# CONTINUED STAGNATION, **OR A NEW START?**

# This Is To Be Your Decision Next Saturday

Never have Balmain and Rozelle faced a more important election than the one you will decide next Saturday. Voting is not compulsory. However, there is an obligation for all residents to show they are interested in local affairs.

It is common knowledge that a top-heavy Labor vote has left little opportunity for any opposition on major points which vitally affect this area. The buildozing by weight of numbers has had a marked effect on the general appearance of the suburbs---VERY noticeable to longstanding residents who have witnessed the decline that is visually evident here.

We have lost a tremendous number of our real Balmainites for many reasons, major ones being the following:

- Dissatisfaction with the scars of industry which have been allowed to crowd them out.
- Ridiculously inflated property values, which fooled them into thinking they were making huge profits by selling, then to find that the money they received represented only a ۲ deposit on homes in more progressive areas.
- Council rates have increased, together with water rates, to a point where in some instances they are ten times greater than 20 years ago. In fact, the highest rated suburb in Sydney to live in is Balmain, which has always been basically a working man's suburb.

THIS IS WHAT HAS HAPPENED THROUGH ALLEGIANCE VOTING TO LABOR ASSOCI-ATED CANDIDATES.

For the past two years this column has stated that there is no room for political parties in



the selection of aldermen. They must be elected with complete disregard of any party, and chosen WHOLLY because they are conscious of the needs of their ward, and with one interest only: To promote and develop a modern suburb for the residents as well as

industry (but industry in its proper perspective). Now, let's analyse what is possible in the forthcoming election: A breakaway party opposing official labor, and two independents (in the Balmain ward).

Firstly, the Labor candidates now openly state they will beautify by street tree planting and provide parking. This paper has constantly pointed out that these things are essential. WHY has it taken this election for them to become conscious of the need? They have had two years to make a move. What certainty is there that they will bring about the existence of these things if elected?

Now the breakaway candidates: Some of them have been on the Council for a considerable period, and now hope for a majority or strong representation. Why did they accept the block voting of the Labor supporters without demanding some type of inquiry?

Credit must be given to the breakaways for their opposition to chemical storage, and for this the voters certainly need to show appreciation.

You will elect a new Council to administer this area for the next three years. And make no mistake: three years is a long time. It can mean development, or it can mean complete destruction of these suburbs as residential areas.

> So it appears that if you, together with residents of many other suburbs, now realise mat politics have NO place in local affairs, you will elect free-thinking men and women without any political pressures. This, of course. means independents (where standing).

> Independents have no directing body or back-up from any party, therefore their overriding incentive is the question of improving the area in which they live. They do not work TO elevate any political party within their municipality.

> We hope we have given you a run-down on what has occurred and what could occur in the future.






Practically all has been achieved with a small movement in the general rate.
