


The Mayor of Leichhardt is on safe ground in his comments on the situation. Local people, we agree, should in some ways have a bigger say in the future of their district.

Nevertheless Leichhardt Council will be regarded by many as a classic example of a local authority whose planning capabilities are suspect because: • Many decisions


