**COUNCIL PASSES
 ON PETITION**

Leichhardt Council, at its meeting last week, refused to take action along the lines of the petition by Balmain, Birchgrove and Rozelle residents, urging it to use whatever powers and functions were available to it to remove the danger and nuisance arising from use of local streets by heavy transport vehicles.

On a party vote—8 votes to 6—Council decided to refer the whole matter to "the appropriate authorities" for attention.

It rejected the contention of the movers of a motion calling for implementation of the petition—Ald. I. Wyner, seconded by Ald. N. Origlass—that Council should use powers invested in it under Section 288 of the Local Government Act, and thus operate as a local governing authority was expected to operate, in order to bring relief to the people.

"Nuisance"

The petition, which was initiated by the Balmain-Leichhardt Labor Party—the group formed by the so-called Labor "Rebels"—had been signed by 506 residents.

Just before the meeting dealt with it, Ald. Wyner handed to the Town Clerk (Mr. Bassett) a further 304 signatures, but by a majority vote Council rejected the

additional ones (which are expected to go to the next meeting for consideration).

As previously reported in "The Link", the petition makes the following points:

Council should use its powers to remove the nuisance and danger arising from the noise, vibration, fumes and general disruption of normal living by heavy vehicles now swarming over the suburban streets.

Residents are concerned at the apparent lack of control over these vehicles.

Matters instanced particularly are: Travelling on the wrong side of the road to negotiate narrow corners; speeding in narrow streets; strewing spoil over the roads as a result of overloading; failure to cover loads properly; open tailboards and bad cornering; failure to respect Stop signs; and creation of racket by faulty engines and body springs.

Ald. Wyner's motion asked that the petition be received and adopted, and that Council prohibit vehicles over 3 tons' capacity from being driven on any road under Council's control at any time for any purpose causing interference with residents' health, safety or convenience.

Elsewhere

The motion asked that operators of vehicles over 3 tons' capacity be advised by notice (in the Press, through the Master Carriers' Association, and where possible by letter) of the prohibition and of the intention to prosecute any owner and/or driver who failed to abate the nuisance.

Also, the Police Traffic Branch was to be asked to provide regular surveillance of streets affected for the purpose

of acting against any traffic infringements.

Ald. Wyner told Council that action along the lines urged by his motion had been taken some months ago by Sutherland Council, following residents' complaints about trucks carrying spoil.

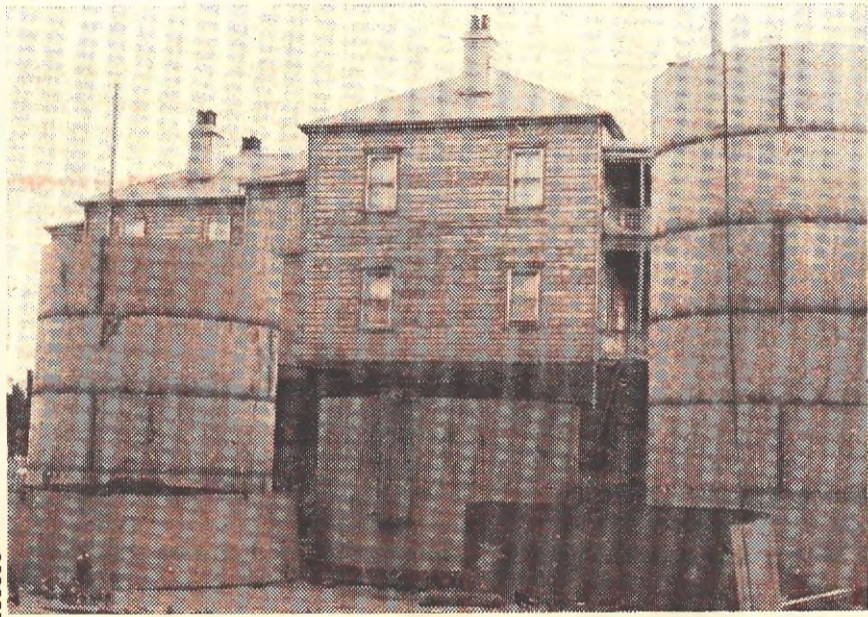
Ald. Origlass pressed Council to take action under the Act which provided that the Council might prevent creation of a public nuisance, and require the abolition of such nuisance. If Council refused to act, it would amount to condoning the activities.

Ald. Lewis, who supported the motion, said he had inspected the streets mentioned in the petition and found some of them in a disgraceful condition as a result of spoil spillage.

Residents had reported that rocks had been falling from trucks in Reynolds Street, and a large one had gone through a fence. Stephens Street residents had been complaining of dust being blown from the street into their homes.

Ald. Lewis added that he had been advised by the Council's by-laws inspector, Mr. A. Ward, that two prosecutions were pending against truck drivers.

**Tanks Near
 Houses**

It certainly would support the view of Balmain aldermen that the location of the tanks is dangerously close to nearby houses.

Ald. Brady spoke for the majority when he declared that the subject was one for the police to handle, not the Council.

"Abdicated"

In a subsequent comment to "The Link", Ald. Wyner said that the Council by its majority decision had abdicated its position as the people's first line of defence. It had further destroyed the standing of Local Government in the eyes of citizens.

By referring the matter to "the appropriate authorities", it had chosen to ignore the fact

that Council itself was an appropriate authority.

"Obviously police action was required in some of the matters," he said. "But how much more effective would that action have been if backed by a strong Council decision!"

"The petitioners' desire for 'peace, order and serenity' in their local community once again found no sympathetic response amongst the majority controllers of the Council. Instead of being fostered and favoured, the people's aspirations are once again thwarted."

**TRAFFIC
 PETITION**

In evaluating Leichhardt Council's decision to pass on to "the appropriate authorities" the petition of 809 residents of Balmain, Birchgrove and Rozelle in regard to the use of local streets by heavy transport, the people will, we feel, want some questions answered.

If the position be as serious as the petition alleges, the appropriate authorities are not doing their job. And one of these "appropriate authorities" is undoubtedly Leichhardt Council, which has some power under the Local Government Act to end any public nuisance.

Having decided to pass on the petition, Council apparently agrees that residents have a case calling for relief. In that case, should it not on its own initiative have taken prior action against offenders?

Report says that it has. But if we are to believe local residents, the action has not been effective enough. Certainly it should not be necessary for residents to petition in such a matter.

The Labor "rebels" who initiated the petition are no doubt ready to exact political capital out of the position and use it as a plank of their platform at the forthcoming municipal elections.

However, we've had enough of "party" in local municipal matters. Urgent subjects such as the district's heavy traffic problem should be treated by both the majority and the minority as above politics, not as political footballs.

COUNCIL MEETING UPROAR

Leichhardt Council's special meeting last Monday night, called to finish the business of last week's ordinary meeting, ended in uproar, with only 22 out of 40 items on the correspondence sheet attended to.

The meeting was particularly heated. At one time two aldermen were on their feet together, arguing, with loud-voiced interjections coming from a crowded public gallery.

At 11.40 p.m. the Mayor (Mrs. Cashman) closed the meeting.

The subject causing most heat were four letters protesting against Council's decision not to object to the proposed extensions to the R. W. Miller wharf in Louisa Road, Birchgrove.

These were from the Balmain Branch of the A.L.P., the Balmain Association, the Snail's Bay Sailing Club, and a local resident, Mr. A. J. Chanter.

The sailing club asked for urgent reconsideration of the needs of club members and of the children of the district, whose training was being retarded by industrial developments in the area.

The A.L.P. Branch hoped Council would use all its powers to oppose construction of the new wharf.

By 8 votes to 5—the usual "party" vote—Council decided to receive and note the letters' contents.

It rejected an amendment by Ald. Origlass that the writers be advised that Council would be reconsidering the matter at its next meeting, when a rescission motion by him would be dealt with.

Voting Change Protest

Leichhardt Council, at its last meeting, decided to support a protest from Canterbury Council against current State Legislative plans to abolish compulsory voting in municipal elections.

Speakers stressed the necessity to make people take an interest in the elections.

Also, it was pointed out that, under the present legislation, requiring proportional representation, minority groups gained representation in the Council. Under the legislation now before State Parliament, the system

would be changed into preferential voting.

Ald. Lewis, Walker and Dougherty spoke against the protest move, considering that compulsory voting should be abolished.

Ald. Lewis said compulsory voting cost Leichhardt Municipality ratepayers a lot of money. At the last elections between 5,000 and 6,000 eligible persons did not vote and, as required by the law, the Town Clerk had to send notices to all of them, seeking a reason for not voting.

He said that since he had been an alderman — 1956 — Council had never taken action against anybody for not voting, yet two of three clerks had to be employed to send out the notices, and Council had to pay for the postage.

Boys wishing to learn or play judo should attend the club on any of those nights between 7 and 9 p.m.

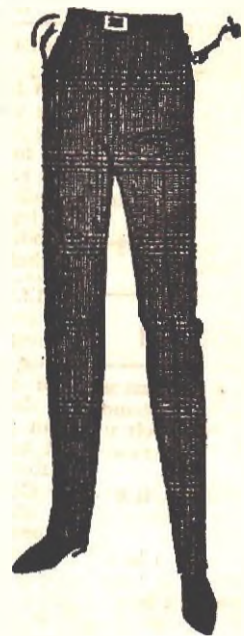
