# Traffic Fears At New Terminal

**The first ship to visit the new Mort Bay container terminal has come and gone, without much fuss except for streams of heavy traffic through inadequate Balmain streets.**

**Indications are that the greatest objection residents will make is in regard to traffic noise and danger.**

The Australian National Line put Balmain's second container terminal into operation last Wednesday, with no prior publicity.

Although the new terminal buildings have not been erected, a flurry of operations ended in paving of the terminal area and completion of the wharf structure to permit berthing and unloading of the first ship.

This was the Australian Enterprise, a combined container and roll-on, roll-off ship of 11,500 tons, from Japan on its maiden voyage.

This vessel, together with the 24,000-ton container ship, Australian Endeavour — which arrived the same day at Fremantle from Rotterdam, also on its maiden voyage — were the first Australian ships in overseas trade for 42 years.

The Enterprise, with a crew of 30, will run to Japan in the Eastern Seaward Service which it inaugurates.

It was in port just over

24 hours, during which 199 containers were discharged at Mort Bay.

When the service to Japan is operating fully, it is expected that a ship will dock at Morts Bay every 12 days. The terminal, however, will be used also by the A.N.L.'s coastal fleet.

An A.N.L. spokesman said he believed local residents would not be worried unduly by the terminal operations. The method being used of handling cargo was the quietest way.

He added that he was a former resident of Balmain, at a time when he had experience of ship-building operations at Mort's Dock. Conditions now would be much quieter than then.

He believed residents would not have anything to complain about.

**Inquiries by "The Link" among district residents have so far not revealed any cause for concern regarding terminal noises.**

These are considered

to be far less than those coming from the White Bay terminal.

"I've got my fingers crossed", said one lady. "But my feeling last Wednesday night, when unloading was going on, was one of 'quiet action'."

"The noise from the terminal sounded like the swish of breakers, and I felt as though I was living on the top of a cliff above the sea. "I heard no banging or thumping."

"If that's all the noise they're going to make it won't worry us."

**There are different thoughts, though, about the traffic on streets leading to and from the new terminal.**

Fears about this, as already expressed in "The Link", are shared on all sides. They were echoed by local aldermen, Alderman I. Wyner and N. Origlass.

Ald. Wyner said that after unloading commenced on Wednesday there was a continuous line of trucks going up

## ALD. ORIGLASS TO NOMINATE FOR FEDERAL ELECTION

**Alderman Nick Origlass announced his intention this week of nominating as an Independent Labor candidate for the new seat of Sydney at the forthcoming Federal election.**

He is the third intending nominee so far announced.

"The other candidates for the new seat are not known in Balmain and Rozelle", he said.

"The fight must go on to bring Labor in tune with the times."

"The Party leaders expelled me and Ald. Wyner, but the Labor people have rejected this unjust edict by their vote in the February and December 1968 elections."

"People come first, and real power in the hands of the people is my objective."

"Keep Balmain in Canberra, and with the voice that will be heard".

Ald. Origlass is the third intending nominee

so far announced. The others are:

- Mr Graham Robertson, President of the Broadway Branch of The Liberal Party of Australia, the selected Liberal Party candidate.

- Mr James Cope, M.H.R. for Watson (one of the recently abolished seats), the selected and endorsed Labor candidate.

The present Member for the district—Mr Bill O'Connor, M.H.R. — failed to secure his Party's endorsement for the forthcoming elections.

Ald. Origlass has been an Alderman of this municipality for just on 11 years.

He is an ironworker, and is a member of the Federated Ironworkers' Union. He stood as independent Labor candidate at the last State elections.

He and Ald. Wyner were expelled from the A.L.P. following the controversy over installation of chemical tanks in the Balmain residential area.

They formed the Balmain-Leichhardt Labor Party (whose three nominees won the Balmain Ward seats at the last Leichhardt Municipal election).

Ald. Origlass is a long-standing Balmain resident, his family having settled here.

Mort Street. If that becomes a permanent arrangement it would be a nightmare for local people.

He suggested that consideration be given to sharing the load of traffic between Mort Street and Church Street.

In view of this new strain on roads of the area he deplored the permission given by Leichhardt Council at its last meeting for extensions to be made to the store of F. H. Stephens Pty. Ltd. at Mort Bay.

This involved erection of a two-storey building in Bay Street for receiving, storing and transferring cargo from

the Tasmanian Ferry terminal and for use as offices.

The heavy traffic from that terminal was already having a serious effect on residential amenity, said Ald. Wyner. Residents were complaining continuously about vibration of houses, noise, and intersection traffic hazards.

That danger would be added to tremendously by the two developments.

**Ald. Origlass said that the traffic problem created by the location of the new terminal at Mort Bay was the main objection to the development.**

The set-up was objectionable because of the

inadequate road system — narrow streets, sharp climbs, and clashing with other traffic at the main intersections.

The conditions would prove his assertion that the decision to locate a container terminal in the area was wrong.

If traffic to and from the terminal were confined to daytime, said Ald. Origlass, local residents would be better off than those at White Bay because their sleep would not be so disturbed.

However, the system of container shipping involved quick turn-around, so it could not be guaranteed that traffic would be mainly in the daytime.

### COUNCIL — OR ADMINISTRATOR?

News of a possible Council deficit of \$154,300 for the year 1969 must be of great comfort to the residents who contribute a rate in the dollar higher than practically any other suburb in Sydney!

From a surplus in 1965 to a big loss in 1969 shows conclusively that something is wrong.

Council constantly fails to explain to the ratepayers any of the reasons for their decisions which materially affect the future of this suburb.

Recently they rejected a \$270,000 bid for the East End land and again failed to notify the shareholders—that is, the ratepayers—of their reasons for the rejection.

Surely with this possible \$154,300 deficit and some thought to a rate alteration the people should be told WHY?

Acceptance of the offer would have squared any loss and substantially added to the working capital.

This sale would allow the present rate to remain and even show a little promise towards a future reduction.

As we have said so many times before—why are developers showing so little interest here? The more development we get the greater the Council's income, and the greater the income the sooner we can hope for an end to these crazy rates.

One can hardly keep from wondering whether an administrator could not handle the municipality's affairs in a more efficient way and secure developers' confidence.

It's all very well to have a large suburb with a few people. But it's costly and hardly warrants our suburban rating of D7.

Costs here should make this suburb A1.

## STAN NICHOLSON PASSES ON

With the death last Friday of Mr Stan Nicholson, Balmain lost a prominent citizen, Balmain youth a champion, and Sydney water transport a colourful figure.

Mr Nicholson died at his home in Louisa Road after a short illness, at the age of 78.

He leaves a widow, Laurel, whom he married in Honolulu three years ago. His first wife, Emily, died in 1961.

A modest and quiet man, he was nevertheless a leader of the community. He served for many years on the board of Balmain Hospital, and was a prominent figure in State Masonic circles.

With his brother, Eric—who died over two years ago—he commenced the water transport firm of Nicholson Bros. when he was 19.

The firm operated the Balmain ferry service for many years. Using the "Pro" class ferries (such as the Promote), it took over the Balmain service from Sydney Ferries in 1939.

They sold the business and retired some years ago.

With no children of his own, Stan Nicholson nevertheless was extremely interested in children and sponsored the formation of Snails Bay Sabot Sailing Club, of which he was commodore.

Mr Murray Churton, a keen worker for Balmain youth, told "The Link" that in Mr Nicholson's death sailing had lost a friend.

Some nine years ago when he saw a Sabot in Snails Bay and thought it a wonderful little boat.

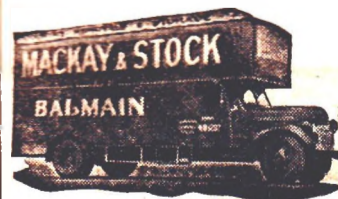

# Hospital To Get Better Air Conditioning

Latest step in the series of improvements planned for Balmain Hospital is installation of a new air conditioning plant for its lower operating theatres, at a cost of \$10,000.

The Hospitals Commission recently made a grant available for the purpose, and the Department of Public Works has accepted a tender to instal a complete new air conditioning plant for the operating area on the lower ground floor of the Booth Street building.

Mr K. R. J. Boylan, Chief Executive Officer, said that for some time the hospital had been concerned with the inadequate air conditioning facilities in its lower operating theatres.

When the new plant was installed the three theatres and the adjoining service areas would be air conditioned to provide ideal temperature control for both patients and staff.

Mr Boylan said a considerable amount of heat was generated in operating theatres by the lighting equipment necessary, and by the fact that there were often a considerable number of individuals involved in an operation for as long as four or five hours.

In such conditions there was a steady build-

up of heat.

For the welfare of patients the ideal temperature in an operating theatre was 70-75 deg.

The new equipment would permit that to be secured, as well as to control humidity.

That would be a big improvement for everybody concerned.

## Pink Ladies

The "Pink Ladies" scheme of voluntary workers, to assist the regular staff in the day-by-day running of the hospital, is functioning successfully.

They are known as Pink Ladies because they wear a pink uniform provided by the hospital to distinguish them from the regular staff.

Fifteen local women residents are now making their services available at times suitable to themselves.

Both the staff and patients are expressing appreciation of the practical assistance given by them.

In turn, the Pink Ladies are happy in their work, which they find rewarding.

Their duties include some aspects of personal service to patients, such as plaiting hair and attending to finger nails.

Some are even assisting in the conduct of the outpatients' department at peak periods, saving nurses' time by performing vital messenger duties.

One aspect of their service is to lend a sympathetic ear to patients when this is called for, which could be a decisive factor in the rate of recovery.

While the nursing staff of any hospital is trained to do this, particularly in the case of the elderly, a busy nurse cannot always find the occasion convenient.

This is where a Pink Lady, with time on her hands, can be invaluable. And this is being demonstrated at Balmain.

The Matron, Miss J. MacLaren, told "The Link" that the kindly attitude of the Pink Ladies is playing an important role in the care of the sick in the hospital.

She said that there were still some vacancies for Pink Ladies, especially for duty on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays or Mondays.

"Chicka" made some perfect tackles until his enforced retirement at half time.

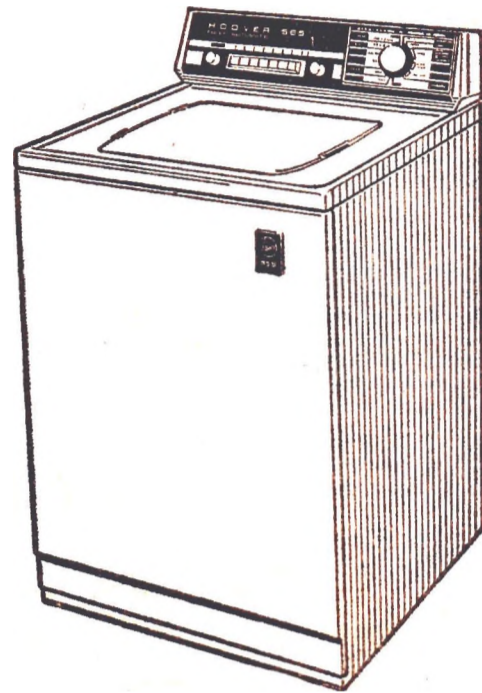
