## Lane rules for the clearway

Sydney's first Clearway got under way this week. The General Secretary of the N.R.M.A. (Mr. W. Mason) today asked motorists, in their own interest, to co-operate in making the experiment a success.

Mr. Mason said to do this would become

doubly important for motorists using Parramatta Road to understand the rules of traffic lanes if the experiment was to produce the most efficient traffic flow.

The Clearway operates between Woodville Road, Parramatta and Harris Street, Ultimo, inwards in the morning and outwards in the evening peak hour.

Under this system traffic (with the exception of buses) are prohibited from stopping at the kerb except for normal traffic hold-ups. As the greater part of Parramatta Road has been lane-divided, motorists who intend to use the road would be advised to brush up on their lane drill.

Drivers often ask whether lane lines are just a guide to traffic or whether they are legally bound to remain in the lane they have chosen. And is there any basic difference between lanes with unbroken lines and those with broken lines?

The N.R.M.A. says that where lanes are defined by UNBROKEN lines the driver is obliged to continue in that lane until:

- Any sign, light or directional arrow indicates that he may change
  - He turns right or left at an intersection
  - He makes a right-hand turn to leave the street as he would into a driveway or private entrance.
- Making this manoeuvre he is expected to leave or enter the street by the shortest route, which normally would be straight across the road-way, when it is safe to do so.

The traffic regulations also forbid "U" turns in streets marked with unbroken lines.

When traffic lanes oc-

cur at intersections, left-hand turns must be made from the lane nearest to the left boundary or from a lane displaying a notice or directional arrow indicating that a turn may be made.

Drivers may change lanes in streets marked with BROKEN lines, provided they can do it with safety. The onus here is on the driver.

In thoroughfares where lanes are marked, it is lawful for drivers to overtake on the left-hand side of vehicles travelling in the same direction.

Every driver has experienced the "lane-hopper"—the type of driver who flits from one lane to another in the vain hope that he will get to his destination a few seconds earlier than he would if he had stayed in one lane. Most drivers get annoyed by this type of behaviour, so when the time comes for someone who genuinely has to change a lane to get in position for a turn, he finds his way blocked by drivers in the other lane.

In the interest of orderly traffic flow, the N.R.M.A. appeals to motorists to give consideration to the genuine driver. Generally he will give a clear signal of his intention and will pull across into the correct lane well before he makes his turn without creating any major inconvenience to following traffic.

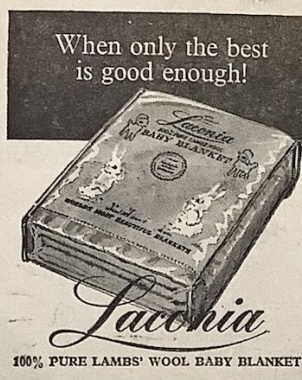

### COUNCIL NEWS

The Leichhardt Municipal Council, at its meeting on 13th June, received a report from its Works Committee that six units of Council's Brett Avenue Housing Project have been sold.

The preference to residents of the Municipality operates up to 26th June, 1967, and applications from non-residents will not be considered until that date.

Following representations by the Balmain District Rugby League Football Club, Council agreed to co-operate with the club in a joint approach to the Minister for Lands concerning a long-term lease to enable the club to proceed with major improvements to Leichhardt Oval as a modern football ground. Terms of such a lease were outlined.

The Town Clerk, Mr. E. A. Bassett, reported that the amount written off in respect of rebate of pensioners' rates for 1966 totalled \$80,238.09, half of which will be retrieved in the form of subsidy from the Department of Local Government.

### INCREASE IN WAGES — INCREASE IN PRICES

By now we must realize that increasing wages only increases cost of production and cost of production is the basis on which the purchasing price of goods is calculated.

Industry cannot carry continual increases and it is futile and ridiculous for anyone to suggest that industry can absorb extra wage costs.

Private industry has already carried some of the past increases because their business is competitive.

The only ones that seem to gain from these paltry wage rises are the governments, when you consider some of the increases that have been forced upon us in the past year.

Extra for postage, rates, stamp duty, fares, phone, land tax, insurance, food, clothing, drinks, sweets and many other everyday necessities. Each one gives the government a bigger slice of your pay increase.

There is need for a better method of determining the basic money needs of the working man.

Give the worker \$1 or \$10 increases—The government have first cut by added taxation. All the essential services, monopoly government controlled,

immediately increase their charges and by this time a great chunk of your increase is gone.

Then industry, who are compelled to pay the granted increase, automatically find that cost of their production has gone up and therefore you must pay more for whatever you buy.

Pretty silly state of affairs, isn't it?

Wasting millions on opera houses, building multi-million dollar government offices, continual overseas trips from the Prime Minister down the scale to the latest jaunt by Mr. Hughes don't help to reduce running costs.

If it is possible to spend so much money on all forms of government projects, it should be possible to import some overseas intellectual who can come up with a sensible, morally correct method of providing the ordinary working man with X number of dollars each week that will not continually diminish in value.

We must be short of a local man for the

job, as in the past 20 years it has been a rat race between wage increases and purchasing prices.

The one-time BOGY of inflation seems to have fallen out of favour and we are now in the DEFLATION era—deflation of the value of every dollar in your pocket.

There would not be one private industry that is not conscious of the need for the worker to retain more equity in his pay packet.

How can this be done when industry has to pay more for pay-roll tax, more direct tax, more land tax, just to mention a few. Naturally prices have to go up.

The answer to the wage need of the working man does NOT LIE only in increases.

There is a moral reasonable wage which has a sensible purchasing value with a residue to provide for possible emergencies and it's time someone in authority realized this and did something about it.

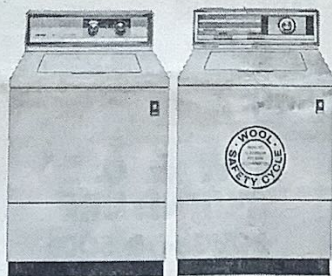

**COUNCIL NEWS**



Council's Engineer, Mr. G. A. Wilson, reported on footpath reconstruction in concrete in Isabella and Duke Streets, Balmain; footpath and kerb reconstruction in concrete in section of Duke Place, Balmain; kerb and gutter reconstruction in concrete in section of Bates Street, Balmain; footpath and kerb reconstruction in concrete in section of McCleer Street, Rozelle; the planting of American sweet gum trees in Darling Street, Balmain. Council agreed to plant creeping fig (ficus pumila) on the cliff wall at the lower end of Thames Street, Balmain.

Council's Chief Health Surveyor, Mr. R. S. Williams, reported emergency action re badly injured dog outside the Rozelle Psychiatric Centre on

30th May and re a dog with an injured hind leg placed in the Garbage Transfer Depot, Catherine Street, Leichhardt, by a person unknown on 1st June. In each case the dog was picked up and attended to by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, for which a charge will be made to Council.

Council received a reply from the Valuer-General, N.S.W., to matters raised by Council concerning the new valuation of properties in this municipality.

The Valuer-General stated that generally the new valuations were fixed having regard to the stage reached by the Council's planning scheme which is with the State Planning Authority, and in compliance with the provision that the

U.C.V. of land is the capital sum which the fee-simple of the land might be expected to realise if offered for sale on such reasonable terms and conditions as a bona-fide seller would require.

The Valuer-General takes into account any purpose for which the land could be used. So that some land was valued on a flat site basis if it fitted the provisions of the draft local scheme and Council's building codes. Each property is assessed individually.

Council resolved to ask Mr. Kenna to prepare a report on the significance and propriety of the criteria used.

Council received a letter from the State Planning Authority complaining that Council had given "a false and misleading" impression of the nature of the Mort Bay development approved by it (the S.P.A.).

Council adopted the report of Deputy Engineer/Town Planner, Mr. A. Kenna, and resolved that the validity of the complaint cannot be conceded.

The S.P.A. consent permits steel shipments,

dissuading only establishment of a steel yard and installation of plant or machinery specifically designed only for the handling of steel.

Council received a reply from the Premier, the Hon. R. W. Askin, M.L.A., to his representations in opposition to the proposed Mort Bay and White Bay container cargo terminals.

Council resolved to send the Premier a copy of its 14-page submission to the current Senate Select Committee on the Handling Method of Container Cargoes, at which Council is represented by Aldermen Wynne and Origglass, Municipal Engineer, Mr. G. Wilson, and Deputy Engineer/Town Planner, Mr. A. Kenna.

**MOTORING HINTS**

Few drivers realise the slim margin of safety

When a vehicle rounds a curve, centrifugal force tends to push it outwards. Double the speed and centrifugal force will be four times as great.

If power is applied as you round the curve, it helps to counteract the centrifugal force by setting up frictional resistance at the tyres.

By applying the brakes, you aid centrifugal force in pushing the car off the road.

Slow down to a safe speed before entering a curve (the growing practice of displaying advisory speed signs on curves will help you in selecting a safe speed). Round the curve with your foot on the accelerator, NOT the brake.
