Terminal Noises Still Vex Residents

Problems (especially noise) created by the two Balmain container terminals continue to exercise both the people of the district and official circles. There is still no sign of any real break-through in dealing with them.

Some local residents say that the promised relief from all-night noises in the handling of containers at White Bay has not come. They declare that, on the contrary, the noise is worse than ever, and is seriously affecting the health of some of them.

It is reported that three houses in Grafton Street have been sold to the Maritime Services Board (at VG plus 10 per cent), their owners having decided they could not live there any more because of the operating noises.

One resident told "The Link" that she had not had two full consecutive nights' sleep since the terminal opened, except when a strike kept it idle.

"The terminal operators promised us they would take measures to dampen down the noise", she said. "But I find it much worse now. It takes my breath away."

"I spoke to an acoustics engineer about the noises, and he thought they were structurally conveyed.

Bad Feeling

"We had hoped the men driving the crane and fork lifts would cooperate more in making our lives bearable, but some of them obviously do not. They seem to be making more noise than is necessary.

Balmain police have investigated reports of bad feeling being displayed by residents towards the terminal operators because of the night noises.

They report that in one instance a tin of paint was thrown from the street on to operators' cars parked in the terminal enclosure below, splashing them.

In another, two bricks tied together had been dropped on to a car, denting its roof.

Owing to lack of evidence the police took no action.

Inspector Rasmussen, officer in charge, told "The Link" that residents' complaints of noise had been investigated.

While there was definitely some cause for complaint, the conditions were not regarded as serious enough to warrant court action. Had it been warranted, action would have been taken by summons under Council by-laws.

Mort Bay

Operations at the new Mort Bay container terminal are not free of residents' complaints, although these are not nearly as bitter as those concerning the White Bay terminal.

Miss A. Lee, Vice-president of the Balmain-Leichhardt Labor Party, said that although she lived quite a way from the terminal, she would hear a "Banshee-like scream" from the spot.

She thought it came from a fork-lift, which handled the containers, and that it occurred every time the vehicle came to a halt.

Residents near the terminal also complained

about a loud buzzing at night, caused by the plugging of refrigerated cargoes into electric points in the terminal yard.

Mr E. W. Johnson, who lives beside the terminal, said the noise of ship generators at night was pronounced. He wondered if something could be done to minimise it.

Traffic

Leichhardt Council's Noise Abatement Advisory Panel has arranged for talks this week with the General Manager of the Australian National Line (Capt. Menzies) regarding Mort Bay problems of noise and traffic movement.

Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain ward) raised at last week's Council meeting the question of container traffic by road through Leichhardt Municipality.

He referred to a Sydney newspaper article which reported an increasing trend to the use of 40 ft. containers, instead of the 20 ft. type now in use in the Balmain trade.

These would create greater traffic problems, he said.

Also, he said, the situation would point still further to the lack of realism in locating container terminals in such a confined area as Balmain.

He was supported in this thought by the reported statement of Capt. G. H. Manley, of the Wilh. Wilhelmsen Agency Pty. Ltd., who

NEW TENDERS FOR EAST BALMAIN LAND ARE OPENED

The new tenders called by Leichhardt Council for the purchase and development of the unused land in the Balmain East housing project were opened last week.

Four tenders were received.

Prices ranged from \$236,000 to \$267,500. These compared with the range of \$220,000 to \$270,000 for the tenders rejected some months ago by Council.

At last Wednesday night's meeting of Council consideration of the tenders was deferred for a fortnight, to allow a report on them to be made by the Council's officers.

One tenderer submitted a model of the development he proposed, and there was a great volume of development plans submitted with the tenders.

The land in question has frontages to Darling and Nicholson Streets, and Brett, Gallimore and Lookes Avenues.

It has been valued at \$176,000, and is owned by the Council, which had planned to use it in its municipal housing scheme, of which the "Yuruga" flats project was the first stage.

The Mayor, Ald. Rodwell, has announced that the questions of site coverage and foreshore protection will be kept closely in mind when tenders are being considered.

Column NINE

TERMINAL NUISANCE

Our report this week of the despair felt by some local residents about White Bay terminal noises represents but a diplomatic summary of the strong feelings expressed by the people concerned.

That bad feeling should be shown towards those responsible for sleepless nights is perhaps to be expected, although strongly to be deplored. It will have to stop, at once, in everybody's interests.

Still, there is a growing duty on officialdom to step up efforts to quieten terminal operations.

We would have expected by this that either the Government or the courts would have insisted on real improvement, or else only day-time operations.

The longer this goes on without obvious action, the more incensed the people will be.

As expected, some local residents have sold their homes, to possibly the only buyer available — the Maritime Services Board.

We would like to think this is a charitable act, but we wonder if there's not something sinister behind it.

What a lot of people fear is that it is only the prelude to an extension into the hillside of the terminal area.

That would indeed be a shocking development, bringing far greater disturbance to Balmain's residential amenity than ever.

We would welcome an official statement on this.

Another fear is that, despite official assurances, the big shed is to extend further east, adding road traffic problems to that of noise.

Let's hope those friends of Balmain with any influence at all will keep their eyes on these possibilities.

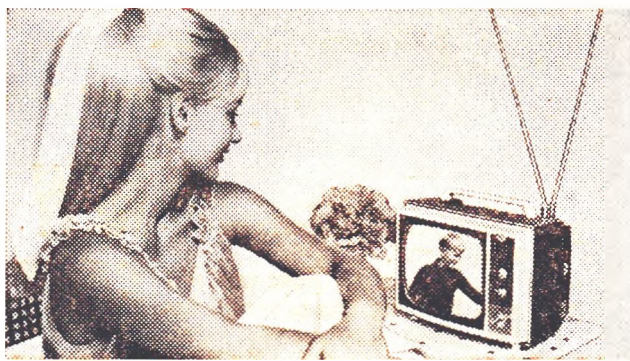
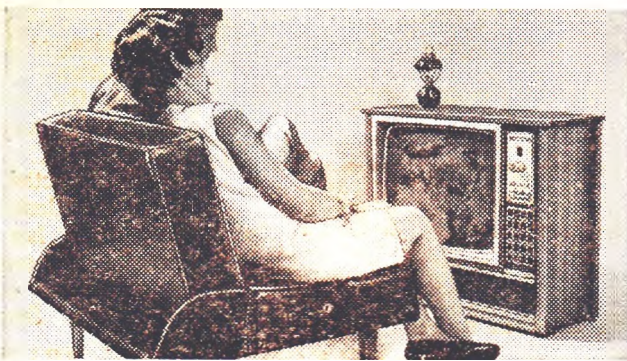

PHONE DELAY IN BALMAIN

Aggravated by delay in completion of extensions to Balmain telephone exchange, the waiting list for telephone connections in the Balmain district is now the longest in the metropolitan area.

A G.P.O. spokesman said the other day that there were 139 unfulfilled applications for a telephone service in the district.

The only other two suburbs with major waiting lists were Pendle Hill, with 52, and Kensington, 34.

The building extensions to Balmain Post Office were scheduled to cost \$162,980. They are to both the Post Office and telephone exchange, at the corner of Montague and Darling Streets.

They were due to be completed last March, but the excavators struck unexpectedly hard rock for the foundations, and this caused an 8-week delay.

The extension to the existing exchange comprises a single-storey

brick and reinforced concrete structure, with provision for two future floors above ground level.

The work included the addition of a single-storey postmen's room to the Post Office.

The extensions are nearing completion, but they will not be effective until next June, because the required equipment will not be available until then.

The G.P.O. spokesman said that when the new equipment was in use the waiting list would end.

There might be some relief meantime should the present trend of cancellations continue. These had totalled 344 in the past 12 months.

"However", he added, "Everybody these days seems to be putting the phone on".

CONCERN OVER HOSPITAL PATIENTS' FEES

Concern at the large amount owing to hospitals for patients' fees in regard to Workers' Compensation and Third Party accident cases was expressed by the President of the Board of Balmain Hospital, Mr. W. F. Pinerua, at the annual meeting of subscribers last week.

Mr Pinerua was commenting on the financial position of the hospital.

At the conclusion of the financial year \$177,152 was owed to the hospital for patients' fees. Of this amount Workers' Compensation and Third Party accident cases accounted for \$90,421.

Mr Pinerua said the position throughout N.S.W. in this respect was a cause for concern. The present method of financing, although improved to some extent, still left much to be desired.

The insurance companies were gaining the benefit of extended credit, whereas hospitals were unable to pay their ordinary creditors, on whom they had to rely so heavily for the proper conduct of the institution.

Like other hospitals, he said, Balmain Hospital endeavoured to recover ordinary patients' fees as quickly as possible, and in so doing had at times to resort to ordinary processes of the law.

In regard to Third Party cases and Workers' Compensation insurances, however, this was not possible.

Mr Pinerua felt this was a ludicrous situation.

In N.S.W. the amounts outstanding in 1967-68 for patients' fees totalled \$9,284,000. Of this, Workers' Compensation and T.P. accounted for \$895,652 and \$4,100,100 respectively.

Development

Mr Pinerua said in his annual report that the Board's time was largely taken up with replanning of the hospital in anticipation of monies being made available by the Hospitals Commission for extensive alterations.

They had not been idle in other spheres of development. Remodelling of the resident doctors' quarters had provided a

comfortable room for each doctor.

This was greatly appreciated, since they had often been required to share accommodation, causing unnecessary disturbance of one another.

The new medical records' room had fulfilled an urgent need, making patients' records easily accessible, adding to the hospital's ability to provide better patient care.

The Stacey House nurses' home had been refurbished throughout.

The Hospitals Commission had made special subsidy grants available for these major improvements.

Mr Pinerua said that an inspection of the administration, accounts and management of the hospital by the Hospitals Commission had re-

vealed a very satisfactory state of affairs, the inspector reporting that the hospital was functioning to the most economical degree.

In addition to the large amounts provided by the Commission, for maintenance and special projects, the Board acknowledged with thanks the individual gifts and assistance by the people and organisations of the district.

These had helped to provide not only the essentials, but extra amenities for patients.

He specially thanked the "energetic Auxiliary", as well as the "Pink Ladies"—a new organisation within the hospital, whose voluntary work was appreciated "more than words can express".

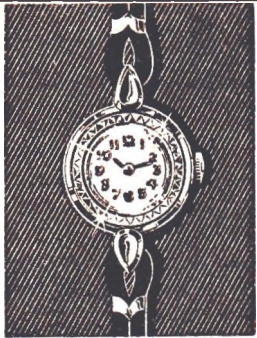

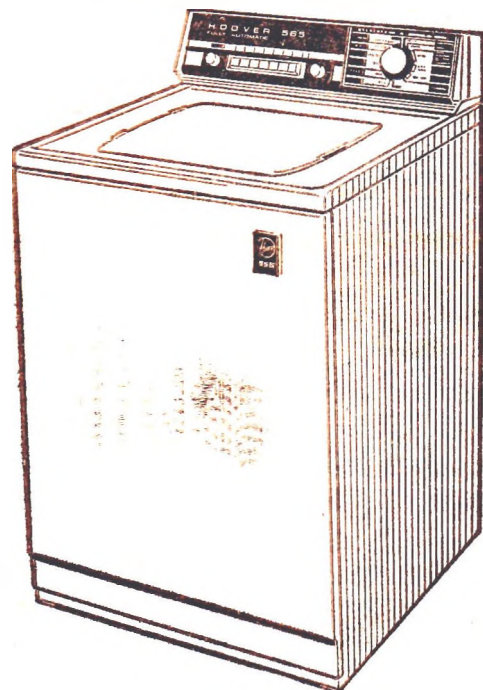

MORE FLIES TO COME WITH WARMER WEATHER

An increase in the fly population could follow recent rain and warm summer weather, according to Mr. H. Evans, Chief Health Inspector, N.S.W. Department of Public Health.

Flies are more than just a nuisance, he says. They are a very real danger to health. They are a threat to every household and family. They spoil food, and carry germs of many different diseases including gastro-enteritis and dysentery.

Flies deposit germs on food and utensils which may later be eaten or used by humans.

Flies are not selective eaters, relishing garbage and manure as much as the tastiest morsel on the family dinner plate.

Their favourite flight path is from the garbage can or refuse heaps

to the kitchen, where, attracted by cooking smells, they seek out uncovered food.

Humans who later eat this food eat the germs the flies have deposited on it also.

Insecticides should be used as a supplement, but never as a substitute for sanitation.

Make sure that the yard and the area around the home is clean and free of decaying vegetation and manure, especially if animals or

If there is a pan closet on the premises, place in each pan immediately it is received a half cupful of kerosene.

Make sure that the opening is fitted with a hinged lid, and that this is kept closed when the pan is not in use.
