# How Council Keeps Eye On Health Conditions

Many interesting facts and figures—including some specially relating to Balmain and Rozelle—are contained in the report of Leichhardt Council's health administration service, just presented by the Municipal Health Surveyor and Building Inspector, Mr. R. S. Williams.

For instance, Council officers treated 1430 commercial or industrial premises and 990 private premises for rat eradication last year. They inspected another 5034 premises in respect of rat infestation.

Thirty commercial industrial premises and 390 private premises were treated for cockroach infestation. Commercial and industrial premises are treated on a charged basis, covering cost of labour and material.

Block by block inspection of private premises is a routine practice by the staff and is a necessary adjunct to the treatment of factories, workshops and offices.

Advice, issue of rat poison and treatment of premises were extended to many householders. This service is free to residents. Rat poison was given to 117 residents in cases of minor rat infestation, and 346 applications were received for the issue of chlordane spray for treatment of cockroach infestation.

The large number of port facilities existing on the waterfront of the municipality necessitates constant surveillance at such points, particularly in regard to the lack of or inadequacy of rat guards on vessels.

Total expenditure on rat and cockroach infestation, which included the wages of six pest control officers, amounted to

\$11,642, income from charges for the treatment of business premises being \$3,420.

Other items discussed by the report included the following:

**DOG CONTROL**

Council registered 3,259 dogs of the age of six months and over last year. It seized 421 dogs and impounded them at the dogs' home at Moore Park (78% of these were unregistered).

The report stresses the importance to an owner of registering his dog. If it gets on to the street and is seized by the Dog Controller, the identification disc guarantees its safe return.

The Dog Controller found new homes for 27 abandoned puppies.

Council received 296 inquiries and complaints in regard to missing dogs, molesting of people, savaging of cats and dogs, and injured and diseased dogs.

Income in this section was \$5,677, and expenditure \$4,852.

**MEALS ON WHEELS**

This service continued to give satisfactory results in providing meals of good standard to pensioners, persons who were ill and those in necessitous circumstances.

Delivery and serving of meals on "A" run is carried out by the Citizens' T.B. League, which supplies the vehicle and driver, Council allocat-

ing a voluntary helper. On "B" run Council provides a car and driver four days a week, and Balmain Rotary a car and driver for one day a week.

Last Christmas a special turkey Christmas dinner was given to all persons receiving Meals on Wheels. Average number of meals per day in 1968 was 73.

**HOME NURSING**

The Home Nursing Service conducted by the Citizens' T.B. League, Rozelle, gave the following details for 1968:

Total no. of visits, 6523. No. of miles, 12,924. No. of patients visited, 80. No. of patients deceased, 10. Transferred to hospitals or convalescent homes, 24. Satisfactorily discharged, 11. On books at Dec. 31, 38.

In conjunction with the home nursing service, a social worker employed by the League calls on patients and advises them on pension problems, transport, arranging admittance to homes, social outings, etc.

**FOOD PREMISES**

Council's Health Inspectors made 1322 inspections and issued 73 notices to proprietors of food premises to cleanse and maintain premises in a cleanly condition and to remedy defective and insanitary fittings. To enforce compliance legal proceedings were taken in 59 cases,

In accordance with Council's policy, 124 garbage containers were issued to Senior Citizens on application during 1968.

**WATER ANALYSIS**

Regular sampling and analysis of water were conducted at the Leichhardt Municipal Swimming Centre, Dawn Frazer swimming pool and King George Park baths.

Satisfactory bacteriological results occurred at the Leichhardt and Balmain centres, but heavy faecal pollution was encountered at King George Park baths, causing this small tidal pool to be closed to the public for several months.

**POPULATION**

Official population estimates as at June 30 for the past five years for Leichhardt municipality were: 1964, 61,250; 1965, 61,200; 1966, 59,260; 1967, 59,320; 1968, 59,200 (plus 15,850 for Glebe).

## FIVE TENDERS FOR EAST BALMAIN LAND

Five tenders have been received by Leichhardt Council from private developers for purchase of the vacant land remaining in the Council's Brett Avenue (East Balmain) housing project.

They have been accompanied by proposals for the construction of blocks of flats on the land.

The tenders were tabled at last meeting of the Council. They will be considered later.

They ranged between \$220,000 and \$270,000.

Council decided last February to sell the land, which was then valued at \$176,000. The Council had planned to use it in its municipal housing scheme, of which the "Yuruga" flats project was the first stage.

Commenting at the time on the position, the Mayor, Ald. L. Rodwell,

said that Council was not able to carry on with the housing project owing to lack of funds.

He thought that under private developers Balmain would be able to get something worth while in about two years, whereas it would take Council ten years out of its own resources. Furthermore, he did not think that home building was Council's job.

# First Hearing Of Objections To Planning Scheme

The public hearing of objections to the Leichhardt Municipal Planning Scheme started last Wednesday night at Leichhardt Town Hall. The night was occupied with questions of zoning of some sections of the Balmain peninsula.

Between 70 and 80 objections to the plan will be heard by Council, which will meet on alternate Wednesdays in special meetings convened for this purpose.

The full Council, comprising 18 aldermen, is sitting as a legally constituted tribunal to hear the objections.

The individual objector's case after it has been presented will be considered when the Town Planner, Mr. A. Kenna, has reported on it. The Council's decision on each will be forwarded to the Minister for Local Government and Highways (Mr. Morton) for his appraisal and action.

## REZONING

About ten cases were heard during the night, generally on the theme that if the area concerned were rezoned for residential development—as proposed in the plan—expansion would be prevented.

Among the firms objecting to the planning scheme were Morrison & Sinclair Pty. Ltd., shipbuilders; Newbound & Co. Ltd.; Stannard Bros. Pty. Ltd., shipping service; Monsanto Chemicals (Aust.) Ltd.; Max Cooper & Son, building contractors; Jubilee Engineering Co. Pty. Ltd.; J. Fenwick & Co., tug owners; and several major oil companies.

The oil companies sought rezoning to one of the industrial classifications of the areas on which their service stations were located, where these were in proposed living area zonings.

Where an industrial unit's location is in an area proposed for living area zoning it would become "non-conforming", and then be subjected to inhibitions in respect of expansion.

## Balmain Association Excluded

The Balmain Association has been excluded from the list of objectors to the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

Council has decided that the Association does not have the required interest (such as monetary interest) in the various properties referred to.

The Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell, said it was held that an organisation could not be accepted as an objector on behalf of other people, nor could any person accept-

ed as an objector on his own behalf object on behalf of another person.

The Balmain Association spent much time and effort on its report which contained 22 different objections to the scheme.

The report represented the collated findings of seven special study groups which worked in the area for a three-month period before the plan was exhibited.

It proposed zoning changes which it considers are vitally necessary if the Balmain peninsula is to develop "in a logical and cohesive manner".

# ANTI-NOISE MOVES AT TERMINAL PRODUCE RESULTS

The noise situation at the White Bay container terminal has now taken a sudden and definite turn for the better, with promise of further improvement following remedial action by the terminal operators, Seatainer Terminals Ltd.

Secretary of the Local Action Committee, Mrs. J. Sherlock, confirmed the view of the company's N.S.W. manager, Mr. J. A. Gray, that there has been improvement.

She said: "The company has gone to a lot of trouble to explain to us what it has been doing to answer our complaints. The level of noise has now certainly been reduced."

"Residents are pleased that the company has recognised us as a committee working on their behalf, and that it has taken definite steps to cut down the noise."

## Measures

The further remedial measures being adopted by the operators were described by Mr. Gray in a letter to Mrs. Sherlock.

He said she had been correct in her view that some crane drivers were able to stack containers without creating noise. They were those who had been with the company since start of operations.

They were interested in all their drivers achieving this proficiency, not only to reduce noise, but also to avoid damage to containers and their contents.

All major repairs to containers were effected away from the terminal. Acoustically dead hammers were being used at the terminal, and it was impossible further to reduce the hammering noise generated inside the shed.

However, in regard to noise generated by hammering in the locking pins holding the containers on the rail waggons, the Department of Railways had agreed to supply smaller pins which could be inserted by hand.

Part of the footway for the landward end of the engine house of the wharf crane would be fully enclosed and an additional door fitted to form an air lock.

After consultation with

the Department of Labour and Industry and the drivers concerned, the bell on the wharf crane was being replaced by a quieter one and moved from the casing to ground level.

The Department had now cancelled its instruction that drivers of the overhead cranes must sound their sirens before every move.

In future, sirens would be sounded only in an emergency.

Other measures reported by Mr. Gray were:

**Overhead Cranes:** Lubricators with carbon brushes have been fitted to the bogeys of overhead cranes. Misalignment of the runway rails has been corrected to eliminate squeal. Motor generators are to be fully enclosed by sound-insulated structures.

**Mufflers on Trucks:** Formerly located above the driver's head. Larger ones, discharging horizontally, have been fitted underneath the trucks, eliminating the clacking noise caused by vibration of the vertical exhaust's rain cap.

# REACTIONS TO JUDGMENT ON ALDERMEN

Reactions to the Equity Court ruling against the three Balmain aldermen over the Council meeting deadlock—which resulted in their re-admission to last week's special meeting after their unreserved apology to the Mayor—were as anticipated.

The Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell, said: "The less I say the better. I am happy the situation has been resolved, because I want to see things working".

Ald. N. Origlass said he was disappointed at the decision. He felt it indicated a position of "virtual mayoral dictatorship" in regard to the conduct of meetings.

In his opinion the situation called for a consideration of the Local Government Act in this respect.

"My contention all along", he said, "was that the Mayor had intervened in a debate in opposition to an amendment I had moved, before it had been seconded, and I was seeking to take a point of order on that."

"It was a seeming contradiction between two ordinances and concerned the prerogative of the

Mayor to make a statement at any time.

"I considered the mayoral prerogative must not be stretched to give him the right to intervene in opposition to a proposition and that the prerogative should be more finely indicated.

"The Court, however, ruled against us.

"The only alternative to complying with the Court's declaration was resignation. This would have entailed a by-election and expense for the people, also missing the special meetings for the hearing of objections to the municipal planning scheme—a subject of the greatest interest to residents."

Ald. Origlass added that he was considering what action could be taken in regard to seeking an amendment of the Local Government Act and ordinances in order to lay down a precise

course of procedure for mayors and shire presidents when conducting meetings.

"I want to see a more democratic set-up than the position indicated by the Court judgment", he said.

## CONCLUSION

The President of the Local Government Association, Ald. F. J. Purdue, said that the main conclusion which could be drawn from the proceedings was that the Mayor must at all times be recognised as the chairman of a Council meeting and that his power to ensure order at meetings must, subject to the right of orderly dissent, be respected.

"He added: "I was particularly interested to note that, as soon as the incident was closed, the vociferous elements in the public gallery left the meeting."

"Clearly their interest was not in bettering the people and area of Leichhardt but in battering on to any confused or noisy situation. There is no place in Local Government for agitators of this type."

"Nevertheless, it is good to see the difficult situation settled and, it is hoped, permanently resolved".

## Scouts' Official Is Dead

James X. Coutts, Commissioner for Leichhardt District Boy Scouts, died in Balmain last Sunday after a long illness.

Mr Coutts was a wonderful old man who devoted much of his life to the scouts' movement. He was in his early 80's.

Camp Coutts, area camp at Waterfall, was named after him. He was awarded the M.B.E. recently for his service to youth.

He received his first scoutmaster's warrant in 1910, and became the first commissioner for Leichhardt district when it was formed in 1946.

Mr Coutts lost his right leg many years ago, but carried on with the aid of an artificial one.
