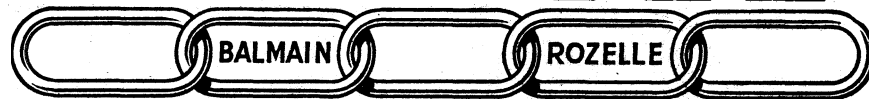

Harbourside Park To Replace Historic Balmain Shipbuilding Yards

Another important change in the use of a section of the Balmain waterfront is now taking place, with the decision by the State Planning Authority of N.S.W. to convert the 1½-acre property of Morrison and Sinclair Pty. Ltd., shipbuilders at Long Nose Point, into public parkland.

Adversely affected by containerisation, the company has now ceased operations. Its staff of 30 have already found other employment.

The State Planning Authority is completing negotiations for purchase of the property with the intention of making it available to the public for recreational purposes.

No details of the sale are available, neither the Authority nor the company revealing the price being paid.

A statement issued on behalf of the Chairman of the S.P.A., Mr N. W.

Ashton, said that the action was being taken in accordance with the Government's policy of releasing harbour foreshore land for public use when it became available and when it was possible to use it for that purpose.

The policy in this matter revolved around the conflict between two vital factors:

• Sydney Harbour was one of the most beautiful harbours in the world and its residents wished to enjoy it.

• In addition (especially in Leichhardt Municipality) the harbour

was an important commercial port.

When the two factors clashed, there was the problem of maintaining the harbour as a commercial port.

The balance between the two was rather delicate, and people living in areas fronting the harbour tended to lose sight of this.

The Authority's decision to acquire the property and convert it to public use was an acknowledgment of the need in this area for public access to the waterfront.

Mr Ashton said that the structures now on the property would be demolished in due course.

It might be some little time before this could be done, in view of the general financial stringency.

Funds for the purchase of the property, however, had been put aside before the necessity for Government economy had occurred.

The S.P.A. has as yet no precise plans for treatment of the area for parkland.

"Council Will Set Lead On Litter"

Leichhardt Council intends to set a lead to the public in regard to litter, according to the Mayor, Ald. L. J. Rodwell.

He was replying to the recent statement by the President of The Balmain Association, Mr W. Haesler.

Mr Haesler had said he expected Council to set a lead before embarking on a vigorous move to impose on-the-spot fines for depositing litter in public places.

Mr Haesler had specially mentioned lack of cover for Council garbage trucks and paucity of litter bins in main streets.

Ald. Rodwell said that while it was not to be expected that the garbage trucks should be covered during short stops for pickup, he agreed that they must be covered in long treks, such as when going to the tip.

He had impressed

upon the staff that the trucks should be covered at such times to prevent rubbish blowing off them, and he would again demand that this be done.

Ald. Rodwell said also that the question of the size and number of litter bins in main streets had been discussed several times, and would again be considered.

He would call for a report from the Council's engineer on the matter.

Something had to be done, he said, to help the people abide by the spirit and letter of the anti-litter regulations.

The Mayor last week commenced his campaign of education of school children in their responsibilities in regard to litter.

At a function at Christian Brothers' school at Balmain he took the opportunity of addressing the pupils on the subject.

Louisa Road Traffic

People seeking a greater balance between waterfront industry and residential amenity in Balmain will be delighted at the news that the S.P.A. will convert an industrial location at the foot of Louisa Road into a public recreational area.

It is sad, of course, to see Balmain lose another of its pioneer industries, for Australian history was written here; but it is good to see the public being given a little extra look at their lovely harbour.

Nevertheless the desire of people to pay a visit to their new park will draw their attention to the appalling traffic conditions in Louisa Road.

Louisa Road could be classed as one of Sydney's night mare thoroughfares because of its narrowness, the number of cars constantly parked there, and the conflict between industrial and private use.

The new park should be permitted to appeal to more than very local residents, so for that reason, as well as general requirements, it is essential that the traffic questions involved be tackled openly and immediately by the Council and the traffic authorities.

Among items to be considered at a public meeting could be:

• Building of a parking station on part of the top unused section of Birchgrove Park.

• Feasibility of building a short, relieving section of road along the water's edge between Grove Street and Louisa Road.

• Institution of a one-way traffic system along the several streets involved.

The whole problem is probably unsolvable, yet any easing of it could make local users less hysterical and the area more functional.

Shipbuilding History Is Written

The closing down of Morrison & Sinclair's shipbuilding yards in Louisa Road, Birchgrove, means that Balmain has lost still another of its historic associations and the Australian shipbuilding industry one of its pioneers.

The company's present Secretary, Mr George T. Morrison, is a grandson of the founder, Thomas F. Morrison, who migrated from Scotland as a young family man in 1887.

George Morrison told "The Link" that his grandfather joined up with another young Scottish shipbuilder, Thomas C. Sinclair, who came from Scotland about 1880.

"My wife is Thomas Sinclair's grand-daughter," he said.

"The two men had similar interests, and

formed the partnership of Morrison & Sinclair, operating in the Pyramont-Glebe area.

"The only evidence I have of this was that they drew up a legal partnership agreement after being partners for ten years!

"Their first area for shipbuilding was in Pyramont, and some time later they leased a site at Stephen Street, Balmain, next to Poole & Steel's yard. I haven't the exact date, but it would have been in the early 1900's.

"Between then and 1913 they built many vessels for New Zealand and Australian owners, including Aotea, Awaroa and Tangaroa.

"They built also two colliers for Bellambi Coal Co., a large number of 'Lady' class ferry

boats for the old Balmain Ferry Co., and

quite a few 'K' class for Sydney Ferry Co., the last two being in 1913—Karrabee and Karingal, both still operating on Sydney Harbour."

Mr Morrison said that among other vessels built by them was the yacht Morna, now known as Kurrewa IV.

The company built accommodation on troop ships during World War I.

In 1918 the original T. F. Morrison sold out his share of the partnership to T. C. Sinclair, and in 1919 the company purchased the present site at Long Nose Point (then a timber yard).

They operated at the two sites for the next few years, then moved entirely to Long Nose Point in 1922.

The first vessel built at the Birchgrove site was Laurabada, a motor

vessel for the New Guinea Administration (still operating as an island trader).

In 1923 the company became incorporated as a limited liability company known as Morrison Sinclair Ltd.

Original shareholders of this were Mr T. C. Sinclair and three sons, two sons of Mr T. F. Morrison, and Miss J. N. Smith.

From then until 1939 the company built some well-known pleasure craft for prominent Sydney business people.

From 1939 to 1945 defence work was done, including bomb protection for ships, accommodation for troop carrying, and preparation for cargo carrying on different vessels.

It also co-operated with Poole and Steel

You have invited readers to express their opinions about the question: "Should the residential aspects take second place to industrial on the Balmain waterfront?"

In 1970 I owned a property in Glebe and had never set foot in Balmain. In October, 1970, I visited some friends who had come to live in East Balmain. I was driven along the steeply twisting streets until the harbour was spilt at my feet. I was enchanted.

We wandered around Picnic Point, sat on the lawns at the Darling St. ferry wharf and walked in Elkington Park. Families were strolling and children were playing—a happy people enjoying life.

I was moved by the visual beauty and the excitement, but I was also a ratepayer and knew that these things do not just "happen".

Here were mothers and fathers who had time to have fun with their children without first travelling miles, factory and office shop workers who were enjoying their leisure right in their own community.

I realised that the Council and citizens of Balmain must have a well-developed sense of

identity and pride in achievement as I looked at the prosperous industries side by side with the retaining of the natural beauties, available for all to enjoy.

That October day was momentous. I sold my property in Glebe and now have a house in Balmain. Since then I have taken a young teacher, a housewife and a Sydney businessman for a similar first visit.

The result has been identical—all were struck with the way Balmain people are using their community beauty spots, the quality of aliveness in them, the sense of progress in fully living.

These three people are now in process of buying houses in Balmain!

It seems that many Balmainites have realised that "progress" is concerned with the quality of life, as well as with the growth of industry. Surely one should never be fostered at the expense of the other?

Police Method Of Moving Parked Cars Criticised

A complaint by Ald. I. Wyner (Balmain ward) at last meeting of Leichhardt Council of inconsiderate action by police concerning container truck traffic in Mort Street, has been rejected by the officer in charge of Balmain Police District, Inspector H. Rasmussen.

Ald. Wyner said at the Council meeting that the Mort Street residents had been awakened at 5.30 a.m. by the police and asked to move their cars parked in the street outside to allow wide loads to proceed to the A.N.L. container terminal.

He said that door-knocking by the police early in the morning could be frightening to residents, especially elderly people.

Co-operation

A report by the Council's Deputy Health Surveyor, Mr W. Brimble, said that the police were unco-operative in the matter, claiming that the cars in question should not have been parked in the street.

However, the Yellow Express Carriers were prepared to co-operate by advising residents the previous day, and further efforts would be made to secure the co-operation of A.N.L.

Ald. Wyner contended that instead of residents being subjected to the truck problem, the containers should be moved to and from the ships by water, there being a couple of big cranes available in the harbour.

Because of the proliferation of motor vehicles and the nature of the area, he added, it would be wrong for the police to ban parking in the street.

Ald. Wyner concluded that the police did not appear to be interested

in anything except ensuring passage of the street residents. This follows a report made to Council last October by Ald. N. Oriscars that he had received complaints from residents of Dock Road, Birchgrove, that they had been wakened by police at 6 a.m. to move their cars because of a big load being taken to the terminal then.

Council had then carried a motion moved by the Balmain aldermen asking the police to have prior notice of such vehicular movements given to residents.

Inspector Harry Rasmussen, officer-in-charge of Balmain police, told "The Link" that the duty of the police in such a matter was to prevent obstruction of traffic.

Obstruction

The police fully realised the problems of residents of areas similar to this, but the public went into motor vehicle ownership with their eyes open, knowing that the problem of garaging had to be solved.

It was not a police problem. It was one for the public.

The duty of the police was to ensure that lawful traffic could proceed without being obstructed by vehicles which should not be there at the time.

Mr Rasmussen said the Motor Traffic Act did not give anyone permission to leave his vehicle out on the roadway where it was an obstruction to other users.

Business enterprises were being required by the authorities to provide off-street parking for their vehicles, yet some residents left two and even three motor vehicles outside their home day and night.

They were denying other people use of the street. They should garage their cars off the roadway.

"Normally, where parking in the street does not cause an obstruction, it is O.K.", Mr Rasmussen. "But in places it is a definite obstruction."

No "Right"

"Where complaints are made to us of inability to get vehicles through the line of parked cars, we have them moved."

"In complaining about our action, the residents concerned are claiming they are being deprived of a right which they have never had."

"The real problem is lack of thought and consideration for others by the manner of parking."

"Obviously if a car is left on one side of a street while others are parked nearby on the other side, big vehicles cannot get through."

"People should consider that problem. They should avoid creating bottlenecks."

Inspector Rasmussen would not concede that doorknocks were being made by the police early in the morning.

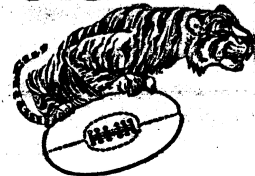

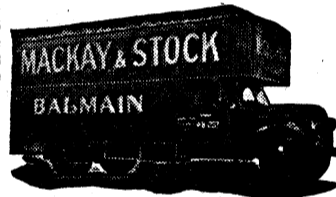
