year, normally carries a Christmas message. The editor, however, has allowed it to exceed its normal space because of the importance of the subject and its serious effect on Balmain.

The comments expressed here are intended to point out to everyone the unfairness of any increase in rates.

Unlike the Riviera, which is entirely for the rich, Balmain is a working man's suburb. Now this Council intends increasing the rates, apparently with little regard whether the working man can afford it.

It will cost you 30 per cent more to live here next year. Can you afford it? If not, kick now; don't cry later.

We hold top position in the rate race, and next year you can look forward to being elevated into the untouchable class.

Every facility or amenity that exists here was paid for by father or grandfather, and yet after all of their sacrifices we have inherited the most costly suburb in which to reside.

In the past Councils have failed to provide the needs of the suburb, and it appears that this Council has not learned by past mistakes.

Space is too limited here to elaborate on what is missing. Suffice to say that nothing constructive has been done, and not ONE election promise fulfilled.

It was stated last week that great things are expected from the new committees next year. Seems a strange thing that Council has been in office 12 months and there is still nowhere to park even a car. Yet we are expected to believe that big things will happen next year.

More than ever this area needs administration and control by a highly qualified, specialised per-

It is fully understood that every Council is more highly committed to semi-Government bodies than in previous years, but it is hard to reconcile increases in rates when for one thing the Mayoral allowance has been increased to \$70 a week.

Rather would it have shown leadership to have cancelled the allowance altogether and dispensed with entertaining until the business of adjusting the finances of this municipality are back on their feet.

A sick business needs a new ap-approach, NOT AN INCREASE IN PRICES. When its income is insufficient it must find ways of economising, providing better service and enticing new clients. And so with Councils-they must encourage developers, thereby gaining more customers and extra revenue.

The cost of administration and rates of this area need overhauling. If you agree, contact your local State Member, Mr Degen, and the Minister for Local Government. Mr Morton, and make them conscious of your concern. Real estate businesses surely

will regard this increase as unlikely to encourage developers. Commercial business houses will not jump for joy, to say nothing of the feelings of the private resident.

Not one move has been made to establish parking stations - no public library — less street cleaning - no beautification - no encouragement to developers: these are but a few of the things that have not been done.

When private business finds it cannot solve its financial problems it engages the services of an expert to put its house in order.
