Governments to make a real effort to persuade motorists and their passengers to use seat belts deserves more than a mere shrug of the shoulders from the man in the street.


There is convincing world - wide evidence that when seat belts are used there is an 80 per cent chance of preventing death or serious injury in a major crash.

The innumerable cases of racing drivers walking away from otherwise fatal crashes should surely mpress doubting Thomases.

Some apparently incere people condemn the move to compel use of seat belts on the ground that it would rob them of their individuality.

What's wrong with that? Isn't that why we have traffic and other laws - to force general adherence to a commonsense code of behaviour?

In view of the apalling road toll and the refusal of so many d r i vers - especially youthful ones-to admit that their attitude to driving is suicidal, it is essential that Governments should try to save people




