Rotaract Plan Gets Support Of Youth

Balmain Rotary Club is delighted at the response of the youth of the district to the decision to form a branch of the worldwide youth movement known as the "Rotaract Club". Real success is assured.

A minimum of 15 members is required for such a club. It would appear that a membership of 50 will be achieved; and the calibre of the young people offering is impressive.

Balmain Rotary Club's announcement in "The Link" that it was sponsoring the formation in this district of a Rotaract Club said that this would be a branch of a new world-wide organisation based on Rotary principles.

The interest of Rotaract would not be confined to the local scene. Its activities could extend to other parts of Australia and even to such a distant outpost as New Guinea.

Purpose

In essence, Rotaract is a type of Rotary Club for young people, although it is not intended to act as a breeding ground for future Rotarians.

Its purpose is to fill a gap in community service by young people.

Persons eligible for membership are young men and women aged between 17 and 25, who live, work or study within the territorial limits of the sponsoring Rotary Club.

Members may be older than 25 if they are undergraduates.

The Rotary Club will provide guidance and counsel to the Rotaract Club through a committee of five or more Rotarians.

A Rotaract Club in-

volves its members in carrying out a balanced programme of activity, which includes at least one major project annually in each of its three major fields of work.

These are vocational, community, and international.

The initial meeting called by Balmain Rotary Club to discuss the proposal to form a Rotaract Club in Balmain was attended by just on 30 young people who indicated their interest in proceeding with the idea.

The chairman was the Rotary Club President, Mr George Furey.

Others attending the meeting included senior representatives of Rotary in Sydney, the Mayor of Leichhardt (Ald. L. J. Rowell, and the matron of Balmain Hospital (Miss J. MacLaren).

In an address to the meeting Ald. Rodwell spoke in favour of the aims of the new movement, and stressed the scope there was for this type of activity.

Miss MacLaren has indicated her willingness to co-operate in respect of duty rosters to make it possible for any Balmain Hospital nurse who joined Rotaract to attend its meetings.

Formation

Another meeting has been called for this Thursday, when it is anticipated that the club will be provisionally formed. Actual formation is expected to take

place in about a month's time.

The procedure for forming Rotaract Clubs is that membership application forms are forwarded to the American headquarters of the movement, which issues the charters for new clubs.

Although there had been a doubt expressed at one time at the ability of the movement "Getting off the ground" in the Balmain district, the initial reaction of the youth of the district was really satisfying.

About 75 per cent of those expressing support of the idea live in the district, while the bulk of them are working here.

There was a good cross section of the public represented in those attending, as regards employment as well as the sexes.

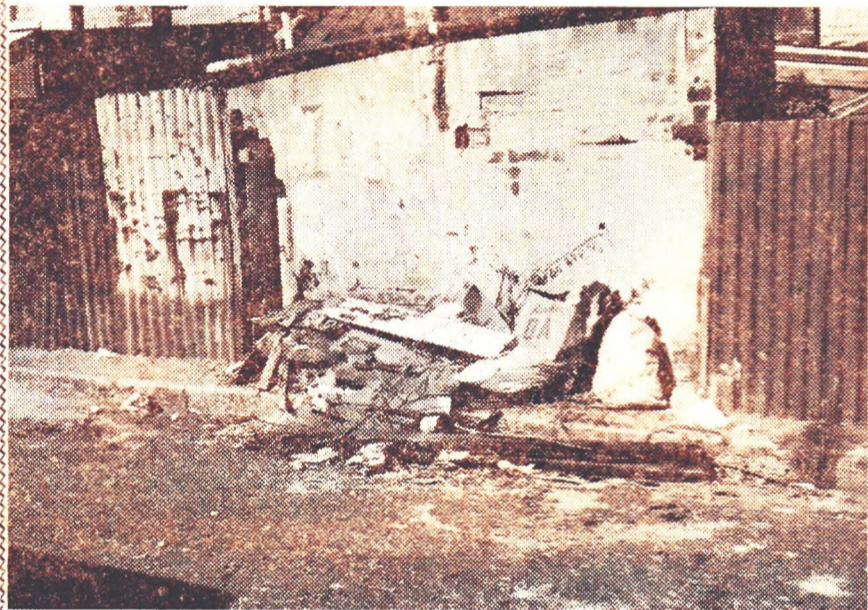
A number were technical college students. Those working were employed by big industrial organisations, including Unilever and Ampol, and by banks and Balmain Hospital (six nurses being in attendance).

Many more applications for membership are now expected.

Interest Of 7% In New Loan

The new Commonwealth cash loan, which opened last week, will carry interest rates of up to 7%.

Three securities are offered, all with issue price par and with maturities ranging from 38 months to 19 years. They are: 6.5% July, 1973; 6.8% August, 1978; 7% May, 1989.

The Treasurer, Mr L.

Bury, said the new interest rates were in line with yields established in the bond market over recent weeks.

The previous Commonwealth loan, in February, offered yields from 5.6% for 17 months to 6% for 35 years.

New Series "U" Special Bonds are also on sale. They offer a yield of approximately 6.92% to a subscriber who purchases them now and holds them for their full term of just less than 8 years.

The special bonds carry an interest rate of 6.4% from the issue date until March, 1973, then 6.6% until March, 1975, and then 7% until final maturity.

From April 1, 1971, the new bonds will be readily cashable at prices ranging from par to 103% on one month's notice.

Prospectuses are being circulated to all banks and stock brokers.

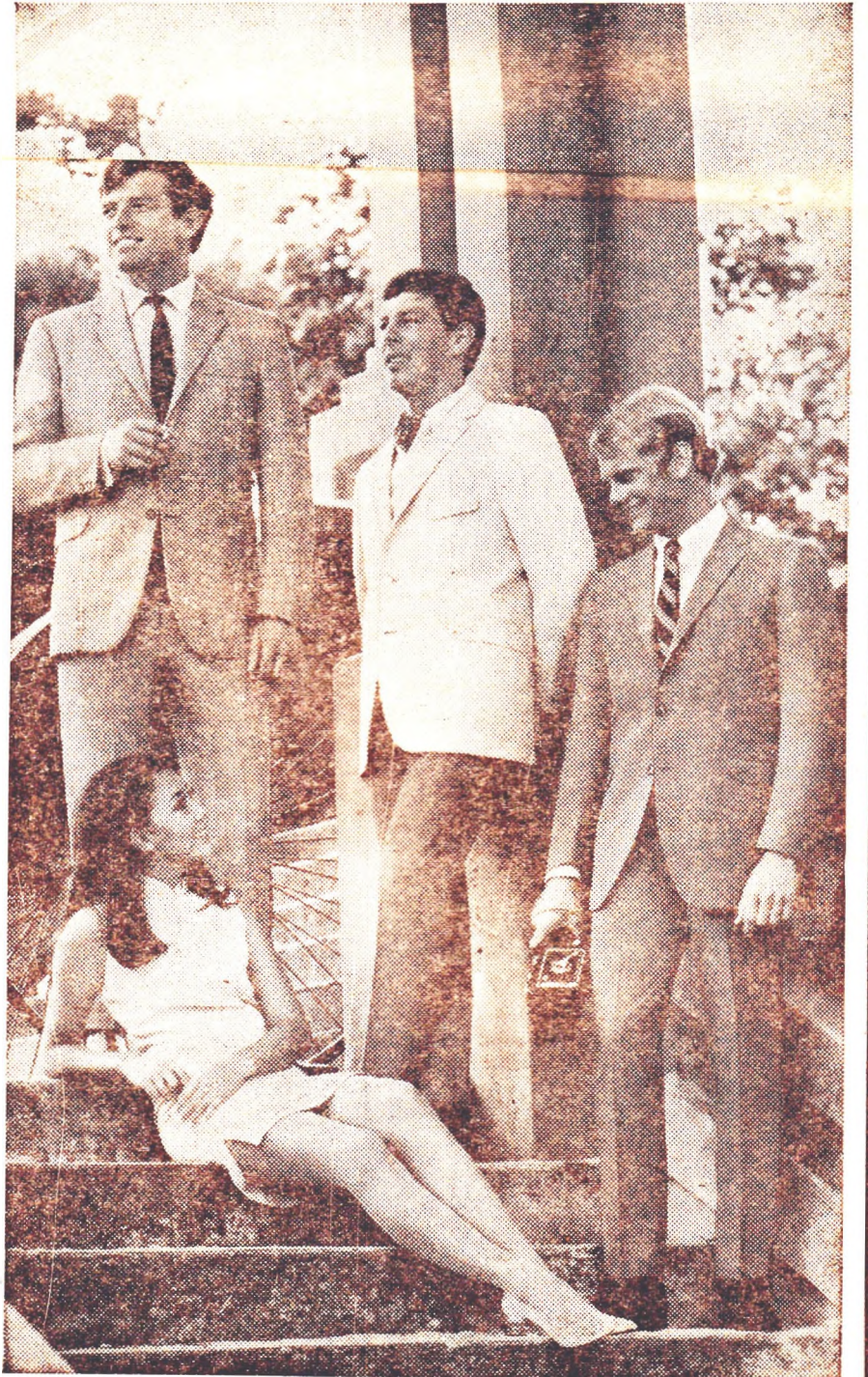

POLICE REMIND PEDESTRIANS OF ROAD PERILS

Following the death recently of an elderly pedestrian at Rozelle, the officer-in-charge of the Balmain Police District, Inspector Rasmussen, drew attention to the increasing danger to pedestrians in this area.

Ernest Wilson, aged 79, of 8 Albert Street, Rozelle, died from injuries received when he was knocked down by a car at the intersection of Victoria Road and Lilyfield Road, Rozelle.

The police report of the accident said that it occurred 21 feet away from the intersection (where there was a marked footcrossing).

At the time motor vehicles had the green light in their favour. Mr Wilson had apparently crossed the road against the red light.

Had he been on the marked footcrossing he might have had some protection and been alive today.

Inspector Rasmussen said that the Balmain area was a very old one, and those who originally designed the streets could

not visualise the amount of traffic there was today. However, most motorists using the back streets were well aware of the number of elderly people who reside in the area.

"Disregard"

"Yet the elderly people themselves are perhaps not so much aware that the motor vehicle is Public Enemy No. 1 to pedestrians", he said.

"They should be warned of the dangers from the ever-increasing rate".

Inspector Rasmussen said the pedestrians in the Balmain area were probably no different to those in other areas in their attitude to traffic dangers.

Many, however, went around with very little regard for their lives. They crossed streets with utter disregard for motor vehicles.

More people, he said, were being killed by the motor car than by firearms.

It is extraordinary how many pedestrians consider that every vehicle has a perfectly astute driver and has good brakes", said Mr Rasmussen.

"When they step off the footpath right in the path of an oncoming car

they don't realise what a spot they put the driver in.

"If you handed them a loaded revolver they wouldn't think of pointing it at themselves. Yet it's much the same. They just don't worry about their own lives.

"In walking in front of a driver, how do they know he is not drunk or has something serious on his mind?"

Mr Rasmussen said that elderly persons with not so much physical control should bear their own disabilities in mind.

Too many wouldn't admit they were old, and how long it took them to cross a road.

The crew comprised: Bow, Richard Hunt; 2, Frank Gardner; 3, Cliff Fountain; stroke, Terry Maher; coxswain, Stephen Purkis.

The club has celebrated the win by the purchase of a new racing four, and no doubt spirits will be high at the annual general meeting next Sunday, May 17.

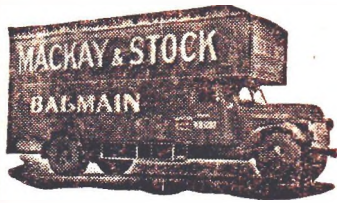
