

OUR PARKING NEEDS

Although Leich-hardt Council's hands have been full in recent weeks over the Glebe issue, those in charge of policy have had ample time since the December election to do something about honouring their campaign promises.

It is deplorable that not one promise relating to Balmain and Rozelle has been implemented.

Every member of the Council offered a new deal in tackling the long - standing needs of these suburbs. Tree planting and beautification, and parking areas for over-burdened motorists, were two of the main issues. After seven months, we're still awaiting signs of

action. There is no provision for off-street parking in either suburb. Yet many people shop by car these days and they require somewhere to park.

Both suburbs need a 3-floor parking station. A design for this is easily obtained by a visit to Balmain Leagues Club. which has been conscious of the needs of its members in this direction.

And this matter of Council policy! This paper has been seeking for many years the appointment of a har son officer, to provide information of Council's activities. This appointment, too, was promised. Where is he? Generally. an inquiry from Council leaves one in the same position as before the request. Those in high positions say nothing; those in lesser positions apparently don't know. The reason for this is that on Council's books is a decision that no member of the staff may give information to the Press. This extraordinary position — unique in our experience - surely can't be allowed to continue much longer!




