COUNCIL'S FINANCE MESS

Big Deficit Sure For This Year

Leichhardt Council's effort to prevent an increase in rates by economies has failed. Inevitability of an increase in the rate was indicated at last week's meeting, when revised estimates showed a serious financial position.

Council was presented with the revised estimates of income and expenditure for 1969, which revealed an estimated deficit at the end of this year of \$154,304.

This represents an amount of .175 cents in the dollar of the unimproved capital value of ratable land in the municipality.

The current rate is 2.315 c. in the \$, so that the actual rate required to cover estimated expenditure for this year is 2.490 c. in the \$.

Even at that increased figure no new construction work would have been provided for.

Two Years

The implication is that, when the 1970 rate is being considered this coming December, Council will have to cover the 1969 deficit as well as the increased costs for next year.

Hence minimum requirements for next year would indicate a rise in rates of at least .175 c. for next year's costs, plus the deficit of .175 c. for this year.

A similar dismal financial position is shown by the "available funds", which represent the Council's working capital.

From showing a credit of \$172,737 in 1965, these have declined to an estimated deficit for 1969 of \$87,895.

Observers believe that the position thus shown

will cause the Department of Local Government to keep a very close eye on the activities of the Council.

The question of appointing an administrator to replace the Council must be raised in Government thinking should Council fail to handle its finances properly.

A Council is expected by the Government to strike a rate that will permit the conduct of a minimum standard of operations as required of a Local Government body.

At last Wednesday night's meeting the further consideration of the financial position as revealed by the revised estimates was deferred.

Council called for a report, to be submitted to the next meeting of the Finance Committee, on the cost of running the Smoke and Noise Abatement Advisory Panels operated by Council.

Panels

Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain ward) raised the point that the action of calling for a report on the cost of these two panels implied that money could be saved by eliminating them.

If that were the case, he was strongly opposed to it. Those activities, he said, were becoming more and more in demand by the public.

Leichhardt Council's activities in the smoke and noise abatement fields had secured much favourable publicity, and they were to be commended.

The panels included outside experts. The only obvious expenditure in their operation (apart from the time spent by the Council's officers at meetings and in writing reports) was the cost of

giving members of the panels a cup of tea at meetings.

As regards the time spent by officers of the Council, their reports would have to be made even if there were no panels.

"It would be a very poor development for the Council to dispense with activities of this type", said Ald. Origlass. "They are becoming more indispensable as time passes."

"The saving by eliminating them would be only peanuts".

Balmain Works Considered By Committees

Several matters of importance to the Balmain peninsula were considered at the first meetings of the three special committees recently appointed by Leichhardt Council.

The subjects dealt with included Council parking stations and the condition of Birchgrove Oval.

The reports of the three committees were presented to last week's meeting of Council, which adopted the recommendations they contained.

The special Parking Areas Committee recommended that an inspection be made of a site near Parramatta Road and any other area in the municipality thought suitable for a municipal parking station.

The committee will be looking around shortly.

Among the sites to be inspected will be Booth Street, Balmain, which was suggested by "The Link" recently as a suitable area for angle-parking to cater for shoppers at the main Balmain

shopping centre. Also talks will be held with the traffic authorities regarding suitable sites for parking stations.

The Library Committee reported that it had received a letter from the N.S.W. Library Week Committee seeking support for a campaign for a higher Government subsidy.

Consideration of it was deferred pending receipt of information from local Members of Parliament.

Parks

The Parks and Playing Areas Committee reported that it had considered a letter from The Balmain Association offering its co-operation in the landscaping and planting of trees in parts of Balmain.

It was decided to thank the Association for its

interest, but to inform it that Council's finances precluded the carrying out of such works in the current financial year.

The committee dealt with a proposal by Balmain District Rugby Football Club for major improvements and alterations of Leichhardt Oval.

The club urged that the area be developed as a football field rather than an oval, in rectangular form in the English style where spectators could get closer to the players.

The committee decided to invite representatives of the club and the N.S.W. Rugby Football League to attend a meeting of the committee to consider the proposal.

Birchgrove

Extensive reconstruction and improvements to Birchgrove Oval will be listed as a matter of urgency for consideration by Council in the 1970 estimates.

Before the committee was a report on the subject by the Council's engineer, which had been called for some months ago by Ald. N. Origlass.

The oval, which is very heavily used by school students and other juniors, requires regrading and reconstruction of two cricket pitches, at an estimated cost of \$16,750.

In addition, pavilion alterations and repairs would cost \$2,083, replacement of seating around the oval \$1100, and provision of additional seating \$352.

The view was expressed in committee discussion that because of the heavy use to which the oval was put, clubs visiting it should come to some agreement between themselves to enable the area to be rested from time to time.

SUNDAY DRINKING

If the referendum on Sunday hotel trading is carried, Balmain could become a footpath drinker's paradise on Sunday.

Many complaints are now made about this habit, which at times produces offensive behaviour towards passers-by.

Little or nothing seems to have been done by the police to stop it. Can't Leichhardt Council do something under its by-laws to help protect the public from this?

Sunday trading would call for extra police control. Since this isn't very evident now, the possibilities would not be pleasant.

Most people of course will vote according to how the situation would affect them personally.

Club members will no doubt show little concern, being privileged to buy liquor on Sunday at the cost of a few dollars a year in club fees.

Those who aren't club members will no doubt feel they are entitled to a drink outside their homes.

Church people will say they are entitled to enjoy their Sundays in the traditional way.

Publicans will probably hope the referendum is defeated. They might envy the clubs because of the trade going to them, but many will not wish to increase their costs by Sunday trading.

Liquor is given as a major cause of road accidents. Is it not feasible to assume that open Sunday drinking will add to the death rate?

This paper feels alcohol will not build a strong Australia. This will be done only by observance of the law and respect for one another's views.

The clash between brewery and club interests should therefore be dismissed as one of no consequence.

RESIDENTS' COMFORT OF NO CONCERN IN LIGHTING PLANS

In carrying out its plans for street lighting, Sydney County Council declines to take into account possible complaints that any light will be a nuisance to adjacent residents.

This was the County Council's reply to a letter from Leichhardt Council which had asked that the possible effects on adjacent residents be kept in mind when locating street lights.

Leichhardt Council's letter mentioned that it had to get some lights shielded because they shone through the windows of nearby houses.

It added that it reserved the right to require the re-location of lights if this became necessary to prevent nuisance to residents, provided it did not affect the efficiency of the street lighting system.

The County Council's reply made the following points:

The design of street lighting was based on the purpose of providing safe-driving conditions for motorists and safe walking for pedestrians.

In this regard it was not practicable to anticipate possible complaints from residents, nor to alter the street lighting

system to cater for such complaints.

Should Leichhardt Council subsequently request re-location of such lamps, the cost of the work would be chargeable to it.

When the County Council's letter was before Leichhardt Council it was accompanied by a scathing report from the municipal engineer.

He said that in the design of street lighting it would be possible to locate the lights to obtain greatest efficiency with least nuisance to residents.

He considered the

County Council's attitude most unreasonable.

Council decided to approach the County Council again, adhering to its earlier stand.

Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain) commented that the County Council's attitude was an example of unreasonable bureaucrats who showed no concern for the ordinary comfort of citizens.

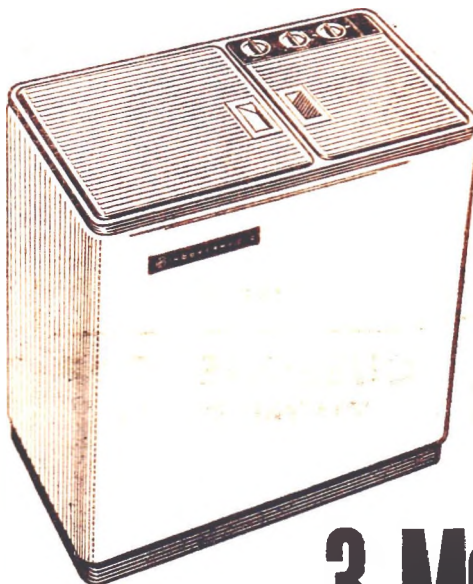

Council Rejects Tenders For Housing Project

The flourish of trumpets by Leichhardt Council in regard to home unit development of the residue of its East Balmain housing project land has ended. Council has refused to accept any of the eight tenders for the project.

Observers now believe that the Council's main reason for calling tenders was to test the market and find out what developers thought the land was worth.

While the lips of the Council's majority are sealed on the subject, it would appear that they consider the prices offered are too low, and that Council should not part with its property for the time being.

The subject was raised at last Wednesday night's meeting of the Council, when a motion was carried that no tender be accepted.

Schemes

The reference to Council by the Finance Committee followed the 28-day adjournment of consideration of the eight schemes submitted by five private developers.

The tenders had been accompanied by proposals for the construction of blocks of home units on the land, and ranged from \$220,000 to \$270,000.

One tenderer had offered an alternative higher price for maximum development. Another had offered three schemes with the purchase price rising in accordance with the intensity of the development permitted.

When the motion was put to last week's meeting, the mover gave no reason for it.

There was no discussion other than by Balmain aldermen, who sought further action.

Ald. N. Origlass moved an amendment that Council proceed with the next stage of the Council's original housing plan for East Balmain.

This was rejected.

Testing

Ald. Origlass told "The Link" that it would appear that Council desired to test the market, and that it felt it should retain possession at this stage, with a view to securing a higher price than those shown in the tenders.

However, the Balmain aldermen considered that Council itself should now proceed with the next stage of the housing project, the first stage of which had been most successful.

From the point of view of district development, the scheme had been most desirable, since it gave great concern to questions of land use, such as preserving the view and using the sharp slope of the land to best advantage.

"It has generally been agreed that the quality of construction was very good", said Ald. Origlass.

"The tenders which have now been rejected were submitted in good faith. The tenderers now learn that rather than being bona fide, the move was more a test of the market on the question of prices available.

"If the land is simply to be held pending the payment of some higher price it obviously follows that final prices to the

occupiers will go higher".

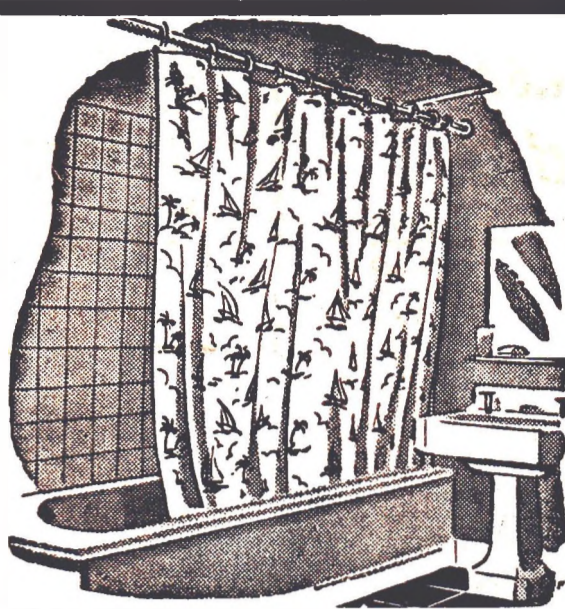
"The Link" asked him if he thought it was not a realistic attitude in view of rapidly rising prices of land around Sydney.

Ald. Origlass replied that the justification for Council to purchase the land in the first place was not to enter the business of buying and selling land, but to exercise its power under the Local Government Act to enter the field of re-housing.

"The public duty resting on the Council", he said, "is to provide that housing at the lowest possible price.

"It raises the question of the ethics of buying land from the individual owner for one purpose—the legitimate purpose under the Act—and then proceeding as a dealer in land.

"Will the Council now give to the original owners of the land a slice of the profit it makes out of the sale?"

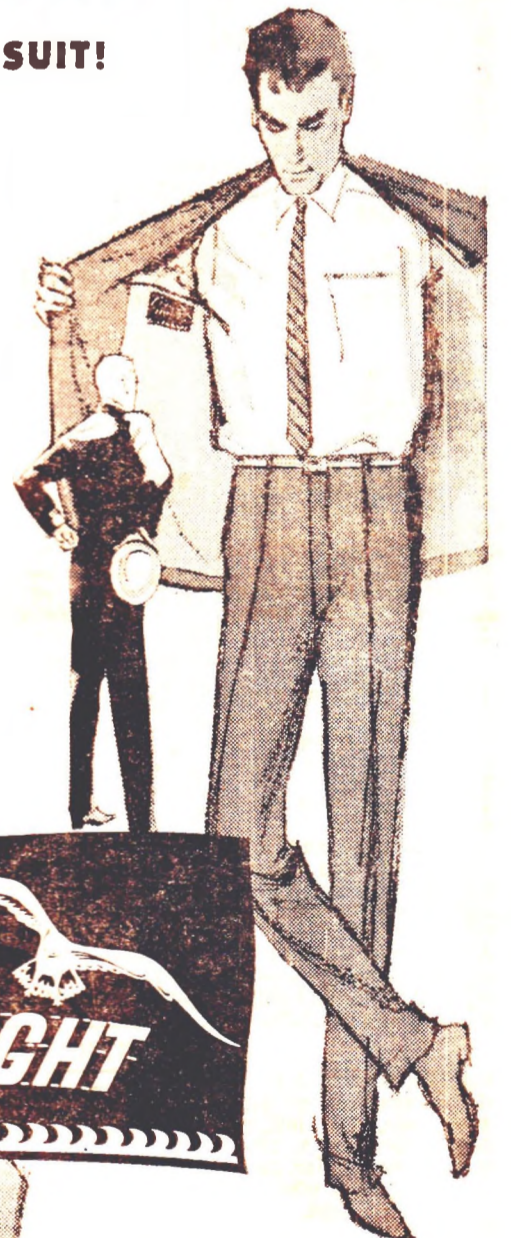

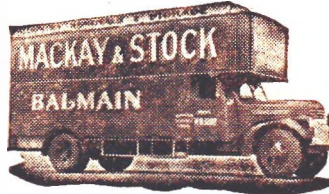
