Two Clubs Offer New Plan For Oval

A solution of the problem of reconstructing Leichhardt Oval for use as home ground by Balmain Rugby League and A.P.I.A. Soccer Clubs appears imminent.

Leichhardt Council is expected this week to endorse proposals involving expenditure by the two clubs of \$400,000 on oval redevelopment, subject to Government approval.

The proposal would relieve Council of having to raise funds for the purpose.

This would be a most difficult matter in view of Council's ordinary financial situation and the virtual impossibility of securing Government approval to raising a loan for the particular purpose.

Last week the Mayor, Ald. N. Origlass, and the Deputy Mayor, Ald. P. Bray, accompanied by Council officers, met representatives of the two clubs and had a lengthy discussion on the subject.

This was their second meeting, following an approach by the Mayor to the clubs suggesting a conference to explore the possibility of co-operation in re-developing Leichhardt Park and Lambert Park for major football.

Co-operation

Ald. Origlass was impressed with the measure of co-operation shown by the two clubs between themselves, and to the Council in its efforts to provide adequate facilities for players and spectators.

The proposal, as put to Council, is that the two clubs propose to join in spending \$400,000 on reconstructing Leichhardt Oval into a top-grade football ground, to be used jointly by the two clubs.

The work would follow suggestions made by the feasibility study carried out by the Council's engineering staff.

It involves excavations to lower the level of the ground, reorientation of the seating, and provision of new seating and lavatory accommodation.

The clubs' offer to make such a big expenditure is tied in with

Council's approval for a joint approach by the clubs and Council to the Government on the subject.

The Minister for Lands would be asked to approve the establishment of a new trust in respect of the oval section of Leichhardt Park.

The clubs are naturally very reluctant to expend so much capital unless they are given security of tenure for their operations.

At present one trust covers the whole park. If the Minister is in agreement, the proposal is to form two trusts.

One would be for the park exclusive of the oval; the other for the oval section itself, which would be representative of the two clubs and the Council.

Ald. Origlass believes that one of the considerations that would weigh with Council is the long-term use of the oval as the home ground for The Tigers, as well as for the A.P.I.A. soccer club.

Traditionally, the oval itself is locked against normal public use in order to protect the assets.

The Mayor says that Council appreciates the need of the municipality for top-class facilities for players and spectators in both the football codes mentioned.

It recognises the inconvenience and additional travelling costs to the large number of residents who are supporters of the clubs if these are forced out of the area by inadequate facilities.

And it is an important consideration that the proposal would not present any financial burden to the ratepayers.

The Biggest

"These are the two biggest organisations in the municipality", the Mayor told The Link, "And use of Leichhardt Oval as a football ground has been unchallenged for years, and accepted by the citizens."

"Council is embarrassed by the inadequacy of the oval for this long-established use, but cannot give any priority to fund raising to correct this inadequacy."

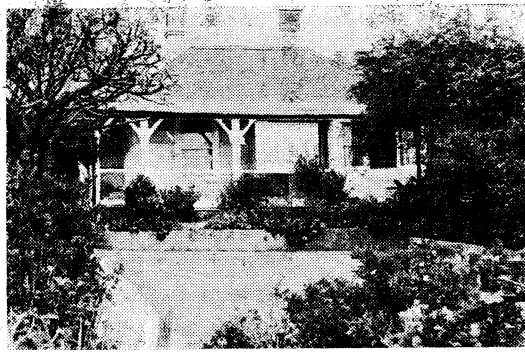

Mayor's Reply To Criticism

Commenting on criticism by The Link and developers of the home unit building code adopted in principle at last meeting of Leichhardt Council, the Mayor, Ald. N. Origlass, asks the public not to judge the suggested code harshly at this stage.

The Link said it was horrified to note how savage the code was, and that if decided upon in its present form it would discourage developers from taking an active interest in the Balmain peninsula.

Ald. Origlass said that the decision to adopt the code in principle, subject to reconsideration after noting public reaction, was an implementation of the decision on the subject of town planning made by Council on October 19.

This was:
• That Council considered the present development controls in areas zoned 2(b) in the Leichhardt Planning Scheme were permitting development of unsatisfactory quality.

• That Council intended to review its planning policies, and as soon as possible adopt plans and development controls to guide development of the various parts of the municipality.

• That to ensure that development which took

place in the meantime did not prejudice Council's planning objectives, an interim development control code for 2(b) zones would be adopted.

Ald. Origlass said that the code which Council had now adopted in principle envisaged a restriction which was required to give Council a breathing space to enable a detailed plan to be worked out.

That detailed plan would take into account the optimum development necessary to produce better living conditions and an increase in population in the district.

The State Planning Authority's Balmain and Glebe Studies were being taken by Council as a basis for the planning.

The plan would be based on population density considered appropriate for various areas. In the meantime it was necessary to stop development that could prejudice the permanent plan.

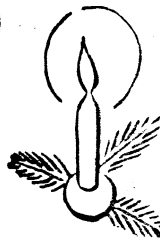

MEETING VIEWS ON HOME UNIT CODE

The public meeting in Leichhardt Town Hall last Monday night, called by the Council to secure public reaction to its home unit code proposals, was completely harmonious and free of opposition.

About 350 people attended. They appeared to represent a cross section of the community, and included several well-known architects and developers (who did not express any views).

The meeting was chaired by the Mayor, Ald. N. Origlass, and was attended by representatives of the State Planning Authority and of the district residents' organisations — The Balmain Association, Glebe Society and Annandale Association.

Outlines

Dr John Rosseth, S.P.A. Divisional Planner for Research, explained the Authority's Studies for Balmain and Glebe, with the aid of large-scale maps and slides.

Council's Town Planner, Mr A. Kenna, outlined the code he had proposed to Council, copies of which were available to those attending the meeting.

Mr Kenna stressed that the proposals referred only to areas zoned for home unit building in the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

Ald. Sandblom outlined the views of the Glebe aldermen regarding total revision of the Leichhardt Planning Scheme.

He put forward a series of revisions of the code based on a study made by the planning groups of The Balmain Association, Glebe Society, and Annandale Association.

Mrs Robyn Jones, organiser of the Birchgrove Creative Leisure Centre, showed some slides of

Balmain and overseas, giving examples of residential building.

Mr Brickhill, a former Mayor of Ryde, drew attention to the fact that the Kenna code made no provision for sunlight control.

Mr Bill Donaldson, a local resident, declared that residents should have a very strong say regarding high rise buildings in their own areas.

Ex-aldermen Thompson spoke on similar lines. He said the people of Leichhardt Municipality were putting their trust in the present Council to do the right thing.

Civic Groups

Mr W. Haesler, President of The Balmain Association, put the views of the three civic groups.

He proposed two recommendations, which involved principally the adoption of an interim code pending detailed studies of the areas.

Mr Haesler also stressed the urgency of returning the present Leichhardt Planning Scheme with its objections to the S.P.A.

His two suggestions were:

- To implement an interim code which would not permit any development to a density greater than .8 floor space ratio until the detailed planning recommended by the S.P.A. had been undertaken.

- That in place of the proposed schedule of floor space ratios, the recommendation of the S.P.A. for "Preservation of existing scale and

character" be adopted for all parts of the municipality.

Other speakers pointed out that social environmental studies should be made along with planning studies.

One speaker made the point that residents should have a say, and that if they wanted high rise in the area, no person outside the area should be allowed to involve himself in the question.

Encouraged

The meeting concluded with an address by Mr Graham Andrews, Assistant Chief Planner of the S.P.A., who indicated that planning for people was a complicated process, and that the Authority took a lot of notice of local residents' views.

Mr Andrews said the S.P.A. was encouraged by the attendance at the meeting of so many people who obviously had a keen interest in planning of their municipality.

He urged people to study the S.P.A. proposals in detail and to provide the Council with suggestions.

The meeting, he added, highlighted the key points in Council's analysis of the planning principles. He hoped that out of it would eventually emerge a plan of the municipality that would be acceptable to all.

Ald. Origlass in conclusion thanked those attending, and said the views expressed at the meeting would be taken into consideration by Council in determining the adoption of a realistic building code.



Hospital Reports Successful Year Of Service

The vital service rendered to this district by Balmain Hospital was reported at the annual meeting of subscribers last Wednesday. The report indicated a most successful year.

The meeting was attended by about 75 people, mainly subscribers to hospital funds.

The President of the Board of Directors, Mrs D. J. Wakefield, addressing the meeting, gave a synopsis of the year's activities, and thanked the many people and organisations who had contributed to the hospital funds.

Mrs Wakefield specially thanked those who had contributed to the special outpatients' building fund appeal.

Finances

The Treasurer, Mr W. Robinson, commenting on the hospital's finances, said he felt that the year's results must be viewed as satisfactory in the light of spiralling costs generally, which faced all businesses.

He thought that a deficit of \$30,000 on a turnover of nearly \$2 million was a very satisfactory result in the conditions.

He expressed concern, however, at the amount of outstanding patients' fees, which were now close to \$200,000.

Mr Robinson urged

more people to join hospital contribution funds. About 30 per cent of the people in Balmain, Rozelle and Leichhardt were not subscribers to the insurance funds.

This, he said, was sad, because it brought great financial hardship to individuals (in addition to making it difficult for hospitals to collect fees).

Mr Robinson said the hospital would embark on a vigorous follow-up of outstanding fees. This was in fairness to its creditors.

He hoped that those who owed the hospital money and were approached with requests to pay would honour their obligations for services rendered.

Part payment would be accepted from anyone who applied and indicated they were in necessitous circumstances.

Discussing the annual report, Mr K. R. Boylan, Chief Executive Officer, said the highlight was that they were within 1.8% of their budget for the year, despite spiralling costs.

Highlights of the report are:

An amount of \$22,493 has been raised as the hospital's contribution towards the total cost of the new Outpatients' Casualty project. It will be necessary to re-open the appeal to raise the balance of the \$50,000 required.

Building

The response from the people of the Municipality, business houses, schools, Rotary, Jaycees and local organisations has been wonderful.

The Auxiliary and the Appeals officer have worked tirelessly over the past 12 months, and the continued activity of the workers on the chocolate wheels has provided a steady flow of income.

Planning for the new project has progressed steadily, with many meetings with the Regional Officer and the architect to finalise details.

Due to the change in design and major change in policy, it has been decided to establish the new facilities in two stages.

The major change in policy, which has greatly increased the cost, is the decision to construct a 36-bed ward on top of Thornton House to compensate for the loss of beds from Harry Williams ward, and conversion of the male medical ward, (David Easton ward) to an intensive-

care unit.

First stage of the development is estimated to cost \$670,000, and the time-table for its development provides for all documentation to be completed by June 30 next, at which point tenders could be invited.

Acquisition of properties in Sorrie Street and Booth Street for future development is proceeding.

It is hoped that in time the hospital can negotiate for the purchase of ten houses in the area to provide space for additional facilities needed to cope with population increases.

New Units

The cardiac unit was opened during the year and is functioning very satisfactorily.

Further financial support from the Auxiliary has enabled special monitoring equipment to be purchased for the operating theatre to replace the superseded cardio-scope and defibrillator.

The new medical records department is fully operational. A printed report of all diseases and illnesses is prepared annually in accordance with the World Health Organisation standard international classification.

It is estimated that about 20 years' records can be accommodated in the new department, which also incorporates a reporting room for use by medical officers.

Main increase in costs of the hospital during the year occurred under the heading of salary and wages, the result of major increases in salary rates for nursing and non-nursing personnel following a ward increase granted by the Courts.

The Board hopes the higher rates of pay will induce a greater number of girls to enter the nursing profession.

During the year ended June 30, the adjusted daily average of patients was 211.4. There were 2,512 operations performed in the operating theatres and 695 babies were born in the maternity unit.

The year had its difficult periods due to a reduction in nurse recruitment.

One of the wards was closed for a few months, but extra trained nurse recruitment enabled the ward to be reopened, and some of the special units (coronary care and intensive care) and additional O.P. clinics to be an intensive-staffed.

Limits On Truck Loads

Leichhardt Council is seeking legal advice on the possibility of setting load limits on trucks carrying containers to and from the A.N.L. Mort Bay terminal at certain times.

It decided to do this upon the motion of Ald. I. Wyner (Balmain ward).

Planting Of Trees

Leichhardt Council's Engineer, Mr G. A. Wilson, reports that 510 trees have been planted in streets and parks of the municipality since June, 1970.

Small Leaf Peppermint. Grafton St., 29 Port Jackson Cypress.

Rozelle Ward: Roseberry St., 25 Brush Box (planted by Balmain Association, with Council help). Beattie St. Playground, 6 Broad Leaf Paper Bark, 30 Small Leaf Peppermint, 18 Swamp Oak, 4 London Plane (planted by Balmain Association, with Council help). Isabella St., 6 Sweet Scented Tea Tree. Darling St., 141 Claret Ash.

There have been fewer plantings during the past year than in recent years to avoid too great an accumulation of young plantings needing watering maintenance.

Council's only street flusher is used for watering young trees.

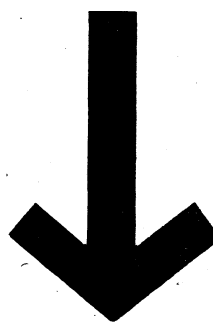
Mr Wilson says that trees are planted in streets when a substantial demand by a majority of residents indicates that trees will not be subject to indifferent acceptance and care and where conditions such as footpath width, depth of soil and various other factors (including finance) permit.

Height Of Kerbside

The footpath at the southern edge of the pedestrian crossing at Loyalty Square, Balmain, is to be scooped to reduce the kerb height of 8 ins to a height of 4 ins following a suggestion by the Deputy Mayor, Ald. P. O. Bray.

Ald. Bray said the height of the kerb made things difficult for partially disabled people and mothers with strollers.

Cost of the work will be about \$50. If satisfactory, attention might be given to similar conditions elsewhere in the municipality.

Do You Know?

That before the end of the 18th century a settler named George Whitfield established an orchard near Long Nose Point?

It was on this property that John Birch, Macquarie's paymaster, later built for himself the earliest permanent building on the Balmain Peninsula and called it Birchgrove House.

It was a charming Georgian home, and was accessible only by a private wharf from Snails Bay.

The house itself was ill-fated and in 1822 a gruesome double murder occurred there.

After the orchard failed, the property was subject to vandalism and larceny and this magnificent building became dilapidated and untidy.

It is almost beyond understanding that this truly historic building fell into the hands of speculators.

The grand estate was whittled away piece by piece, until in 1967 Birchgrove

House was demolished to make way for a block of home units.

It must be of concern to all of us that Balmain's first and most significant house no longer graces the Balmain foreshore.

We trust that the growing awareness of history and beauty in the area will never permit our other historic buildings to suffer the same fate.
