Column NINE Your Rate Is To **Be Discussed**

The public meeting called by Leichhardt Council for this Thursday night, at Leichhardt Town Hall, to discuss questions affecting the rate for next year, is a further implementation of the pre-election promise to refer to the people major items of Council policy.

The occasion is of more importance than usual, in view of two vital factors-the continuing spiralling of costs, and the revaluation of properties in Leichhardt Municipality by the Valuer General.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the draft estimates of income and expenditure for next year.

When adopted, the estimates will form the basis of fixing the rate in the dollar to be charged on the unimproved capital value of ratable land.

It is not quite certain what the Council hopes to achieve from such a public meeting, seeing that one of the main planks of the new aldermen in their election campaign was that they pledged to do everything possible to keep rates down.

While this does not amount to a straight-out declaration that the rate would not be increased, it does in the popular view virtually amount to that.

In striking the rate, Council will have to face up to the fact that revaluation of ratable properties has increased their U.C.V. by what appears to be an average of approximately 130 per cent.

Some valuation increases have been greater than that --- much greater in some instances - and others less.

It is considered that a rate of 1.3 cents in the dollar U.C.V. will on the average be necessary to yield sufficient revenue to maintain Council expenditure at its pre-

1. Continuing increase in normal costs, especially rises granted by the courts in wages and salaries.

2. Any major rise in costs through addition of "Welfare" types of expenditure.

The first is inevitable, although major relief from charges comes in the form of abandonment of main road charges and payroll tax on Councils.

The second is of course in the hands of the Council. Any new type of service of a major kind will naturally lift up general costs —and the rate.

Another factor of importance is a claimed substantial deficiency in the Town Planning Reserve fund, inherited from the previous Council. This would be a point in favour of the new Council, and decidedly against the former body.

Always to be kept in mind, of course, is the question of efficiency of administration, plus any economy which can be made without reducing essential services.

The Council must answer to the bar of public opinion in this respect.


These, then, are the issues to be considered at this Thursday night's meeting. The meeting could possibly be lively, since people's pockets are involved.

The Link considers that the time has arrived for a searching look at costs and the question of economy through greater efficiency.
