# SCHOOL SKIES BRIGHTER

## Accommodation Plans Proceed: New Staff And Equipment

Some aspects of the education scene in the Balmain district are indicating brighter prospects for school pupils. Accommodation plans to cater for the increasing demand are proceeding (although slowly), and one High School has been supplied with a modern science complex and library. Meanwhile two interesting personalities have entered the field in the form of new headmasters, who have replaced two retiring principals.

The long-awaited announcement by the Government of the calling of tenders for construction of the new Balmain High School, in Terry Street, has still not eventuated.

However, observers report that it is a live project. Planning is proceeding, and initial sketch plans have been circulated among top officials.

No definite date has been decided upon by the Department for a start on the project.

While this will of course be governed by the availability of funds—a subject of very live public interest at the moment—it is expected that there will not be any serious delay in Departmental plans.

### At Rozelle

The accommodation problem at Rozelle Junior Boys' High School has been solved this year by Departmental action to send some boys from the normal "feeding" area to other schools.

This was necessary because of the increase in the demand for accommodation in the primary school.

There are now fewer secondary school students at this establishment, and more primary students.

Two classrooms in the primary school, damaged by fire during the Xmas vacation, will be ready for use again shortly.

The headmaster, Mr C. J. Cox, says that the school continues to receive a considerable number of migrant children, many of whom cannot speak English.

There is at the school a special teacher to instruct migrant boys and girls in spoken English, and another to teach them how to read (required particularly by secondary school boys, who could not make much progress without it).

There will be a meeting of parents of pupils of the Rozelle school and other interested people at the school at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, May 12.

The speaker will be a doctor from the Forest Lodge Child Health Centre, the topic being "Services provided by the Forest Lodge Child Health Centre".

The school's Parents and Citizens' Association conducted a Mother's Day stall at the primary school last Monday. Takings amounted to \$140.

### Ibrox Park

Ibrox Park Boys' High School, Leichhardt, which caters for boys from the Balmain peninsula, now has a new headmaster.

He is Mr Alan Grayhurst, B.A., A.S.T.C., who takes the place of Mr Smith, who retired at the end of last year and who is now on holiday overseas.

Mr Grayhurst was formerly Deputy Principal of Balgowlah Boys' High School for four years, and prior to that Deputy Principal of Scone Boys' High School for three years.

Another new feature of the school is the \$135,730 science block and library, now in enthusiastic use by the pupils.

This is a two-storey building, the ground floor of which is the science complex, and the upper floor the library.

The science complex comprises two laboratories, a preparation room which leads into both laboratories, and a classroom suitable for senior boys.

Mr Grayhurst said the library was magnificent. It contained a reading room and an annex in which the librarian gave about ten minutes' tuition to students on how to use the library.

The floor is carpeted, a pleasing refinement which makes the atmosphere quieter. There are also two discussion rooms attached, together with a teachers' reading room where the staff may look at new books.

Further features are:

- A stack room containing bookshelves for books not in common use.

- An audio visual room, containing a study booth (using cassettes or radio recording with earphones for boys who wish to obtain information without disturbing others). Shakespearean recordings and foreign languages, especially Italian, are important uses here.

Mr Grayhurst said there were about 5,000 books in the library. It was used largely in school hours (generally before lessons and during lunch hours). Seniors had a study period in the reading room.

The library was generally crowded out.

### Birchgrove

Birchgrove Public School also has a new headmaster — Mr Les. Hagan, B.A. — replacing Miss Campbell-Brown, who retired at the end of last year.

Mr Hagan was formerly Principal of a new school which he started at Busby West, in the Liverpool area. Prior to that he was Deputy Principal at Turvey Park (Wagga) Demonstration School.

He told "The Link" he thought Balmain was a vital community. He was delighted at the support from residents seen at the P. & C. meetings, there being an average attendance of 60 at the last three meetings.

He said he had been working to secure that support, and he was very pleased at the contribution parents were making to the life of the school.

There were some very well informed and active people living in the area and he was anxious to use their energies in school activities.

Mr Hagan said the school had started lectures for parents at the school—at 7 p.m. Tuesdays—in the concepts of New Maths, to enable them to appreciate the work their children were doing in that subject.

## PUBLIC USE OF WATERFRONT: COUNCIL ACTION

Leichhardt Council's campaign to give the public more say in use of the waterfront has a good chance of success, the Mayor, Ald. L. Rodwell, said the other day.

Referring to the adoption of his Mayoral minute urging action by Local Government bodies throughout N.S.W. to secure representation on the Maritime Services Board, he said he believed it would secure widespread support.

Everybody was recognizing today that public bodies should be represented on statutory bodies, he said.

It was wrong that Councils should have no say in their activities.

Ald. Rodwell said that apart from handing over the new park at Peacock Point (Illoura Reserve) for public use, the M.S.B. had done nothing on the waterfront to assist residential amenity.

The Mayor said that Leichhardt Council was preparing to take over the maintenance of Illoura Reserve, as recently decided.

Ald. Rodwell said Council was closely investigating the problem of access to the waterfront via Louisa Road. This could increase fol-

lowing the State Planning Authority's decision to provide a public recreation area on the site of the Morrison and Sinclair shipbuilding yards.

It was urgent that better traffic arrangements should be made in that area.

He said he would examine the suggestion by "The Link" that a parking area be provided on the unused section of Birchgrove Park abutting Louisa Road.

Use of sections of parks for traffic purposes, however, was seldom favoured by Local Government bodies.

The Mayor said Council was now closely investigating the possibility of purchasing a property in Louisa Road for the construction of a turning area, which was urgently necessary.

"We are worried about the lack of turning space in this street", he said. "Disaster could follow any emergency, say involving the presence of the fire brigade or ambulance".

## Gas Not Likely To Be Stored In Mine

The disused Balmain Colliery was a highly unlikely site for the storage of natural gas, the Member for Balmain, Mr Roger Degen, was told in State Parliament.

Mr Degen had questioned the Minister for Mines, Mr W. Fife, about published reports that the Australian Gas Light Company was investigating use of the mine as a gas storage site.

Mr Degen told Mr Fife that use of the mine could pose a serious threat to public safety. Balmain Colliery had been closed because it was unsafe following the entry of water and gas.

The lives of hundreds of people would be endangered if the Government allowed natural gas to be stored under such conditions, Mr Degen said.

Mr Fife replied that it was true that the mine was being considered as a possible storage place for natural gas.

However, the Australian Gas Light Company had not made a formal application for use of the mine.

For reasons outlined by Mr Degen he thought it was highly unlikely that serious consideration would be given to that site.

## Column NINE

### SEX EDUCATION

It is hoped that parents in the Balmain peninsula are taking their children to the sessions in sex education being conducted here this week by the Family Life Movement.

Sex education can be handled so much more effectively by experts who are untroubled by the problem of parental sensitivity.

Far too often parents leave sex education of their sons and daughters to the hazardous field of chance.

The Family Life Movement's methods are sound, and are accepted by the community as indispensable.

Parents who have taken their children to their sessions report satisfying reaction both from themselves and their children.

This work should be on a permanent basis in all districts, giving parents the opportunity to take their children to sessions year by year as they grow up.

### NOISE CONTROL

The intention of the Minister for Environment Control to have an inquiry into noise reduction is along lines urged by this column recently.

The Minister refers to factory, construction work and motor vehicle noises and says there is a need to lay down standards in noise level, and to police them regularly.

The enforcement need is of course the essence of the contract.

This district is now seeing a similar problem in regard to control of ship's smoke.

Obviously the regulations governing this are unsatisfactory. Some observers doubt the Government's sincerity, and say the regulations are unenforceable at night.

When any Government pays only lip service to law enforcement it is making a mockery of government.

# More Units Likely In Zoning Compromise

What amounts to a compromise in zoning plans for some properties in Leichhardt Municipality is under consideration following an expression of opinion by the State Planning Authority of N.S.W. It could result in the granting of permission to certain developers to erect home unit buildings on land now otherwise zoned.

The State Planning Authority gave its opinion in a letter to Leichhardt Council in reply to a query regarding replacement of existing industrial development by residential flat buildings in areas to be zoned 2A Residential (a) in the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

The Planning Scheme is expected to be finalised by the end of this year.

In its answer, the S.P.A. expressed the opinion that, following prescription of the Planning Scheme, Council could change an existing "Non-conforming use" to another non-conforming use in a higher category.

The S.P.A. said that Council could permit such a change, and that it would not be necessary to make further provision for this by ordinance.

Council considered the reply at its last meeting.

It decided to inform the S.P.A. that it now felt justified in consider-

ing four development applications for the erection of residential flats on land at present used for purposes which would become non-conforming under the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

It will ask the S.P.A. for confirmation of that view.

The four proposals submitted to Council are for home unit development in Leichhardt, Balmain and Rozelle.

The Leichhardt proposal has been submitted by A.M.E. Furniture Pty. Ltd.

One for Balmain is by Meridian Housing & Development Pty. Ltd., who seeks to replace the huge ramshackle building in Church Street, Balmain, with home units.

This building, which runs between Cameron Street and Curtis Road, has been the subject of several applications recently, including two in connection with land transport connected with Mort Bay shipping activities.

The applicant wishes to subdivide the land into suitable blocks for residential flat or home unit development, and has pointed out that the proposal does not involve loss of water views.

Two-thirds of the land on which the present building stands was zoned living area, and one-third waterfront industrial (although the latter zoning has been suspended).

Under the Leichhardt Planning Scheme the pro-

posed zoning is light industrial. However, the Council has lodged an objection to its own proposal, in favour of residential (a) zoning.

The Town Planner, Mr A. Kenna, considers it reasonable to assume that the single-residential zoning will be that decided on.

The other two developmental applications before Council are from Bailey & Jorgenson Pty. Ltd., for a three-storey building of 24 home units in Union Street, Balmain; and Leask Hayes Pty. Ltd., for a building of 78 units in Denison Street, Rozelle.

Both the areas involved are zoned single residential in the Planning Scheme, but present use would become non-conforming thereunder.

**EX-MENTAL PATIENT'S PROBLEMS PORTRAYED**

What is it like to try to secure employment and rehabilitate yourself in society after three years in a mental institution?

This question is examined sympathetically and realistically by Mr John Gilders, of Birchgrove, in his first novel, "Man Alone", recently published by the Australasian Book Society.

Mr Gilders, an accountant by profession, has had about 30 short stories published in Australia and U.S.A.

The events in the story are located around Cal-

lan Park, Rozelle, and King's Cross.

After his release from hospital, the story's central figure, who was formerly an accountant, finds himself cut off from his former associates.

His wife has divorced him and he is estranged from his son.

The novel portrays the various problems of rehabilitation, especially as they affect a white-collar worker.

This book opens up an area of life which is seldom publicly discussed but which at some time or other touches many families.

**ATTEMPT TO HALT TOWN HALL PLAN AGAIN FAILS**

Balmain ward aldermen have failed in another attempt to halt negotiations by Leichhardt Council for the acquisition of property to enable a new Town Hall to be constructed in Leichhardt.

An amendment moved by Alderman Origlass to a motion in regard to the proposition was rejected by the "majority".

Council had before it reports that some owners of the relevant properties — in Wetherill Street, Leichhardt — were not willing to accept current valuations, but wanted a higher figure.

Council confirmed the action of the Mayor (Ald. L. Rodwell) who had directed that no action be taken over the acquisition until special valuations had been received.

Ald. Origlass's unsuccessful motion was that no further action should be taken on this matter, and that the Town Clerk report on four points:

- Possible future alterations of the boundaries of the Municipality.
- Desirability of siting the Council Chambers at a more central location.
- Possibilities in regard to Council's other properties.
- The question of the location being on the aeroplane flight path, and the lack of indication that the noise nuisance would not increase.

**REDUCTION OF NOISE: GOVT. TO INQUIRE**

The Minister for Environment Control, Mr J. G. Beale, has told State Parliament he intends to refer the question of noise to the State Pollution Control Commission to determine whether a reduction in noise levels can be brought about.

He was replying to a question asked by Mr J. G. Jackett, M.L.A. for Burwood.

Mr Beale said noise

pollution was one of the greatest problems affecting mankind.

"Noise in factories, noise caused by construction work, and noise emanating from motor vehicles are a world-wide problem", he said.

"Noise can impair health, although I believe there is still some doubt about the effects of various kinds and levels of noise on people.

"This probably still requires some research".

Mr Beale said the Motor Traffic Act prohibited the making of excessive noise by motor vehicles on public roads.

"The Police will issue a defect notice in respect of a vehicle that makes excessive noise," he said.

"However, the problem is to define what constitutes excessive noise.

"I believe we must deal firmly with people who make violent, strident noises that disturb the community.

"There is a need to lay down standards in noise level and to police them regularly".

## Greater Danger For Walkers In Dark Months

The Chief General Manager of the N.R.M.A., Mr. W. Mason, urges pedestrians to take special care in the cooler months ahead as earlier darkness coincides with peak-hour traffic conditions particularly hazardous for pedestrians.

He also urged motorists to take greater care, particularly in watching for pedestrians in failing light.

Last year 290 pedestrians were killed in N.S.W. out of a total of 1308 road deaths. This was 22 per cent, but the proportion for Sydney, Wollongong and Newcastle was around 40 per cent, emphasising the danger facing pedestrians in the cities.

The period 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. is the worst for road accidents, and 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. worst for road fatalities.

Mr Mason gave this advice to pedestrians:

- Wear or carry something light in colour to give motorists a better chance of seeing you.
- Don't assume driv-

ers can see you at night just because they have their lights on.

• A pedestrian should make sure that a car approaching a pedestrian crossing has a reasonable chance of stopping before he steps on to the crossing.

Mr Mason advised motorists to turn on their headlights at sunset.

The appropriate N.S.W. regulation on lighting up says that a driver must turn on his headlights between sunset and sunrise and at any other time "when there is insufficient daylight to render a person dressed in dark clothing discernible at a distance of 300 feet".

Other points for motorists to remember:

Be alert for pedestrians in dark clothing crossing the road, and reduce speed at night.

Make sure the windscreen and rear window are clean, and that the windscreen wipers are efficient.
