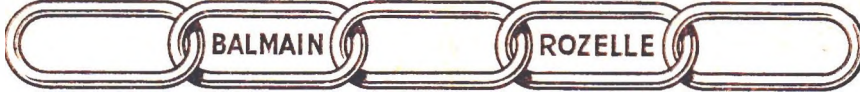

Complaints About Noise Not Very Successful

Residents' complaints about noise in the Mort Bay and nearby areas occupied the attention of both Leichhardt Council and the Balmain police last week. Results were not very encouraging to residents.

One cause of residents' complaints about noise has been the operation of Howard Smith Industries Pty. Ltd.'s ship repair workshops in Birchgrove.

Original Council approval was subject to restriction of hours of work, but this was varied by the Land and Valuation Court, which stipulated a limited period of operating outside the hours approved.

The Leichhardt Planning Scheme has tackled the question of a final determination of the hours' question, but since this has not yet been finalised the court has approved a further extension of time for operation outside the approved hours.

At last week's meeting of Leichhardt Council consideration was given to an application by the company for an extension of permission to work extended hours for general engineering, ship repairing and associated activities at its Water Street property.

On the recommendation of the Town Planner, Mr A. Kenna, Council granted permis-

sion for working extended hours for a further period of six months, terminating November 15 next, or the date of the prescription of the Leichhardt Planning Scheme, whichever is the shorter period.

Terminal

Council also considered a petition by Mr A. B. Bartlett and 53 others regarding noise from refrigerated containers at the A.N.L. container terminal at Mort Bay, and also from exhaust fans of container ships at the berth.

A letter from Mr R. Menzies, terminal manager for the A.N.L., said he felt sure that, by judicious handling of the containers, the line would overcome any noise complaints which had arisen in the past.

The Council's Health Surveyor, Mr R. S. Williams, thought the only solution of the problem was the use of suppressors, either on the motors or where the leads were plugged into the power points.

He reminded Council that it had no jurisdiction in regard to the question of exhaust fans on the container ships at the berth, although representations could be made to the A.N.L. for solution of the problem.

Council adopted a recommendation from the Town Planner, Mr A. Kenna, to refer the petition to the A.N.L. for its comment and advice as to what action it proposed to take to improve the situation.

Hotel Patrons

Inspector Rasmussen, officer in charge of Balmain police, told "The Link" the other day that close attention was being given to complaints of residents in the Mort Bay area regarding traffic problems created by hotel patrons.

He said that residents had protested against the noise made by these patrons when leaving the Forth and Clyde Hotel after the 10 p.m. closing hour, also against their monopoly of street parking space in the vicinity.

The inspector said patrols were keeping as close an eye on the situation as was possible with the limited number of men available.

They would take action in any instance of law-breaking.

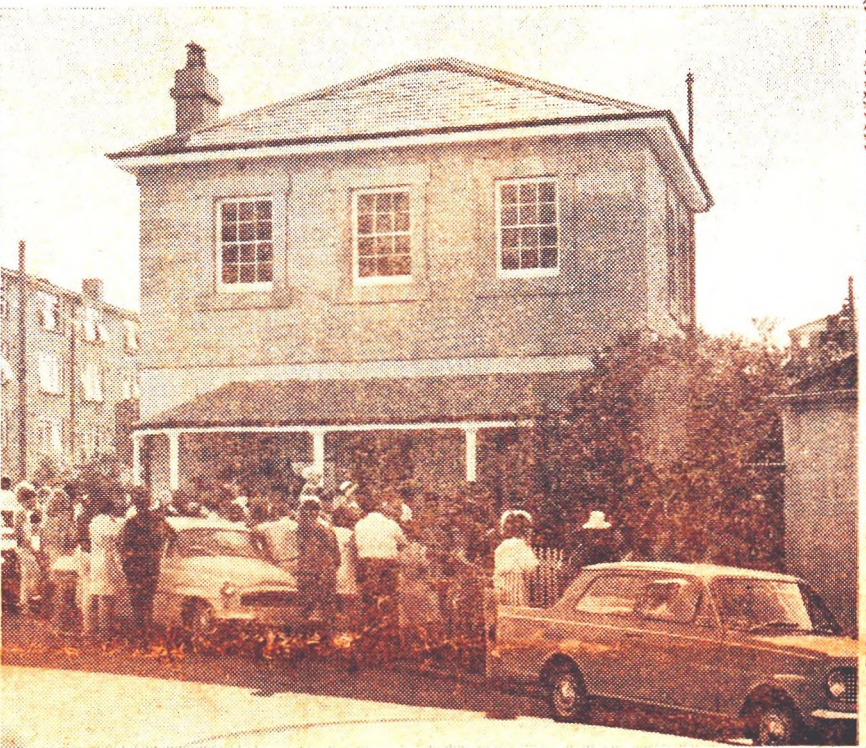
However, the problem appeared to be more a matter of insufficient traffic facilities in the region of the hotel, which was beyond the power of the police to control.

Mr Rasmussen said that this was the kind of problem faced by many inner suburbs of Sydney, especially those just north of the harbour, where visitors from outside the district swamped the local street parking resources.

As for the noise of starting up motor bikes and cars just after 10 p.m., nothing could be done, since it was a social rather than a legal problem.

Link With Early Days Is Renewed



This was the scene at the official opening of the restored Watch House in Darling Street, Balmain, last Sunday week (reported in our last issue).

CONFLICT OVER PLASTIC GARBAGE BAGS

Leichhardt Council's policy of refusing to accept residents' garbage in plastic bags will be reviewed at its next meeting, as a result of many complaints received by Council staff and aldermen.

At last week's meeting, it was decided to call for a special report on the subject.

It was reported to the meeting that a number

of people had been using plastic bags, contrary to the notice issued by circular to householders by the Council towards the end of 1969.

The bags had been left uncollected by the garbage collectors because their use was contrary to Council policy.

The Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell, said he had been inundated with complaints. Although many Councils are accepting the bags, others are not, and the subject is quite contentious.

On the one hand, it is submitted that the bags are hygienic and convenient.

On the other hand, the Council's Health Surveyor, Mr R. S. Wil-

liams, had raised objections to their use, for the following reasons:

- When garbage was taken to the Leichhardt tip a water spray was used to assist compaction in the big vehicles employed. That was not suitable when plastic bags were used.

- When left in the streets the bags could be attacked by animals and rats.

- If they contained broken glass or crockery there would be a danger to the garbage collectors when the bags were thrown from the ground to the men on the trucks. A tin was a protection in such conditions.

- There was a danger that children would take the bags for their play, creating a fear that they would be suffocated if they put them over their heads.

- When placed with other garbage, the bags did not rot.

Control Needed

We are by no means satisfied with the attitude of the local police to complaints by residents about the concentration of hotel patrons in the Mort Bay area, resulting in excessive noise, over-running of street parking space and footpath drinking.

If there is no law governing such conditions, there ought to be. Behaviour which creates extreme annoyance to residents is surely behaviour which the law should supervise closely.

Not only this area, but others on the Balmain peninsula suffer from what we consider is lack of sufficient police control.

Especially do many residents loathe footpath drinking, to which apparently the police close a blind eye.

Residents have a just complaint when police allow footpaths to be over-run with drinkers and take no action to curb excessive revving of motor vehicles, especially cycles.

It is highly embarrassing to many people to be forced to thread their way through a horde of footpath drinkers, many of whom are from other districts and frequent these places because there is no control here.

Something must be done about this growing menace.

However, the responsibility gets back to the State Government and the local Council, who have not taken one step to protect residents from such conditions.

Why should the breweries bother about building bigger hotels when they can carry on their business on the footpaths?

Street drinking does nothing for civic pride, and lowers the dignity of this area.

Our local Member, Mr Degen, should bring before the House the urgent need for legislation to cover the situation.

COUNCIL "NOTES" APPEAL ON POLLUTION

Leichhardt Council showed little apparent interest at its meeting last week in moves by Drummoyne Council to attack the menace of pollution.

It simply "Received and noted" letters from its neighbour and took no action on the subject raised.

An attempt by the Balmain aldermen — in the form of a motion by Ald. Wyner, seconded by Ald. Origlass and supported by Ald. Graham — to endorse the proposals outlined in the letters was defeated.

The Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell, said however that he had been approached by Drummoyne to attend a meeting on the subject, and he had promised to do so.

The letters which Council "Received and noted" were:

• One forwarding copies of minutes to the recent meeting of the Sydney Harbour - Parramatta River Pollution Committee, held at Drummoyne on March 19, which adopted a declaration of environmental policy.

This letter asked Council to complete an enclosed questionnaire to cover information for a submission to the Minister for Health to ensure that the proposed Pollution Bill when enacted would be as effective as all Councils would wish it to be.

• Another seeking the reaction of all Councils on the Sydney Harbour and Parramatta River — and their approval in principle — to a proposal that they contribute to a fund to conduct a survey of pollution problems within areas of Councils affected.

The declaration of environmental policy adopted by the committee referred in particular to the "laissez faire attitude of Governments, private organisations and people" towards the environmental, which it said should be replaced by a positive approach.

The Balmain aldermen declared that in this day and age people should be able to take it for granted that any body of aldermen would automatically wish to support such a move.

Their proposal was rejected by the majority — without comment.

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Council Policy On Street Tree Planting

Leichhardt Council last week laid down a policy in regard to residents' requests for permission to plant trees or shrubs in footways adjacent to their premises.

It adopted a recommendation on the subject by the Municipal Engineer, Mr G. A. Wilson.

At the previous meeting, Council gave approval for the planting by local residents of ten native Australian trees at the foot of the public park in The Avenue, East Balmain (a dead end street running north from Darling Street).

This was in response to a petition by Mrs J. Chapman, Mr C. Tillan and 16 others, seeking permission to plant the trees.

Council also agreed to a request by the petitioners that it provide two seats in the park to enable people to sit and enjoy the water view.

At last week's meeting the Engineer submitted a report on the subject of tree planting in streets.

Requests

He said there had been several requests from ratepayers and residents for permission to plant shrubs or trees in footways adjoining their premises, or for the Council to do so.

Mr Wilson said the requests concerned streets where there were no trees already.

He said it was not likely that full-scale plantings would occur in such streets except in exceptional instances.

It would not be possible for Council to carry out a full investigation to determine suitability.

Plantings in grass verges where cutting of the grass was left to the Council would result in a much slower cutting process, because the equipment would be largely ineffective due to the obstacles created by the trees and shrubs.

For that reason streets where residents were cutting the footpath verges were to be favoured when Council undertook whole street plantings.

With the proviso that any planting could subsequently be removed without fuss by Council if it should have good reason, Mr Wilson said he saw no objection to permitting plantings, subject to approval by the engineer.

The recommendation was that ratepayers or residents requesting approval to plant trees or shrubs in the footway adjacent to their premises, or requesting Council to do so, be informed that Council was not in a position to plant or maintain trees or shrubs in localised sites.

However, approval might be granted, upon written application, to the planting by ratepayers or residents of trees or shrubs subject to the direction of the Municipal Engineer.

This would be on the understanding that Council would be absolved of all costs in regard to establishment and maintenance, and

all responsibility for any legal liability which might result.

A further stipulation would be that Council reserved the right to lop or remove a planting should it be considered desirable to do so.

Gift To Hospital

This included a small amount in donations of change by customers. The store then filled out the total to an even figure.

Unfortunately it turned out to be a quiet week for sales.

The week coincided with the first birthday of the business in Balmain, and the move was their way of saying "Thank you" to the district for supporting them.

Holiday Ferries

The holiday timetable will operate for Balmain-Circular Quay ferries next Wednesday, April 29, but will be interrupted at night, because of the harbour boat parade and fireworks display.

No ferry will be allowed to leave the Quay between 6 p.m. and 9.30 p.m.

The last ferry before the interruption to depart for Balmain will be at 4.36 p.m., arriving at Darling Street at 4.48 p.m. and Longnose Point 4.53 p.m.

The last ferry to Circular Quay will leave Longnose Point at 5.10 p.m. and Darling Street 5.15 p.m.

The service to Balmain will resume at Circular Quay at 9.36 p.m.

Bridge Remains Task For Local Council

Leichhardt Council's hope of getting other authorities to bear the cost of rebuilding the condemned Federal Road bridge, which serves the Balmain peninsula with some bus traffic, now appears to have gone.

At its last meeting, Council considered a letter from the Minister for Local Government and Highways, Mr Morton, written in response to representations by Messrs R. C. Degen and A. R. Sloss, Ms.L.A.

The Minister said the bridge was Leichhardt Council's responsibility.

He could not see any way in which the Department of Main Roads could accept responsibility towards the cost of constructing a new bridge, which was not on a main or secondary road.

The Commissioner for Main Roads said it should be practicable for a contractor to build a simple 2-lane bridge for about \$40,000, and approaches for another \$10,000.

The Commissioner had offered to carry out the design of a bridge for the Council.

During discussion of

the letter it was pointed out that Council had secured a special grant of \$5000 last October for the bridge work, and it was competent for it to seek another special grant.

Council was now seeking further assistance from the Local Government Assistance Fund for construction of the bridge and approaches.

It was decided to accept the D.M.R.'s offer to carry out the design of the bridge.

An addendum by Ald.

Origlass (Balmain ward) was rejected by the majority.

Ald. Origlass said Council officers should prepare a case for submission to the Government justifying the relief of municipalities from the cost burden in cases like the Federal Road bridge.

He said that in this particular case ratepayers of Leichhardt Municipality were being called upon to bear the cost of the bridge, which gave more service to people living outside the municipality than those living in it.

He supported acceptance of the D.M.R.'s design offer, but thought that a case could, and should, be made out to the Government for full assistance.

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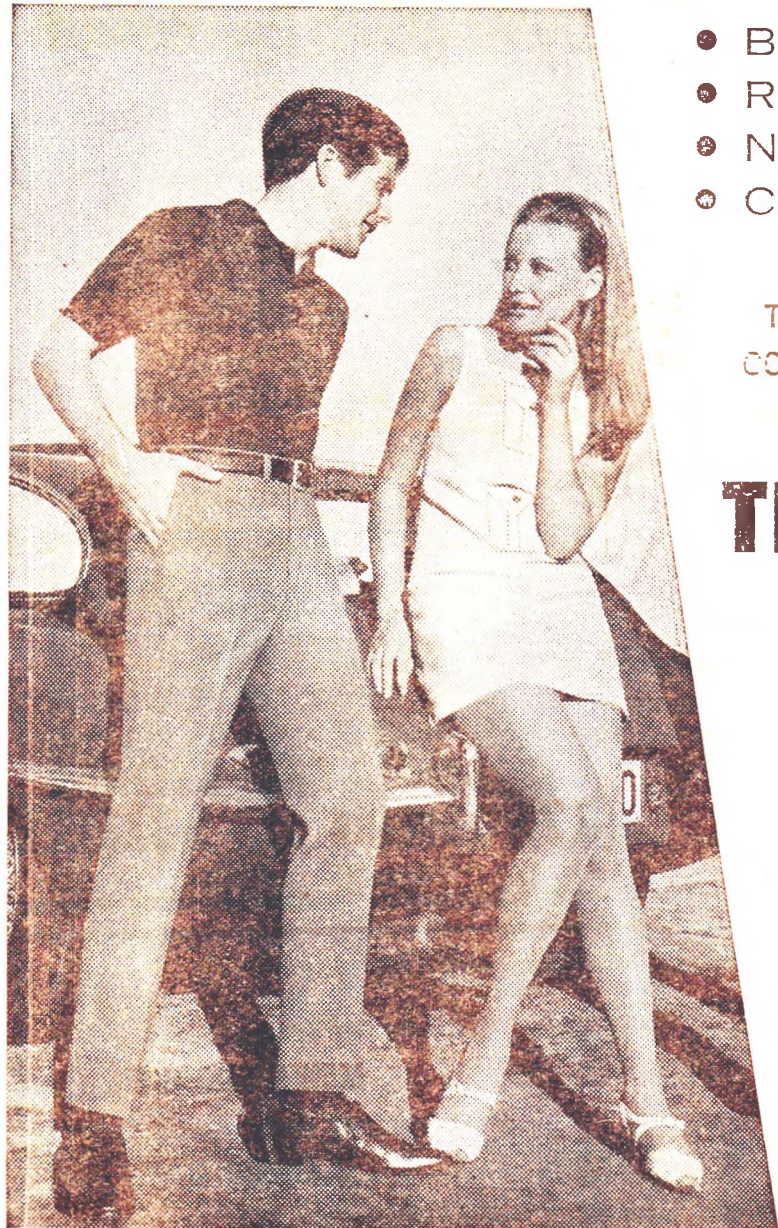
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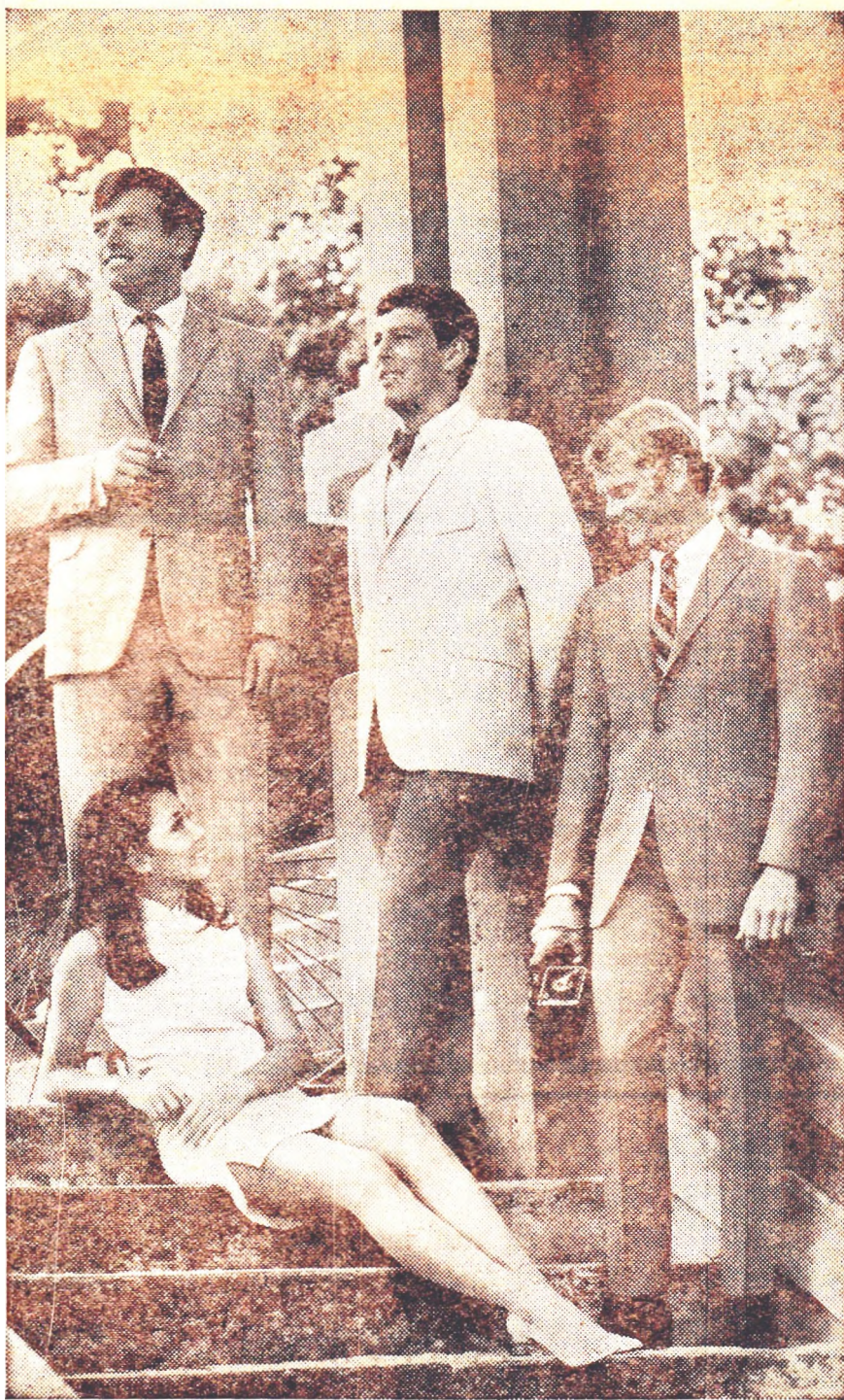
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Tigers Have Easy Win Over Cronulla

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Site For Car Park In Mind

A block of land owned by Leichhardt Council in Withecombe St., Rozelle, is being considered as a possible site for the erection of a Council-owned parking station.

At last week's meeting of Council the subject was referred to the Council Parking Committee for consideration.

Withecombe Street runs between Victoria Road and Belmore Street, two blocks east of Darling Street.

The land has a frontage of 100 ft, a rear line of 76 ft, 10 ins., and an average depth of 102 ft.

There is on the land insubstantial iron shedding, and a large fishing boat in course of construction, although it would appear that construction has been held up for some months.

The estate of the late C. L. Roach is paying rent on the property of \$1.25 a week.

The Council engineer, Mr G. A. Wilson, reported that it would depend upon the Minister

for Lands as to whether the block could be used as a car park.

Since the land was a sufficient distance from the Rozelle junction, it might not be regarded as serving shoppers' parking, he said.

It would therefore serve mainly as a car park for patrons of the nearby social club.

Mr Wilson thought it would be very suitable for a children's playground.
