economically clear up the grounds, it was deemed advisable to appoint a man with a lawnmower, and an assistant to help him. The boy, Mr. Milling, at the side of the Nurses' Quarters, and this is almost completed. Mr. Scattie started work at the Hospital on Monday, 17th October, 1938. In order that the male cleaners may specialise and be employed on work that will be more controllable, their roster of work has been altered, and will be brought into operation as soon as possible. I would recommend that a maid be appointed for cleaning in the "A" ward. This was approved of. The boiler house and boiler are to be handed over by the Public Works Department on Friday, 21st October, 1938. I would recommend that we appoint a man temporarily to clean up and lay out the grounds of the Hospital, and also to attend to the boiler. Stones have been ordered to be constructed in connection with the official opening of Wards, Boiler House and Hospital Gates. Brass plates have also been ordered for the following donors:—No. 8 Branch of the Police Association—to be placed on Anaesthetic Machine, Portable X-Ray Plant and Instrument Cabinet; Mort's Dock and Engineering Co.—Boiler in boiler house; Drumhoyne Ladies' Roxy Tennis Club—a room furnished by them in "A" Ward. These were approved of. A letter was received from the United Ancient Order of Druids, dated October 21, 1938, asking for a representative to call and receive a cheque from them for the Hospital, and I delegated Mr. H. West to act on behalf of the Board of Directors. I would suggest that presentations be made to Mr. Otton, The Secretary and Superintendent of Hospital, Mr. J. Quirk, M.L.A., and the Mayor, Ald. R. M. Brownlee, to commemorate the official opening. It was decided to make a presentation of a framed certificate of merit. I would recommend that Mr. Harding of the Balmain Municipal Council be appointed as Honorary Consulting Constructional Engineer to the Hospital. This was agreed to. I would recommend that the question of the duties of the male staff be referred to the House Committee for the purpose of seeing whether it would be possible to appoint one of the members of this staff in the cleaning and renovating and improving of the hospital grounds, and appointing a wardmaid in his stead. This was agreed. The report was adopted.

RECORD WEEK-END FOR NATIONAL PARK.

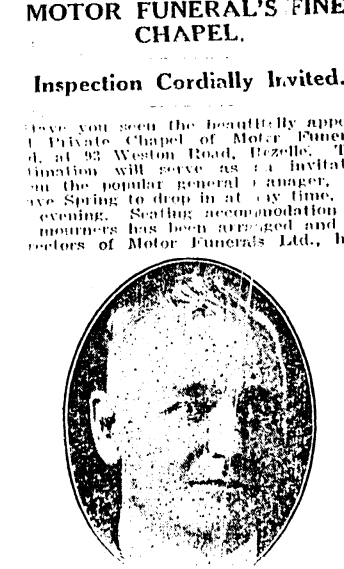
Hospital President Reception.

Brownlee), and fellow Aldermen, Mr. J. Quirk, M.L.A., Mr. J. Henstey, M.H.R. and Mr. Otton (Secretary of the Hospitals' Commission of N.S.W.). A musical programme was provided and during the evening, an appeal was made for blankets, etc., for the new hospital wards. Donations amounting to over £100 were received. The hall was tastefully decorated. Certificates of Merit were presented to a number of ladies and gentlemen who had given loyal service to the institution — Messames Harris, J. S. Electricity Costs.
 At the last meeting of the local Council, Ald. M. D. Cashman, a member of the Electricity Joint Committee, reported that several questions raised by him relating to the application of the Two-Part tariff in the Balmain district were being enquired into by the local Company, who had pointed out that some consumers' accounts would increase, but the majority would benefit. Some domestic consumers had saved as much as £12 p.a. The Company had stated that it was their desire to help Council and the public at all times and they had suggested that any consumer who felt that they had a grievance, be invited to communicate with Council, and if the Council would forward their complaints to the Company, they would examine them and submit a report in each case to the Council. The average cost to consumers involved numbering 5,561 was £2/14/5 per unit prior to the introduction of the Two-Part System as against £2/4/4 at present. With reference to the request of the Balmain Branch of the A.L.P. that efforts be made to reduce the price of electricity to householders, Ald. Cashman stated that the matter was now being considered. Ald. Cashman added that it was his intention in the future to have a copy of the Committee's deliberations and his report supplied to each Alderman.

COURT SHORTS.

The President's Report was read and adopted.

The Chief Secretary's Department wrote in respect to the selling of Art Union tickets on Sundays at the Balmain 10-Fl. Dinghy Club races, stating that same was prohibited. The communication was received.

An invitation for the President and Secretary to attend their Ball was received from the Balmain District Rugby League Football Club. The proceeds are being equally divided between the Hospital and the local Boys' Club.

A recommendation of the House Committee that the services of one of the employees be dispensed with and be given a week's pay in lieu of a week's notice, was approved of. This employee made an offer for cooking equipment, which was left to the President and Secretary to accept if thought fit.

The Board and Fire Commissioners wrote stating that the fire drill, conducted to the staff had proved satisfactory. The letter was received.

A request for permission to interview the staff regarding insurance, was received from the local agent of the A.M.P. Society. The request was granted.

Following a recommendation of the President it was decided to make presentations of Certificates of Merit and Life Governors' honours at the President's Reception. The awards were made as follows:—Certificates of Merit to Messames E. Fiddlen, P. Harris, S. Sharp, Messrs. E. Fiddlen, W. Green, W. FINANCE AND GRANTS.

It was reported by (Hon. District Treasurer (Mr. A. E. Toby), that after accounts totalling £82/11/10, which were passed for payment, the balances in the funds would be as follows:— General, £633/14/7; Propaganda, £82/14/7; Assurance, £63/1/11. The quotation of the Elite Caterers for the Annual Ball was accepted. Several invitations to be extended, were approved of. It was decided to thank the donors and also Mr. H. Carter for his installation of a public address system at the function. Tender of Fred Hosking for printing and supplying of souvenir cards was accepted. Mr. R. Dunn was appointed M.C. The Committee decided to nominate Mr. L. J. Swan for consideration as a Life Member of the Head Body. A report from a person in connection with an allegation of having players' tickets in his possession was received and decided that so as to eliminate suspicion, that all tickets be burned each week in the future.
