Terminal Problems Under Attack

An encouraging development in the war against interference with the comfort of Balmain residents by container terminal nuisances is the decision by the Maritime Services Board to introduce regulations governing undue emission of smoke from vessels in port.

The announcement by the Board's President, Mr W. H. Brotherson, precedes an interview being arranged with the Premier (as titular head of the M.S.B.) or his representative by the Smoke Abatement Panel of Leichhardt Council.

The Council desires to lay before the Premier its views on the terminal nuisances.

The decision by the Board is in line with this paper's insistence last month that the Board should have full power, by regulation if necessary, to control the situation.

That Soot

We pointed out on that occasion that since the M.S.B. was not armed with legal power to control undue emission of smoke, it should be so armed.

The decision followed the recent emergencies in which two different vessels berthed at the White Bay terminal showered the district with oily soot, causing considerable damage as well as intense discomfort to residents.

The ships were Discovery Bay (P. & O. Company, local agent), and Australian Endeavour (one of the two new A.N.L. vessels initiating that Line's container service).

Both are powered by remote-controlled fully-automated oil-fired steam turbines.

The A.N.L. advised last week that it was

awaiting a report from its technical experts. When contacted the other day it had not yet received the report.

All it could say at this stage was that the incident was believed to be due to a mechanical fault, and certainly was something that had happened involuntarily.

Observers feel that the blame lies with the computerised remote-control system which operates the engines.

"You know what computers can do at the start" was their succinct comment.

M.S.B. Board President, Mr Brotherson, told "The Link" he understood it had been admitted that there had been an engine failure that had brought about the emergency.

The master of one ship had told him that there was a technical problem involved.

Mr Brotherson felt there would be no further trouble when the ships were properly run in.

Awareness

He was confident the shipping interests would do all in their power to prevent an occurrence.

However, when regulations governing the matter had been introduced, they would serve to arouse a greater awareness by shipping interests of their responsibilities.

Mr Brotherson added that it would take a while to frame the regu-

lations. Meanwhile he believed the shipping interests would co-operate to the maximum extent.

The Mayor of Leichhardt, Ald. L. Rodwell, reports that the Premier (Mr Askin) or his representative will receive a deputation from the Council's Smoke Abatement Advisory Panel regarding the problem.

Deputation

This panel is composed of Leichhardt aldermen, the Municipal Health Surveyor and Building Inspector (Mr R. S. Williams), and representatives of Government and semi-Government bodies and outside experts.

Ald. Rodwell said the Council felt that conditions appeared to demonstrate a total disregard of the community's interests.

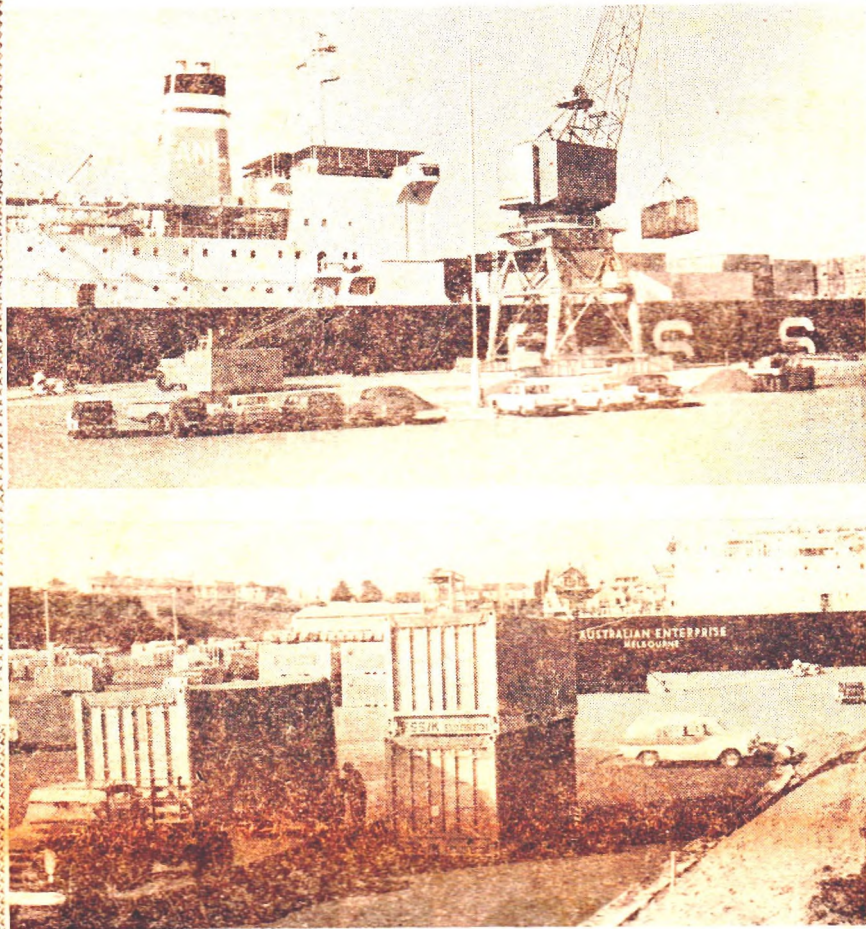
He added that the Minister for Local Government and Highways (Mr Morton) had also agreed to meet Council's representatives on the subject of roads and traffic on the Balmain peninsula, particularly in the Mort Bay area.

"The Government is doing nothing to assist in the solution of the problems created by containerisation", he said.

"Conditions couldn't get worse than they are now. Something must be done to relieve the pressure on the Balmain streets by the heavy trucks serving the Mort Bay terminal.

Association's New Approach On Planning Scheme

Leichhardt Council has refused to reconsider the request by The Balmain Association to hear its objections to the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

The Association has now asked Council at least to take its views into consideration when reviewing the final scheme before re-submission to the Minister.

In a letter to the Town Clerk, the Association's President, Mr W. J. Haesler, said it was extremely disappointed to receive the refusal, particularly since it had received assurances from both the Minister for Local Government (Mr Morton) and the State Planning Authority that it would be proper for Council to do so if it desired.

The Association still believed that, in its assessment of the Plan, it had indicated certain aspects which would not be covered by individual objections.

It seemed only fair to Balmain residents that Council consider these along with the other objections currently being heard.

Mr Haesler referred particularly to objections regarding:

- Landscaping of dead-end streets.

- Acceptance of the need for more open space in an area consisting of busy narrow streets.

- Acceptance of the need for recognition of the self-regeneration of residential Balmain.

- Need for separation of general maritime industry and housing by provision of buffer zones or appropriate planning.

- A realistic approach to the preservation of the "Toreshore scenic protection area".

All these items had not been fully covered by the Plan and could not be included in objections by individuals.

Mr Haesler added:

"We earnestly request that, even if Council will not 'hear' our point of view regarding these matters, it will at least take them into consider-

ation when reviewing the final scheme before re-submission to the Minister.

"We believe that such consideration is vital to the living amenity of the Balmain peninsula, where large-scale industrial development is causing irreparable damage to the area, which is also in danger of a like fate as a result of indiscriminate and unco-ordinated residential re-development.

"The Council in the past has shown its willingness to lead in Local Government by interesting itself in noise abatement and air pollution.

"We consider it could again lead by showing an awareness of the need for better town planning at local level—a subject now recognised as being essential for the future of the whole of the Sydney region".

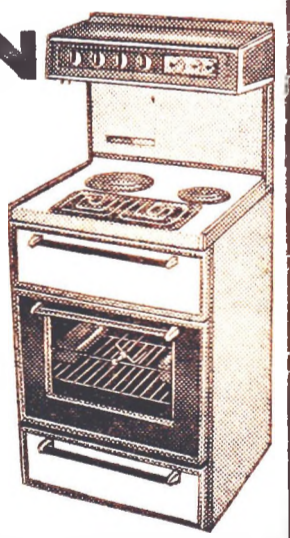

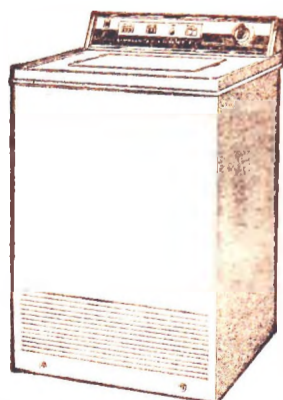

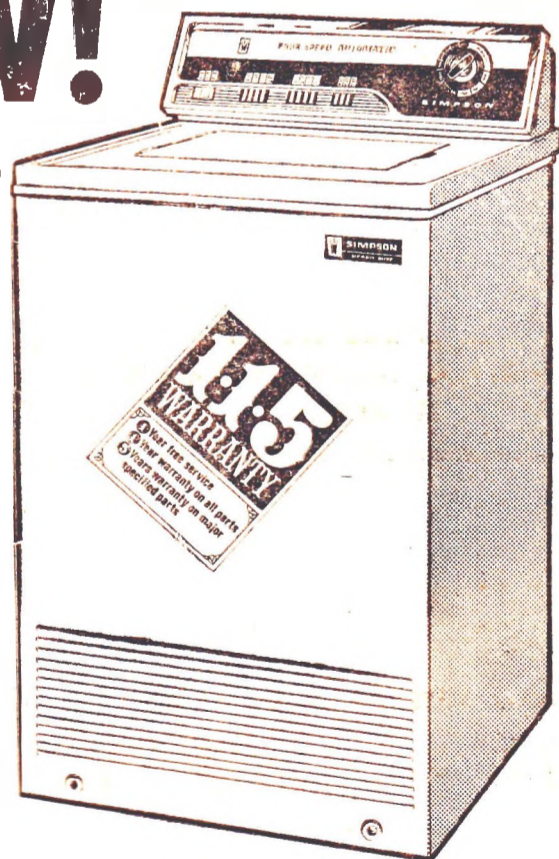

New Tenders To Be Called For East Balmain Land

Leichhardt Council has decided to call fresh tenders from private developers for the purchase and development of the unused land in the Balmain East housing project.

The decision follows the recent motion not to accept any of the eight tenders already received for the project.

The rejection was considered by observers to be the result of a feeling by Council that the prices tendered were not sufficient.

The land has been valued at \$176,000, and is owned by the Council, which had planned to use it in its municipal housing scheme, of which the "Yuruga" flats project was the first stage.

The tenders which were rejected had been accompanied by proposals for the construction of blocks of home units on the land, and ranged from \$220,000 to \$270,000.

One tenderer had offered an alternative higher price for maximum development. Another had offered three schemes with the purchase price rising in accordance with the intensity of development permitted.

The Mayor, Ald. L. Rodwell, told "The Link" that the questions of site coverage and of foreshore protection would be kept closely in mind when tenders were being considered.

It was the Council's desire that development should be along lines which would "Do Balmain proud".

The area was a desirable one, and the policy of foreshore protection was important. Development would have to conform to the Council's scenic code,

which still allowed an excellent site coverage.

Ald. Rodwell said that land values were rising all over Sydney. The indication from local real estate people was that values had not reached their ceiling in the Balmain area.

Whether that would affect tenders, however, was not known.

Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain ward) said he was looking forward to seeing the report of Council's officers, which was to lay down precisely the covenants and terms to govern land use.

He thought land use should be kept below 33 1/3 per cent. He did not favour permitting greater land use simply in order to induce a higher price, as that would be bad for the area.

COUNCIL ACTS ON INEQUALITY IN WARD SIZES

Leichhardt Council had made another approach to the Government in regard to the manner of dividing the municipality into wards and the number of aldermen to represent each.

Council adheres to its former decision to retain six wards and to reduce the number of aldermen for each from three to two.

However, to meet an objection by the Department of Local Government that the size of Glebe ward has produced inequality in the size of the wards, it favours transferring part of Glebe ward to the Annandale ward.

The matter was raised originally by the Minister for Local Government and Highways (Mr Morton), who desired to tidy up the situation created by the break-up of the City Council's area.

That involved the addition of Glebe to Leichhardt municipality.

The Minister is known to favour a reduction in the numbers of wards and/or aldermen, considering that large Councils are too unwieldy.

The Balmain-Leichhardt Labor Party (whose three representatives were elected for the Balmain ward) had made representations to the Minister urging that the municipality could be more satisfactorily divided into five wards, represented by three aldermen each.

It claimed that this would eliminate the present disparity in the number of electors in certain wards.

The subject of inequality was raised by the Acting Under-Secretary of the Department of Local Government, Mr F. E. Pogson, in his reply to the Council's letter asking for six wards with two aldermen each.

He suggested consideration of the transfer of part of Glebe ward to Annandale ward.

The Council decided to agree with that suggestion.

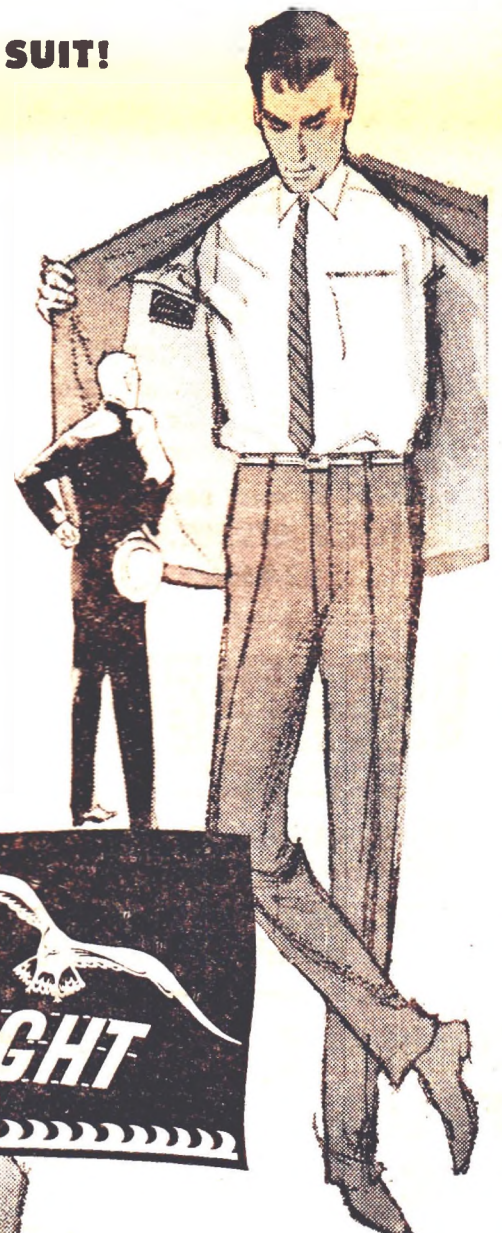

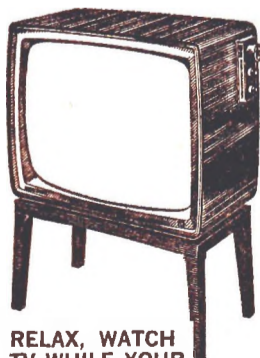
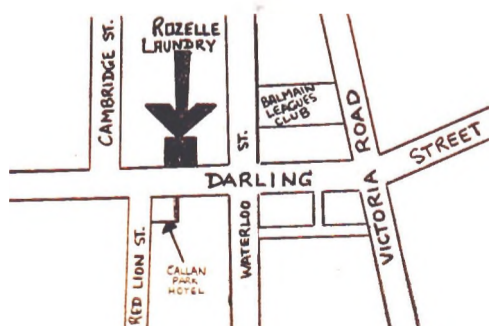

The coin-operated washers will be working from 7 o'clock in the morning until 10 at night, from Monday to Saturday, and from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Sundays.

There is no capital outlay in using the laundry as there is with owning a washing machine.

There is no installation or maintenance cost in-

volved and, of course, the biggest saving is in time.

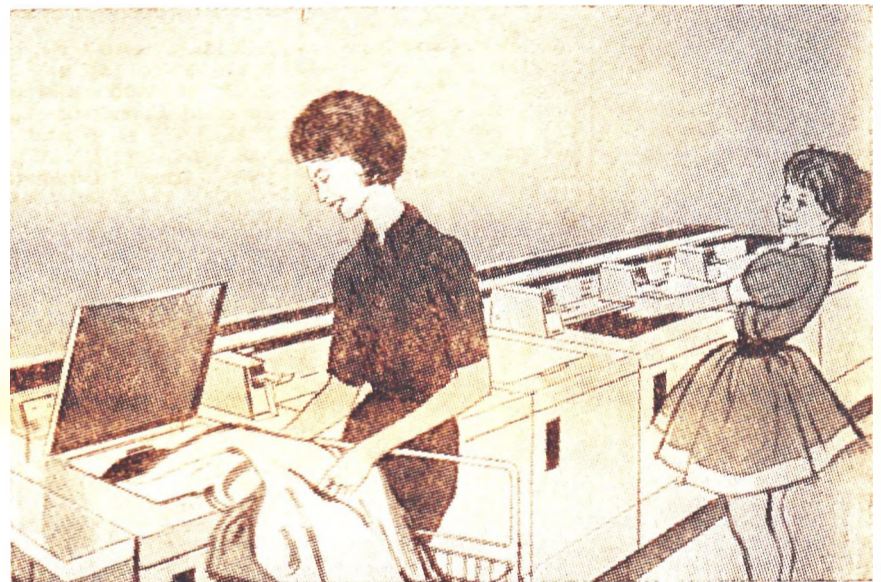
Tremendous Saving

when addressing 80 dele-
gates from 25 national
migrant groups compris-
ing the Council, which
helps migrant families
with their problems.

He said that during
family emergencies, like
a mother's illness, the
Department paid for a
housekeeper to live with
the family for a short
time, or even to come
daily.

It paid for home aids
to do heavy housework
once or twice a week for
convalescent mothers, or
aged or invalid people.
Fees were charged those
who could afford them.

Families made desti-
tute by fire, flood or
other disaster were given
blankets, tents, clothing
and cash.

Mr Hewitt said irreg-
ular attendance at school
by children might result
from truancy, parental
apathy, physical or men-

tal illness, or a family
disaster.

"My department is re-
quired to ensure that
such children attend reg-
ularly", he said. "This
enables early discovery
of, and attention to, the
causes.

"The Department, with
the Education and
Health Departments, al-
lots subsidies to help
mentally handicapped
people, such as those to
charities to provide
schools and accommo-
dation, and to pay for
the school teachers' sal-
aries".

CONFERENCE ON TERMINAL PROBLEMS SOUGHT

A special conference between the various authorities involved in Balmain container terminal problems is sought by Ald. N. Origlass, Independent Labor candidate for the seat of Sydney at the forthcoming Federal elections.

He said this week it would not be sufficient for Leichhardt Council simply to interview the Premier, as titular head of the M.S.B.

He wanted a special meeting of Council to be convened, and to invite to it representatives of the container ship operators, Maritime Services Board and the Police Traffic Branch.

"At last meeting of Council", he said, "Ald. Wyner and I tried unsuccessfully to have this

special meeting called. "Ald. Wyner moved, and I seconded, a motion to call such a meeting for the purpose of protecting Balmain against the inimical operations at White Bay and Mort Bay terminals.

Worries

"We declared that experience of the terminals' operations clearly vindicated the stand by the Balmain people that such operations were completely incompatible with the residential area into which they have been thrown.

"The constant flow of trucks and trailers, whether container-laden or not, over the very inadequate street system,

is promoting speedy deterioration of the road pavement, constant threat of serious accidents to normal vehicular and pedestrian traffic, and the complete negation of the people's right to the quiet enjoyment of their neighbourhood amenity unpolluted by noise, vibration and fumes.

"Truck operations outside the ordinary working day of eight hours seriously aggravates the already indefensible destruction of people's rights.

The arrogant disregard of people by the container shipping lines using the terminals by releasing to the atmosphere great volumes of greasy soot, which is destructive of paintwork, clothing, gardens, etc., requires immediate punitive deterrents".

Ald. Origlass said he had put on the Council's business paper a request that Council ask the Premier, as Ministerial head of the M.S.B., for punitive action to be taken by the Board against offenders, and that the penalties be high enough to constitute a real deterrent.

If the Board did not have regulations to handle the matter, he added, it was high time that it did.

"BETTER GO" SOUGHT FOR PENSIONERS

Mr Graham Robertson, Liberal candidate for Sydney, said this week that one of his main aims, if elected, would be to get "A better go" for old age pensioners.

"This is a very worn theme for a budding politician to use", he said, "But my idea ties in with the plea of Mr Bury, Federal Minister for Labor and Industry, for more labor for Australia".

Mr Robertson said that the idea he had been trying to get over for years was that a pensioner should be entitled to earn (including his pension) the basic award rate of his industry.

That would restore the dignity of many pensioners who, on retiring and collecting the pension, found they were quite able and actually wanted to continue working on a part time basis.

It would also mean that people on superannuation would be entitled to the pension. This would not involve complete abolition of the means test, hence would become a practical proposition for the Government.
