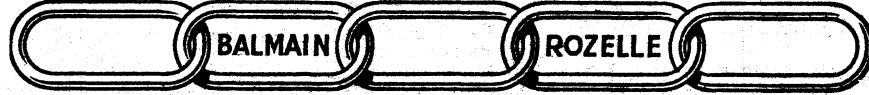

Complaints Of Terminal Noise, Smoke Are Renewed

Following further serious complaints by Balmain residents of noise and air pollution from the White Bay container terminal, Leichhardt Council is renewing its efforts to secure improvement of the situation.

Council's two committees handling these matters — the Noise Abatement and Air Pollution Committees—submitted reports to last Council meeting regarding the complaints.

One of these was in the form of a petition from M/s M. J. Corderoy and five others about terminal noise.

It said they were "Concerned and sleepless residents", and drew attention to constant night-time workings of the terminal directly opposite the homes of Vincent Street residents, especially between Jane and Stephen Streets.

It said that the volume of noise had increased sufficiently to disturb seriously the sleep of residents within a radius of at least two blocks.

The Noises

"Excruciating grinds, heavy crashes, loudspeaker addresses to workers, pumping noises and siren wails of 15 minutes' duration echo through our homes", the petition said.

"This pandemic continues throughout the entire night, reaching peak performance between 1 and 2 a.m."

The petition sought an arrangement with the container company to limit its activities to daylight hours, or at least to refrain from working between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

The petition added: "We are hopeful that under the new administration of this municipality something can at last be achieved to alleviate the

lic nuisance caused by this undesirable industry in the middle of this supposedly residential area.

"We are confident that you will be able to instigate some action in an area where your predecessors have so dismally failed".

Council decided to forward a copy of the petition to Seatainer Terminals Ltd., asking for its comment.

Meanwhile an observation report will be submitted to the next meeting of the committee.

This will include evening observations to establish the nature and times of noise emissions.

Ships' Smoke

Council expressed concern over some recent complaints of severe smoke emissions, reported to have come from ships berthed at the White Bay container terminal wharf.

One complaint from residents a couple of weeks ago was that the emission was the most severe for a long time.

Council asked its Chief Health Surveyor and Building Inspector, Mr R. S. Williams, to submit to the next meeting a case history of fallout from smoke emissions from ships in the Balmain area.

This will be used in an approach to the Maritime Services Board on the possibility of installing instant detection devices.

Council will point out to the Board that it considers the present smoke control regulations to be unsatisfactory.

The Mayor, Ald. N. Origlass, said the smoke emissions appeared to be associated with the cleaning of ships' boilers at the wharf.

Blowing of boiler tubes appeared to be an easier job done at the wharf than at sea, and therefore more desirable in the eyes of ships' captains.

Ald. Origlass said that with the greater accent now being placed by the community on anti-pollution measures, it was timely for the authorities to realise that they must have more regard for that sentiment on the part of residents, here and everywhere.

Mr Williams points out that local Councils are given some power to control noise.

Also they have some authority in regard to fallout occurring on land.

However, fallout from ships berthed at wharves is a matter for the Maritime Services Board.

Nevertheless the Minister for Environmental Control should be able to come up with some answer to the problem.

GREAT WORKER FOR RUGBY LEAGUE DIES

Balmain — and Rugby League football — are the poorer following the death in hospital last Wednesday after a long illness of Mr Harold Matthews, a pioneer of Rugby League in this district. His many friends mourn the loss.

Harold, who leaves a widow, Gladys, lived in the Balmain area until about 12 months ago, when he moved to Eastwood. He was 71 years old.

He was still convalescing last June from a heart attack when, to the delight of his friends, the Queen recognised the role he played in sport by awarding him the M.B.E. in this year's Birthday Honours.

Harold Matthews began his life-time duties on behalf of Rugby League in 1917, when he formed the Balmain Nationals Club, to take part in the junior competition.

The name was changed to Balmain Fitzroy Junior League Club in 1918.

Organiser

Harold was never a player, simply one of those rare individuals who gave his all as an organiser.

And an excellent organiser he was, too.

His satisfaction came not from success on the field, but from sheer hard work. Hence the code, and the players over two generations, owe him a great debt of gratitude.

Norman ("Latchem") Robinson, Secretary-Manager of the Balmain Leagues Club, a lifetime associate of Mr Matthews, paid a tribute to his old associate as he recalled the early days.

He spoke of his great ability as an organiser.

He remembered how they went to Birchgrove Superior, Public School together, and how Harold



got his first job with the Post Office, which involved pushing a bike.

He recalled how Harold formed the Nationals Club, and in 1923 became third-grade secretary of the Balmain Junior League, and in 1929 first-grade secretary.

Harold was Balmain secretary for 22 years, and was responsible for bringing many fine players here.

He also was a great organiser of trips for Balmain — in 1933 to North Queensland, and again in 1945; two trips to New Zealand, in 1946

and 1947; and a trip to France in 1949.

He became N.S.W. Rugby League secretary in 1951, but retired because of ill health in 1967. However, he continued in League administration as a vice-president of the N.S.W. Rugby League after his retirement as secretary.

Good Deeds

Mrs Matthews told The Link that her husband had followed the principle of: "If you can't do a good deed for somebody, never do a bad deed".

TERMINAL NUISANCES

Once again there are serious complaints from residents about Balmain container terminal noise and fallout in smoke emissions from ships berthed at the wharf.

If proved, these cannot be dismissed with a wave of the hand in the name of "progress". Vast annoyance to residents assuredly does not mean progress.

Leichhardt Council has no authority over ship fallout, and the Maritime Services Board appears content with the extraordinarily inept set of regulations it has introduced to control it.

Hope appears to lie only with the newly set-up Ministry of Environmental Control, hence an early approach to the Minister concerned, with as much evidence as possible to support a request for urgent action, is needed.

Terminal noises are another matter. Leichhardt Council is vested with some control, and has taken some action. We are astounded, though, that it has not been able to secure reasonable results.

We feel more enterprise by all concerned in handling the noise problem is urgently required.

In the end, of course, it comes right down to the desire—or ability?—of the terminal workmen to handle their equipment as quietly as possible, and thus do the right thing by their fellow men.

If company practice makes this difficult, this must be altered. Another approach to both the individual workmen as well as to the terminal operating company is called for.

If all other measures fail to improve the situation, it would not be unreasonable for Council to demand that work shall cease for a definite period at night.

She said Harold put everybody before himself. Four hours before he died—when he could hardly talk—he dictated a letter about football to his former secretary.

"Rugby League was his life", she said. "He always had a pencil and paper beside him when sitting at home, to write reminders on some Rugby League matter he thought of."

"Whenever he was going to Balmain he would say, 'I am going over to the garden suburb'."

"He had many sayings. One in reference to Rugby League was: 'The greatest game of all'. Another was: 'Play the game—not the man! Play the game—the best you can'."

Mrs. Matthews said that Harold had done much work on behalf of children.

Between seasons he organised cricket matches for them, and he raised thousands of dollars for spastic children by raffling autographs of prominent Rugby League players.

Tribute from Old Boys

A tribute to Harold Matthews comes from Mr Tommy McCoy, on behalf of Balmain Fitz-

roy Junior Rugby League Old Boys.

"Harold was a born organiser and the most dedicated Rugby League man of all time", he says.

"The greatest game of all" was his own phrase. Rugby League was his whole life.

"Prior to 1939, when he became Secretary to Balmain Club, he was for some years an executive of the popular local newspaper, The Link.

"In those early years, when money and jobs were hard to come by, many with no employment, Harold kept the club together. No one was ever marked financially in his little black book.

"During the depression the Fitzroy boys drifted away, and many were not heard of until 1950, when Harold, with two other stalwarts, Norman Robinson and Jim Russell, decided to contact as many as possible to have a reunion.

"The response was very gratifying, and the first of these took place in May of that year, when it was resolved to make this an annual affair.

"Helping others was Harold's philosophy. 'Do what you can, when you can, if you can' was his creed. He was a friend to everyone who knew him, and his popularity, especially in the Balmain area, was universal.

"He became a legend in his lifetime. This

was borne out by the large number of mourners present at his funeral—commencing with the service in Balmain Methodist Mission before cremation at Rookwood.

"The funeral route towards Rookwood through Balmain and Rozelle was thronged with people paying their last respects.

"We shed a silent tear as we said farewell to our dear comrade whom we will always remember as a 'Great guy'."

Glebe Men's Home: Move By Council

Leichhardt Council has decided to ask Balmain Hospital to confine its interest in the former Glebe Home for Aged Men to the actual home, and not to the welfare centre attached.

The hospital now has a lease of the property, for the purpose of introducing a full geriatric service at this spot.

A minute to last meeting from the Mayor, Ald. N. Origlass—endorsed by Council—said that neither Council nor the hospital originally had the intention to include Council's separate welfare centre in the transfer of the home to the hospital on a 50 years' lease at \$1 a year.

The Mayor felt it would be a retrograde step for Council to divest itself of its welfare centre.

Also, its large and well-equipped kitchen should be retained by Council for the likely need to prepare meals for Council's general Meals-on-wheels service.

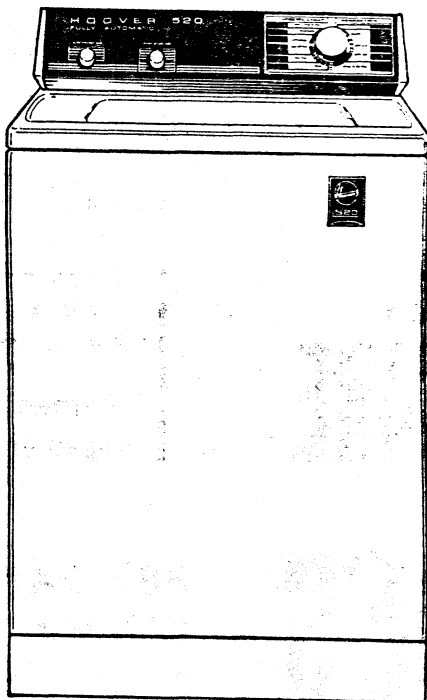

Council News In Brief

Centres For Child Minding

Leichhardt Council has decided to investigate the possibility of setting up child minding centres in Balmain Town Hall, Glebe Town Hall, and Annandale Council Chamber.

Meanwhile it will make arrangements to accommodate children of a certain age in existing kindergartens in the municipality under the control of the Council and the Kindergarten Union of N.S.W.

Such arrangements will include the alteration of existing starting and finishing hours to cater for parents, particularly would-be working mothers.

Expressway Petition

The committee set up by the public meeting protesting against the expressway plans in Leichhardt Municipality has decided on the form of the petition to be circulated among residents, for signature by them.

The petition will be circulated in all wards of the municipality.

It will call for a Royal Commission on the expressway proposals before a start is made on them.

It will stress that the expressway proposals are some 20 years old, and that there is no evidence as far as is known that their validity has been re-examined in the light of more modern transport developments.

The petition will say that the expressways would not solve the problem of traffic; that they would carry only one quarter of the number of people now carried on the western suburban railway tracks; and that they would be in competition with the railways.

Planning Procedure

The Mayor of Leichhardt, Ald. N. Origlass, reports that a conference was held on November 3 between Council representatives and representatives of the State Planning Authority on the subject of the S.P.A.'s Balmain study.

The S.P.A. representatives explained the principles of the Study, which will have impact upon development in this area.

It is expected that the matter will be mentioned at next meeting of the Council.

Meanwhile the S.P.A. has written to the Council reminding it that the Minister for Local Government was concerned at proposals for the erection of tall residential buildings on lands adjacent to the harbour foreshores.

The Minister, it said, would revoke consents if Council did not consider the views of the Authority.

Restaurant For Balmain

Leichhardt Council has approved a development application by Mr W. R. Sisley, for permission to convert the basement of premises at 337 Darling Street, Balmain, into a licensed steakhouse bistro/restaurant.

Approval is subject to satisfactory arrangements being made for off-street parking for at least 12 vehicles at a nearby service station.

The bistro/restaurant is not to be open except between 6 p.m. and 1 a.m. Mondays to Saturdays, and music played there shall be limited to soft recorded background music.

The proposal is for the provision of a cocktail bar, and a restaurant area for 13 tables seating 48 persons. Estimated cost of improvements is \$20,000.

Carrying Of Arms

Leichhardt Council has decided that its by-law inspectors will no longer go armed when on duty. Their firearms will be withdrawn.

A Mayoral minute pointed out that it was not a condition of employment that the inspectors carry a gun.

Only a few rangers/inspectors working for Sydney metropolitan Councils were issued with firearms; the payrolls and other Council monies were fully insured against theft; and the inspectors could be more usefully employed on park patrol than in driving behind cars carrying Council money.

Also the inspectors, alone at night observing the handling of stolen vehicles or goods or the illegal stripping of a vehicle, or drinking in parties in a public place or reserve or trespassing suspiciously on Council's property, should immediately report such incidents to the police.

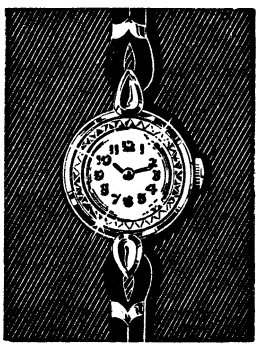

Ovals Problem Likely To Be Solved

The Mayor of Leichhardt, Ald. N. Origlass, believes a happy solution is possible of the problem of improving Leichhardt Oval for use as a home ground for Balmain District Rugby League and A.P.I.A. soccer matches. He expressed this belief following a conference last week.

At the conference were Aldermen Origlass and Bray (Deputy Mayor), Council officers, and four representatives of each of the two clubs.

The meeting had been called by the Mayor, who had written to the clubs saying that both Leichhardt Oval and Lambert Park required major development if they were to cater for the two codes using them.

He said that Council's expenditure commitments gave a frightening total, but it was anxious to cater as much as possible for the clubs and football enthusiasts.

He wanted to explore the possibility of co-operation between both Clubs and the Council, and hoped to secure answers to the following:

- Feasibility of joint use of reconstructed

Leichhardt Oval for match play only, and joint use of Lambert Park for training purposes.

- Possibility of transforming Leichhardt Oval into a first-class football ground for the 1973 season which would not be subject to surface deterioration through overwork.

Ald. Origlass told The Link that there was a long discussion at the conference.

Both clubs gave an indication that they would be happy to co-operate in an effort to effect a solution of the problem of joint use of the oval.

The A.P.I.A. representatives stressed that they did not want to be put into a position of being regarded as intruders on the long-established tenure of the Rugby League Club.



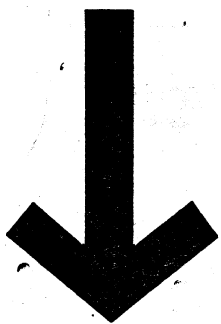

Do You Know?

That an island 200 yards off Balmain Peninsula, which the aborigines called Mel, once housed Thunderbolt, one of Australia's most notorious bushrangers?

In 1838 the convict establishment was removed from Goat Island to Cockatoo Island, 1 1/4 miles up harbour. In 1901 the island was handed over to the Sydney Harbour Trust, which used its buildings as headquarters of the Port Fire Brigade, now known as the Maritime Services which they could not stray.

The most famous inmate of both the penitentiaries was an Australian-born bush-ranger Frederick Ward, known as "Thunderbolt", who had been sentenced to life imprisonment for cattle stealing.

He later swam to freedom from Cockatoo Island. Taking to the bush in north-western New South Wales he lived there by robbery under arms for 6 years until he was shot dead by a police constable in May, 1870.

Towards the end of Governor Darling's term of office (1825-1831) the prison Hulk Phoenix was moved from her berth near Sussex Street to the Island. Prisoners sent there were "hard cases" awaiting transportation to Van Diemen's Land or to Norfolk Island.

Sydney's first permanent gaol at Darlinghurst was not completed until 1841. The prisoners on Goat Island were employed quarrying building stone for local and city building.

Most of the stone buildings erected on the island by convict labour, including guard houses, stores and a wharf, remain in use today in a perfect state of preservation.

The biggest building, the Arsenal (gun

CENTRE FIGHTS PRESSURES UPON CHILDREN

What sort of place will Balmain be in 20 years' time? What is likely to be the result of all the pressures now being exerted upon young people today?

These questions were examined by the organiser of the Birchgrove Creative Leisure Centre, Mrs Robin Jones, in an address to Balmain Rotary Club.

Mrs Jones said that when she thought of the sort of place she would like Balmain to be now, and in 20 years' time, she felt the important question was:

• What opportunities are necessary to encourage young people to be energetic, and productive rather than destructive, and to have that sympathy for their fellow men which spills over into community involvement?

Mrs Jones said it was sad that such a small proportion of young people today felt a driving urge to devote a portion of their time to serving the community.

Another saddening trend in young people today was a lack of energy and a tendency to be spectators rather than participants.

Apart from activities within the small family circle, said Mrs Jones, after-school activities in the Balmain area included junior sport, Police Boys' Club, and scouts and guides.

Those clubs encouraged the team spirit, good citizenship and service.

Much of the time was spent in total physical activity in a fairly competitive atmosphere, or in activities following carefully prescribed paths.

However, a balance was necessary between the physical, mental and emotional.

How were the qualities of ingenuity and inventiveness to be nourished?

Mrs Jones said there were now twice as many

babies attending the Balmain-Rozelle Baby Health Centre as there were six years ago, and this increase had to be absorbed into the educational system.

Competition

The present trend in our educational system was to learn more at an earlier age, and competition was increased in an attempt to qualify for a better high school and to make the quota for University entrance.

"Stress is often laid on succeeding at the expense of one's fellow men", the speaker added these trends of society".

"There is also a trend towards more women working. Consequently more children will be swept aside to watch T.V. whilst the work in

the house is dispatched as summarily as possible.

"Likewise more children will be left to their own devices for an hour or so after school, and there will be a tired rather than a receptive mother in the evening.

"The children will thus be increasingly robbed of the opportunities for imitation and identification—the very forces which would bring confidence in coping with the environment and the acceptance of the ideals of the parents".

Mrs Jones asked: Could not Australians learn from current American social problems and try to make some compensations before we were plunged into a similar experience?

Mrs Jones said the aim of the Creative Leisure movement was to provide facilities for the energies of children to be freely indulged.

It aimed at channeling a portion of children's energy into the creative arts and crafts in an atmosphere of enjoyment of the skill and beauty of achievement (of oneself and others).

The children were in contact with adults who valued everyone's achievement and who encouraged the children to strive to improve their own capabilities rather than compete against others.

Balance

This provided a necessary balance to the stress on competition, which was growing stronger daily in our community.

Without such a balance, that part of the personality which later involved the individual in community service would not be nourished.

Mrs Jones concluded: "Many children in Balmain, I feel, are in some degree missing out on opportunities to develop confidence, productive drive, ingenuity, inventiveness and the sympathy that makes for a well-integrated and caring community.

"This has led us to establish a Creative Leisure Centre in Birchgrove.

"We shall work to try to compensate for the increasing stresses on children, in the hope that we can stem or even reverse in this district
