# New Service For Old People Most Successful

Callan Park Psychiatric Hospital, Rozelle, is elated at the success of its new "Psycho-geriatric" service, which has put back on to their feet again about twice the usual number of aged people with mental and physical problems. In the first 2½ months about 40 more "recoveries" than normally expected have occurred.

The hospital's Medical Superintendent, Dr W. J. Barrett, told "The Link" that the staff did not want to boast about the achievement, nor were they anxious to set up competition in this matter.

However, the new service was a real success. Their only problem appeared to be whether they would be able to meet the demand by the public upon it.

In the first 2½ months since the new geriatric unit was opened, 92 aged persons with mental and physical problems had been admitted.

Of these, 82 had been discharged (although some, mostly with an alcohol problem, had been readmitted for further attention).

"We did not expect so many discharges so soon", said Dr Barrett. "We would have expected only about 40 to be discharged as being put

back on to their feet again".

The new unit is designed by imaginative experts who love old people and want them to get over their problems and return to the world they used to know.

### Design

It is not a "holding area", to which old folk retire in their last years before death, where service is restricted because of lack of staff, facilities, and expert professional knowledge.

Dr Barrett said it was essentially an investigation and treatment area. Their aim was to let the old folk return to their homes, able to fend for themselves again, and then to see that they maintained their improvement.

In the new geriatric complex are three wards—wards 16, 17, and 18.

Ward 16, with 44 beds, is given over entirely to "psycho-geriatrics" (or care of the aged who are mentally disturbed and physically infirm).

Ward 17, alongside, is a medical ward, controlled by a consulting physician, while ward 18 is an "overflow" ward to cater for patients in need of longer care.

### The Team

The special staff are physiotherapists, occupational therapists and general trained nurses.

The physiotherapists operate in rooms fitted with rails, pedalling apparatus and exercising machines.

The occupational therapists have their usual equipment for such purposes as working in ceramics, cabinet-making, etc.

The aim of the geriatric unit is to keep the

patient in hospital for the shortest possible period, a limit of 28 days being set.

"Rehabilitation is a team activity, in which all staff members are of equal importance", said Dr Barrett.

"Our aim is restoration of the patient to the maximum physical, mental, social and vocational function possible.

"All team members must be all things to the patient, the border lines being blurred between each type of service.

"In addition to nursing staff, physiotherapists and occupational therapists, the team comprises social workers, medical officers and domestic servants.

"If the old are isolated and away from familiar faces and places they easily become confused, their abilities fail and they rapidly decline mentally and physically.

### A Lesson

"There is an important lesson in this for all of us.

"What are we doing for our own old and failing family members? Do we give them some mental stimulation by regular visits?

"Do we make sure they get one good, hot meal a day? Do we see they take daily exercise within their capacity?

"If your contribution has to be a small one, do you take them to the nearest Senior Citizens' Centre—or the Thursday day hospital at Callan Park?"

In the unit the patients have an interesting, varied programme.

They begin to get up about 7 a.m., and after the 8 o'clock breakfast has "settled" have a short period of physical

exercise designed by the physiotherapists.

This is followed by different activities each day, including newspaper reading and discussion, spelling and understanding words, table games and many handicrafts.

There is usually a film each week.

Some patients are taken in small parties for outings to places of interest and a few attend dances.

"The whole aim", said Dr Barrett, "is to help the aged get to their peak mentally and physically. Often attention to an unnoticed physical disability results in marked mental improvement".

"After discharge, they are welcomed back for the day—at present on Thursday. Any difficulties they have encountered since discharge are attended to. While there they enter into all ward activities for the day.

"The enthusiastic staff are looking forward, when their numbers increase, to engaging in these activities out of the hospital and in the community they serve".

## COUNCIL WORRIED BY SOME STAFF PROBLEMS

Dissatisfaction by Leichhardt Council's garbage collectors' section of the Municipal and Shire Council Employees' Union at the Council's delay in paying increased wages (agreed to by the Court), and at the lack of action in providing a better amenities block, were the causes of the recent strike.

The matter was dealt with at last week's Council meeting.

It appears that like other metropolitan Councils, Leichhardt Council had not paid the increase in wages because of Government delay in gazetting the decision.

As a term of settlement of the strike, Council agreed to pay the increase immediately (as Manly Council has also done).

The other cause—delay in providing a better amenities block for the men at Leichhardt—was also dealt with.

Council had already asked an outside firm of architects and draftsmen to submit plans for a new block. When these became available, tenders were called.

The Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell, said that a special meeting of Council would be called to consider the tenders when received, to obviate delay.

Ald. N. Origlass (Balmain ward) proposed that a monthly meeting of the outdoor staff should be held, to be attended by the Mayor or someone deputising for him.

It was essential, he said, that Council should be aware of anything that was worrying the men.

He stressed that a Labor-controlled Council should have satisfactory labor relations with the staff.

Since nobody seemed to know about the men's problems that created the strike, it was desirable to hear what the men had to say.

His motion was rejected.

### Engineer

Another staff problem was considered by Council—the difficulty of securing an assistant engineer.

Council's Engineer (Mr G. A. Wilson) reported that the only way of ensuring employment of assistant engineers—in view of the current severe shortage of applicants—was to overgrade them.

He recommended that the position of assistant engineer be re-advertised, with the altered condition that salary would be that applicable to award margin for senior assistant grade 1, first year, with the additional industrial agreement margin of \$624 a year.

The staff committee, however, recommended that the report be received and noted, and deferred.

Ald. Origlass moved an amendment that the Engineer's recommendation be adopted.

He said that since the Engineer was not able to leave the office to any great extent, Council's works programme was not being properly supervised.

Council rejected the amendment. However, it decided that the deferment would be for a fortnight only.

## Column NINE

### Our Wilting Council

One of the reasons for condemnation of Leichhardt Council by many Balmain residents has been its lack of persistence in dealing with Government authorities in regard to attacks by some industries on the district's residential amenity.

One of the main subjects for complaint has been interference with normal living conditions by the two container terminals.

Replying to attacks on its lack of persistence the Council has claimed that Government instrumentalities can do much as they please.

The argument is fatuous.

It is a Council's duty to fight—and keep on fighting.

We are now apparently seeing another instance of wilting by the Council.

It has meekly accepted the A.N.L.'s statement that the question of replacing some truck transport to Mort Bay container terminal with barges, although desirable, is too tough to embark on.

Council could well have supported the Balmain aldermen in their attempt to make another approach to the A.N.L. and to point to the marked conflict of statements by the Line on the subject of origin of cargo.

Party politics could, of course, have condemned the Balmain men's move.

Politics, however, would have had no connection with Council's failure to accept immediately the A.N.L.'s offer to join in a conference with the traffic authorities on the whole problem.

Such a conference is urgently needed. That Council has made no move in that direction, either in the past or now, condemns it as being not big enough for the job it pretends to do.

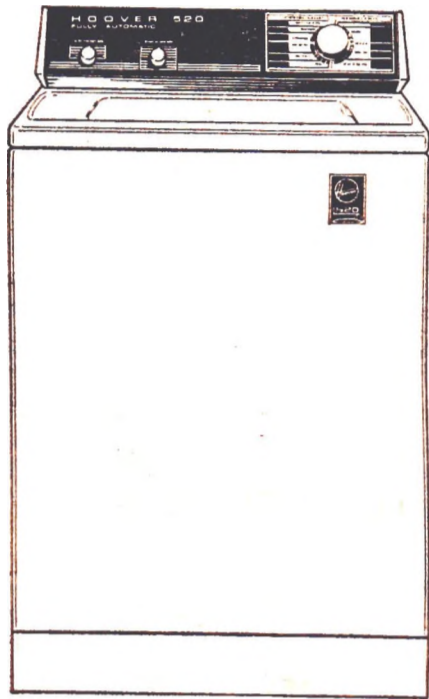

## Balmain Children's Playgroup

Members of the new Balmain mothers' children's playgroup met last week to hear an address by Mr Lex Grey, director of the Bernard Van Leer Project of the University of Sydney's Department of Adult Education.

The 12 mothers present received his ideas with enthusiasm.

Mr Grey pointed out that the playgroup movement started in Great Britain in the early 1960's, and had over 1,000 active groups.

Although there were many playgroups among aboriginal families in Australia, the Balmain mothers were the first all-white parents to seek his help in forming a playgroup for their pre-school children.

Young children learned by playing, he said. By getting together on a do-it-yourself basis parents could provide a wider range of play equipment than was possible in the average home.

Provided the hard core of the family was there to return to, all young children would benefit from mixing with children outside the family.

The Bernard Van Leer Project, he added, would make available work books and tape recordings for initiating discussion on child study and development, education and other related topics.

The meeting decided to ask each family for an initial donation of \$1

towards the cost of paint, sand, picture books, etc. A charge of 30c would be made each morning.

The playgroup will meet from Tuesday, June 9, each Tuesday and Thursday from 9-11.30 a.m., in St. John's Lower Hall, Spring and Thomas Streets, Birchgrove.

Further information may be obtained by ringing 82-1050 or 82-5048.

The organisers stress that the group is a completely voluntary and non-profit-making project.

# BARGES NOT TO BE USED FOR CONTAINER TRAFFIC

The Australian National Line has advised Leichhardt Council that, as a result of a feasibility survey, it does not regard the use of barges for the carriage of goods to and from the Mort Bay container terminal to be a practical proposition.

The advice was in a letter read at last week's Council meeting, from the General Manager of the Line (in Melbourne), Mr R. D. Robin.

The Line's decision to conduct a feasibility survey was announced at a conference last December between Captain Menzies, the A.N.L.'s representative, and the Council's Noise Abatement Advisory Panel.

At that conference Capt. Menzies said that 80% of the outgoing cargo was wool, most of it coming from Walsh Bay by semi-trailer through the city traffic.

The proposition put to him, emanating from Ald. I. Wyner (Balmain ward) was the possibility of using barges from Walsh Bay to Mort Bay.

The idea was to remove some of the traffic nuisance created by container traffic from Balmain streets.

## "Complexity"

Mr Robin's letter said the proposal had been looked at in detail and mainly on a technical rather than an economic basis.

The complexity of the situation could be envisaged with cargo (received for export in particular) arriving from many areas outside the

metropolitan district by both road and rail.

To make a barging operation technically feasible it would be necessary to develop a barge harbour or terminal capable of being served by both road and rail.

Thorough investigation had failed to reveal such a location on the Sydney harbour waterfront. Consequently Ald. Wyner's suggestion, although worthy in its concept, was not a practical proposition.

## An Offer

Mr Robin referred to the question of relocating refrigerated unit power points at Mort Bay, which was another item of complaint.

That matter, he said, was now close to a solution.

Mr Robin added that a close study of the minutes of the December meeting revealed that the major complaint of Balmain residents concerned the noise from road transport.

He reiterated that the A.N.L. had no control over transport outside its terminal area.

However, the Line would be only too pleased to join forces with the Council in conferring with the appropriate police and motor trans-

port authorities in an endeavour to arrive at some solution of that complaint.

At the December meeting, the Mayor (Ald. L. J. Rodwell) had stated that Council would form a standing committee.

Mr Robin said the A.N.L. would be only too pleased to join such a committee and assist in every way possible.

He said, however, that the aspect of using helicopters to transport cargo from Walsh Bay to Mort Bay, which had been suggested at the meeting, was not only technically impracticable, but would add to the noise factor.

Council decided to "Receive and note" the letter. It rejected an amendment by the Balmain aldermen — moved by Ald. I. Wyner and seconded by Ald. N. Origglass—for further action.

The amendment sought to ask the A.N.L. for a copy of its survey, and to seek a further conference with the Line.

## Difference

The movers said they detected quite a difference between the statements in the letter and those made by Capt. Menzies at the December meeting.

Capt. Menzies had said that 80% of the container business was in wool. (And most of that came from Walsh Bay.)

This conflicted with the vague statement by Mr Robin about cargo arriving from many areas outside the metropolitan area.

This conflict of opinion, said the Balmain aldermen, seemed a proper point on which to seek a further conference, since action regarding 80% of the cargo would make a big impact on the situation.

The Council majority declined to accept the idea.

Neither did it take action on the A.N.L.'s offer to confer on the subject of traffic noise.

**Teachers Condemn  
Conditions At  
District Schools**

A meeting of over 100 teachers  
from the electorates of King, Leich-  
hardt and Balmain was held at Leich-  
hardt last Thursday to discuss needs  
of schools in the inner Western Sub-  
urbs.

Teachers criticised conditions of schools in the area.

Many raised the problems of migrant education—the need for specialist teachers and proper equipment for the teaching of English.

The Newtown Public School representative said that up to 70% of the school population were migrant children,

but the Government was doing very little to assist teachers help these pupils.

At Marrickville Public School the migrant problem had become critical. Many pupils were unable to speak English, and there was only one specialist teacher covering the primary and infants' departments.

Representatives of all schools said that playing areas were insufficient. In many schools, children were not permitted to run or to play ball games.

The representative of Rozelle Boys' Junior High School, primary and infants' departments, condemned the small playing space and the rough surface of the playground.

Teachers from Camdenville and Annandale Schools spoke of the deplorable classroom accommodation.

Annandale Public School and Fort Street Boys' High School representatives raised the problem of noise, while the representative of pointed to the primitive Newtown Infants' School toilet conditions.

All secondary school representatives referred to a lack of proper equipment.

At Ibrox Park Boys' High School specialised equipment had been provided under a science grant, but the required power points were not available in the laboratory.

Teachers at the meeting carried a resolution calling on the Federal Government to release additional funds for education, particularly in the inner Western Suburbs.

They decided also to seek deputations to State Members of Parliament and the Federal Minister for Education, and to combine with other teachers in a mass deputation to the Central Metropolitan Area Director.

A mass meeting of parents and teachers will be held in July to inform parents of school conditions in the area.
