Alderman Has Idea For Big Saving

A proposition to save Leichhardt Council a million dollars has been propounded by Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain ward). It involves the residue of Council's East Balmain housing project land.

Ruled out of order at last week's meeting of Council when he sought deferment of the calling for tenders for purchase of the land, he countered with a motion to rescind the decision to sell the land.

He did this to give himself an opportunity to press his new idea. The rescission motion has been set down for consideration at next meeting.

In a statement to "The Link", Ald. Origlass said he wanted the Council's Town Planner to report on the scheme, which he was confident would serve everybody's purposes — those of the Council, local residents, and the community generally.

Open Space

He said that in the present state of the Council's finances, the scheme would be extremely helpful.

His suggestion was:

1. Abandon the plan to extend open space between Nicholson and

Duke Streets.

2. Preserve as open space the housing project land at present undeveloped.

3. Sell to present occupiers or previous owners, at reasonable prices, the occupied houses on the Council's land at Balmain East.

4. Abandon Gallimore Avenue extensions.

5. Sell the big house acquired to permit of the Gallimore Avenue extensions.

Ald. Origlass said the present cost of acquiring the 23 houses involved in the Nicholson-Duke Sts. open space scheme would be approximately \$307,000.

In 15 years' time this would be likely to rise to a million dollars at the present rate of increase in values.

There was no possibility of acquiring those houses before then under the Planning Scheme.

Not having to proceed with the Gallimore extensions would save about \$20,000, and the sale of the big house

mentioned would realise \$25,000.

Ald. Origlass said that if Council sold its housing land to developers, at, say, \$250,000, it would still be committed to an expenditure of more than a million dollars.

If the land were sold and units built on it by developers, the occupiers would not benefit from the open space between Nicholson and Duke Sts. for a long time, since this was only a future prospect.

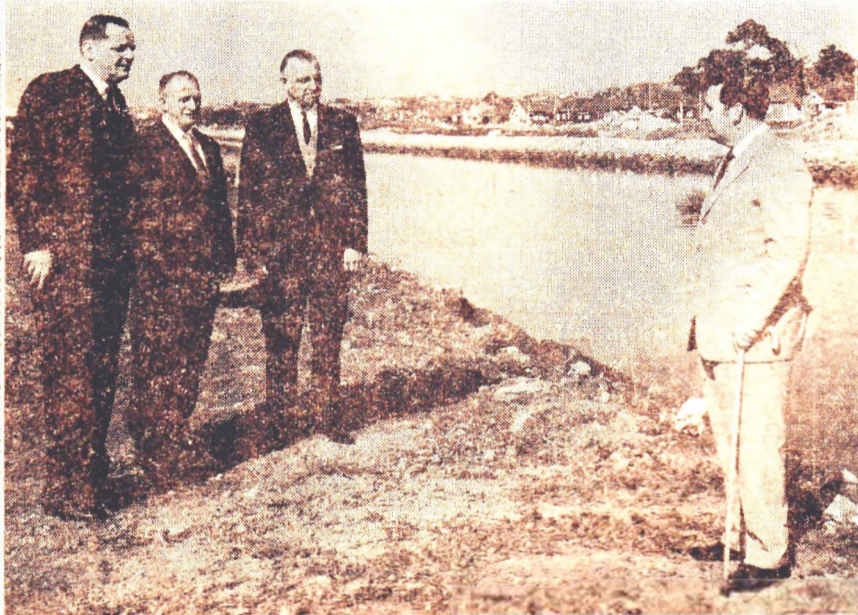
Benefits

The alderman added that the alternative along the lines he suggested would provide open space near the waterfront immediately.

It would avoid interference with about 100 present residents, save the cost of extending Gallimore Avenue, and safeguard the amenity of residents of Nicholson and Simmons Streets.

Extension of Gallimore Avenue would inevitably produce a lot of

After the inspection, Ald. Sutherland said that upgrading of the canal was 65 per cent complete.

He explained that silting of the bed of the canal had retarded effective stormwater flow and had resulted in a generally untidy appearance.

A joint beautification committee, composed of the Water Board, Maritime Services Board, and Leichhardt and

Ashfield Municipal Councils had been formed to consider means of overcoming the problem.

It was decided to spend \$400,000 on a programme which involved restoration of part of the canal, dredging, re-building of sidewalls and construction of about 600 ft of concrete channel downstream from the footbridge below Marion Street. The Water Board is contributing half the cost.

Dredging of the canal is 80 per cent complete. The whole job is scheduled for completion in 1971.

Completion of this work should (as reported in "The Link" last year) help in solving the problem of siltation of Iron Cove, which has had offensive results in the harbour at low tide.

traffic along it.

Council would save demolition fees, purchase fees, and cost of levelling and landscaping.

"More open space is desirable", said Ald.

Origlass. "However, this is one of the areas indicated on the Municipal Plan for additional open space.

"Adoption of this scheme would assure us of the open space called

for and would leave people undisturbed in their homes.

"Council should have a look at this idea, as well as its proposal to sell its housing land to developers".

Complaints of Smoke, Noise

Balmain residents complained last week of still another case of offensive smoke emission from a ship moored at the White Bay container terminal.

It was reported to have come from the vessel Moreton Bay, and to have continued for some hours.

Residents told reporters that the smoke had sometimes been black and at other times bluish and whitish.

The ships' officers were reported to have expressed sympathy for residents, saying they had done their best to prevent annoyance, but to have said that they had broken no regulations.

Leichhardt Council hopes to have an interview shortly with a representative of the Premier (Mr Askin) to press for action to prevent incidents of this sort.

Meanwhile, as already reported in "The Link", the Maritime Services Board has advised that it is framing regulations governing undue emis-

sion of smoke from vessels in port.

Factory

Measures are expected to be taken soon by the Education Department to prevent undue noise from equipment at its furniture factory in Little Nicholson Street, Balmain East.

A local resident, Mr C. F. Dalleywater, told "The Link" that he had been advised that tenders had been called by the Department to mitigate conditions.

He said that the factory had been there a long time, but had not created annoyance until it was reorganised by the Education Department.

Equipment installed to remove and burn wood chips was creating such a noise that it had seriously affected his wife's health.

Federal Election Candidates Speak

D.L.P. "People First" Policy

The Democratic Labor Party's candidate for the seat of Sydney — Mrs Norma F. Boyle — said this week that she would keep a particular eye on local problems.

"The D.L.P.", she said, "pledges to maintain the residential areas and preserve the foreshores of our harbour."

"All foreshores would be reserved solely for the public, and not for a selected few, or even Government establishments".

Mrs Boyle said the D.L.P.'s main policy planks were as follows:

It would:

- Strive for the formation of new economic and defence alliances "to protect you and yours" in a world full of dangers.

- Fight for modern policies to help Australian families by easier home ownership, increased endowment, and up-to-date education available to every child.

- Hasten the introduction of the D.L.P.'s national insurance scheme.

- Provide complete hospital, medical and dental care.

- Eliminate the means test in three annual stages.

- Take pensions rights out of politics.

- Attack inflation and rising prices, which were destroying the standards of families and those on fixed income.

Ald. N. Origlass ("Set-Labor-Free Campaign") insists that defence of true Labor principles, and that "People Come First", must be recognised if Labor is to be any use to the people.

"I believe", he said, "that the thinking voter looks for evidence that the candidate will not cave in under pressure and let the people down, and that he will reject time-serving Yes-men."

"Any determined stand for genuine Labor principles and for people's rights cannot fail to have good result, even if not immediately obvious."

"Since my expulsion by the A.L.P. officials, there have been no further expulsions for opposition to caucus decisions, whether good or bad."

"I know of at least four cases of aldermen openly voting against caucus decisions—and no expulsions".

Ald. Origlass recalled that he received about 7,000 votes in the last State elections, and said that a similar percentage in the Sydney electorate would yield some 14,000 votes.

A similar figure was indicated for the Liberals.

In that case the official A.L.P. vote would be below 50%, and the result would depend on the preference votes.

He offered apologies to anyone he had been unable to call on personally or who had not been home when he called.

Mr Robertson said he had had a personal letter from the Prime Minister saying that the Government undertook to finance a full programme for teaching English to migrants.

It would pay for employment of information officers to tell migrants of the benefits available to them.

Existing facilities for teaching English to adult migrants would be expanded.

Special English classes would be held in schools for migrant children of all ages, and intensive full-time English language courses would be provided for those who must know English in order to follow their occupations".

The Government would propose to State Governments that grants be made through municipal authorities to subsidise employment of people to provide information and guidance for migrants.

ASSOCIATION TO REPORT ON BALMAIN HOUSING

The Balmain Association is working on a further report which it hopes will show how the various types of housing can be combined to give Balmain a distinctive character.

It will aim to preserve what is good, and replacing what is bad with harmonious housing types suited to the geography of the peninsula.

In its latest news sheet the Association says that the recent report prepared by its architectural sub-committee on residential development on the Balmain peninsula pointed out the need for a realistic look at the problems of the present system of housing development.

"We must recognise", the Association says, "That a lot of new building will take place in the next few years in this area."

"Judging by most of the efforts to date, much of it will be environmentally and aesthetically bad."

"The reason for this can be found in the lack of understanding by

municipal authorities of the problem and its application to inner suburban areas.

"This is not peculiar to our Council, but is common to the whole of Sydney."

"Planners are becoming increasingly aware of the need for new bylaws to control new types of development, and the State Planning Authority has provided some initiative in recent planning scheme ordinances."

"We believe, however, that by the time the recommendations filter down to local government level it will be too late."

"Unless the people controlling Balmain are made aware of the problem and given some way of finding a solution, the area will become another sprawl of uncoordinated flats and housing."

The Association's biggest single project to date—restoration of the Watch House—is demanding a more intensive effort from members, with the official opening scheduled for next April.

Members are being asked to help, even if only in a small way.

Regular working bees are held every second Saturday, next one being October 18. Sunday working bees are also becoming more frequent.

An antique lamp has been provided for the charge room by Mr Len Barton. It is a hanging one, originally using kerosene, and is of the period when the charge room was in use.

Members are being asked to keep a protecting eye on the building. During the school holidays newly repaired upstairs windows were smashed by vandals.

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR A PENSION?

Under the new Tapered Means Test many people become eligible for a pension for the **first time**.

The Government wants to pay pensions to everybody entitled to them, but it cannot do so **unless people claim**.

You can get a Claim Form at any Post Office, or at any office of the Social Services Department.

Men over 65, women over 60, and invalids over 16 who have lived in Australia for the qualifying period are eligible for a pension if their Means as Assessed are under **\$40 per week** (single) or **\$70 per week** (married couples). People with dependent children may get pensions even beyond these limits.

A widow, divorcee or deserted wife who has lived in Australia for the qualifying period may be eligible for a pension if her Means as Assessed are less than —

- \$36.50 per week (no children and over 50)**
- \$57.00 per week (1 dependent child)**
- \$68.00 per week (2 dependent children)**
- \$79.00 per week (3 dependent children)**
- \$90.00 per week (4 dependent children) etc.**

These amounts will be higher by \$4 a week if the pensioner has a child under 6 or an invalid child requiring full time care. (If her Means as Assessed consist mainly of assets the amounts may be lower.)

Means as Assessed is —

Your earnings and other income (certain income, such as income from assets, is disregarded)

PLUS

Ten per cent of your assets (except your home and personal possessions) above certain exempt levels

Thus if you have no income except income from assets, you may be eligible for a pension if your assets are below these limits:

Age & Invalid

Single \$21,200

Married \$37,200

Widow

With children \$26,960

Without children \$19,380

CONTROL OF TOWING AFTER ACCIDENTS

Every N.S.W. tow truck operator and driver must now carry a special licence to undertake after-smash towing.

The N.R.M.A. says that the truck driver must show his driver's certificate to the owner when offering to tow a vehicle after a smash. He must also show it to the police if asked.

Before towing starts the owner or person in charge of the damaged vehicle must sign a towing authority.

This lists the name and address of the towing operator, the driver's name and certificate number, registration numbers of both tow truck and vehicle, where the machine is lifted and the location to which it is to be towed.

A tow truck driver cannot begin a tow unless he has in his possession a duly completed

signed authority, except in an extreme case, where the tow is necessary to clear the road of a traffic hazard and the vehicle is undriveable.

A copy of this authority must be given to the owner or driver of the damaged vehicle.

Should the owner be absent or incapacitated a policeman may sign the authority for the vehicle to be removed, but if this happens the vehicle must be towed to the nearest depot to which the tow truck driver has access or, alternatively, to a police station.

If the authority is signed by a policeman a copy must be sent on to the Commissioner of Motor Transport.

It is an offence for tow truck operators and drivers to give or offer any inducement to people reporting accidents to operators. This provision makes it illegal for operators to employ "spotters".

The Tow Truck Act applies only where vehicles are damaged in accident. It does not cover towing after mechanical breakdown.

\$52,000 Damage In Store Fire

Fire thought to be due to an electrical fault severely damaged the building and contents of Forster's Hardware store in Darling Street, Balmain, last Sunday night.

Owned by Mr Norm Forster, the store was rented by Mr William Hamilton, a young man who was formerly a Balmain plumber and who set up in this hardware business about three months ago.

Damage to the building is estimated at \$20,000, and to the contents about \$32,000 (not fully insured).

The blaze was first noticed by a local woman resident, who reported it to the Balmain fire brigade.

Six brigades fought the fire, and brought it under control in about half an hour, despite the heavy concentration of smoke.

Stock included highly inflammable items such as turpentine, kerosene, paint and linseed oil.

The owner advises that the shop will be rebuilt. Meanwhile the business will be carried on in the rear of the premises, entrance being from Trivett's Lane.

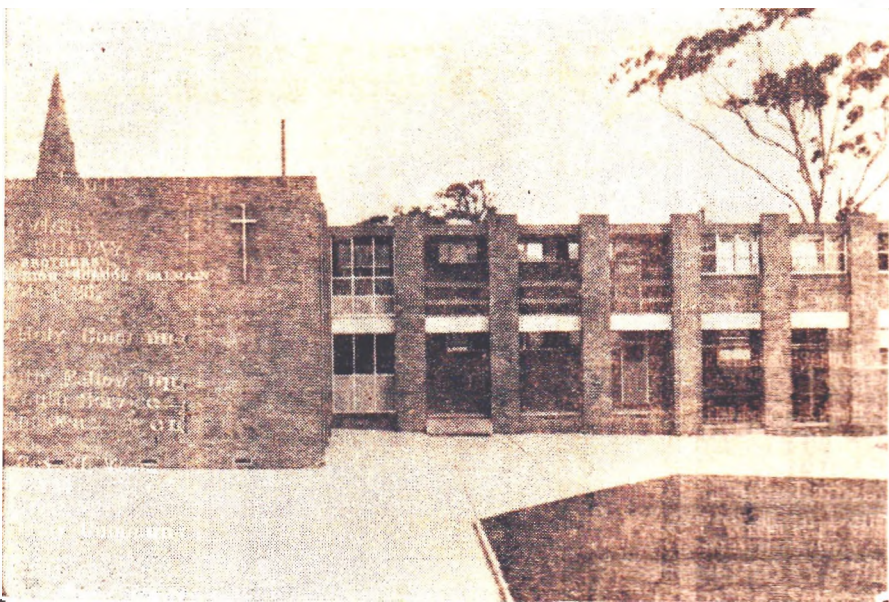
