Action by local State Member

No concessions on water rates

Ratepayers living within Leichhardt Municipality will not receive concessional water rates in 1974-75 despite attempts by the State Member for Balmain, Mr Roger Degen, to have them granted.

Mr Degen said this week that a new system of rating would, however, be introduced on July 1, 1975, to apply from that financial year onwards.

Valuations

Properties in Leichhardt Municipality would be rated on valuations made at July 1, 1973, for the financial year 1975-76, he added.

The new system would allow rates increases to be spread over ratepayers in general rather than in particular areas which are subject to re-valuation.

"The system will permit a change in the basis of rating of residential

properties from assessed annual value to un-improved value," Mr Degen said.

"The Water Board's area will be completely revalued at two-year intervals with new valuations being determined at a common base rate on January 1, 1973."

Meanwhile, Mr Degen has sought a special rebate for property owners in Leichhardt Municipality.

He made the request to the Minister for Public Works, Mr Leon Punch, following a NSW Government concession allowed to certain municipalities — excluding

Leichhardt — last year and the year before that.

Rebate

Mr Punch said the 1972 concessions were introduced after revaluations that year by the Valuer-General and had amounted to a 50 per cent rebate on water rates increases.

They had been granted to lessen the impact on home owners faced with steeply increased annual values which have been assessed on their properties.

Similar rebates had been authorised during 1974-75 for those districts revalued in 1972.

I couldn't be more excited. At least avocados are back and they really turn me on.

They're pretty expensive but they're worth it. You don't have to do any preparation, you can serve them in seconds, and, they're absolutely delicious.

Temptation

Sometimes it's not easy to judge the ripeness of avocados. Well, resist the temptation to squeeze them. Ask your green grocer instead. He can tell you exactly which ones are ready.

If not needed for a few days, firm avocados will ripen nicely in the fruit basket. Then you can keep them fresh for about a week by putting them in the fridge.

The ripening process, can be hurried along if you've been landed with 2 or 3 hard ones, by putting them in a brown paper bag.

Once you've cut an avocado either eat it straight away or sprinkle it with lemon juice so that the flesh doesn't go black. A cut half, tightly wrapped in gladwrap, will keep its rich colour for 24 hours or so in the fridge.

There are all sorts of exciting ways to serve avocados. My favourite way is to serve them plain with just a simple salad dressing.

Don't even bother to make up the dressing. Why go to the trouble

when there's such a lot of ready-made dressings available?

Try French or Thousand Island dressing for example — either will add just the necessary zing to complement the avocado's delicate flavour.

Cut the fruit lengthways, ease out the stone and fill the hollow in each half with the dressing you like best. It should be soft enough to eat with a spoon.

Try these recipes too.

Exotic potatoes

Ingredients:

1 avocado
1 cup of shredded cabbage
½ cup bottled coleslaw dressing
4 potatoes, baked in their jackets
Sprigs of parsley

Method:

Split avocado lengthwise, remove stone and skin and cut into cubes. Then toss the avocado with the cabbage and dressing. Cool potatoes and cut in half. Serve the halves topped with the avocado mixture, adding parsley sprigs for decoration.

Chicken salad

Ingredients:

3 cups cooked rice (1 cup uncooked)
¾ cup mayonnaise
2 oranges, peeled and sliced
1 chicken, cooked and jointed

2 avocados, peeled and sliced
Sprigs of parsley

Method:

Combine rice, mayonnaise and orange slices. Place in the centre of a serving platter. Place chicken pieces on one end of the dish and slices of avocado on the other. Garnish with sprigs of parsley.



Imagine how exciting these would look, for a special evening, served with a little white wine by candlelight.

(Australian standard metric cup and spoon measure are used. All cup and spoon measures are level.)

I'm starting to bore all my friends. But I can't stop talking about my new freezer.

It makes life so much easier. You only have to make sandwiches once a week — or once a month for that matter.

And when you make a casserole, do twice the quantity, freeze what's left and serve it in 4 or 5 months time! Think of all those time-saving frozen goodies in the supermarket that you can stock up on too.

Freezer

If, like me, you've been used to a little fridge that won't even freeze ice cubes, you'll know that owning a real live freezer is heaven.

Of course, lots of my friends have proper modern fridges with separate freezer compartments on top or at the side. That's almost as

good — you get just the same efficiency even if you do miss out on some space.

When preparing your sandwiches it's necessary to choose fillings that freeze well. Vegemite, cheese, cold meats, egg, hundreds and thousands, peanut butter and jam are all excellent. Steer clear of tomato, lettuce and other salad fillings as

Raisin bread and all kinds of other baked goods freeze well too. I always keep sliced bread in the freezer — very handy for snacks. If there's no time to thaw, a frozen slice of bread can be popped under the grill and turned into hot toast in seconds.

Buying in bulk when various foods are plentiful and cheap is not only practical but helps you vary menus all through the year. It keeps things interesting and you'll pay for that freezer before you know it.

My bank manager doesn't understand me. It's not my fault that I can't make ends meet.

However, he is looking rather cross, so it seems as if this will have to be economy week. Rice is always good in these circumstances, and I haven't had it for ages.

If you're feeling the pinch too, try these really inexpensive recipes. They all serve 2 but you can double up on the quantities if you like.

Tuna kedgeroe

Ingredients:

1 cup uncooked long grain rice
1 onion, finely chopped
2 tablespoons butter
200 g (6½ oz) can chunk style tuna
2 hard-boiled eggs
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Salt and pepper to taste

Method:

Cook rice in plenty of boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Fry onion in butter until soft. Flake the tuna and add to the onion together with one hard-boiled egg (chopped). Mix lightly with fork and heat through. Season to taste and add the hot rice. Place in a serving dish and garnish with the remaining egg, cut into wedges, and chopped parsley.

Another good thing about rice is that it can be used as an accompaniment to so many dishes — try Vermicelli

Chicken Rice instead of potatoes with casseroled chicken. It's quick and easy to make.

Ingredients:

125 g (4 oz) thin vermicelli, crushed
90 g (3 oz) butter
1 cup uncooked rice
5 chicken stock cubes
3 cups hot water

Method:

Brown vermicelli in about a third of the butter. Add rice, crumbled stock cubes and water. Bring to the boil and cook until rice is tender. Drain, mix through the remaining butter and serve.

A scrumptious dessert and a change from ordinary rice pudding, is Pineapple Rice Delight. I think your family will like it — the Man in My Life sure does!

Ingredients:

2 cups cooked rice (2/3 cup uncooked)
¼ teaspoon ground ginger
½ teaspoon cinnamon
425 g (15 oz) can pineapple pieces, undrained
¼ cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon melted butter

Method:

Combine rice, ginger, cinnamon, pineapple, syrup, sugar and butter. Place in a greased casserole, cover and heat through in a moderate oven (350°F to 375°F) for 20 minutes.

I'm going to scream if I see another sandwich. They're dreary, boring and how can I lose weight?

The sandwich brigade can have it on their own. Give me a couple of hard boiled eggs and a sausage any day.

There are loads of other interesting goodies to take along. They're easy as pie and not nearly as fattening!

How about trying celery sticks stuffed with liverwurst or home-made pate, and slices of cold meat wrapped around asparagus spears or pieces of rock melon?

Our traffic problems



Most streets in Balmain and Rozelle shopping areas are an almost constant problem to both passing and parking traffic. They are either too narrow or too full of cars, some of which are forced to park in double lanes.

Parking areas planned for Christmas rush

Christmas shopping in Balmain and Rozelle will be much more convenient for the motorist this festive season if the municipal town planner, Mr Arthur Kenna, has his way.

"I am hopeful that two houses bought by the council in Merton Street will be demolished and the space made available for Rozelle shoppers for Christmas," he told 'The Link' in an interview this week.

"I am also hopeful that the Police Traffic Department will have arranged before the Christmas shopping rush those changes which the council has already approved for the Balmain shopping areas."

Frontage

The two houses in Merton Street are adjacent to each other. Mr. Kenna said the combined frontage of 60 feet and the depth of 100 feet ought to provide parking for 12 cars on each side with a 24-foot central aisle.

The Merton Street homes were recently purchased when they were declared unfit for domestic use.

Mr Kenna said he was still interested in acquiring similar properties which could be suitably utilised for shopper parking either at Balmain or Rozelle.

The Balmain parking scheme now on hand is designed to take double-parking out of the district.

The present half-hour restriction along Darling Street is to remain, but there will be provision for the parking of about 20 cars on both sides of streets abutting Darling Street.

Signs

Restrictive parking signs are to be erected

Nurses to graduate

The Balmain Traffic Branch is currently arranging for the signs to be provided by the Department of

Transport. If these signs can be obtained shortly, the new restrictions and additional parking will be in action before Christmas.

LET'S COOK SWEET MINCE

1 1/2 lbs Sharp apples
3/4 lbs raisins
1/4 lb mixed peel
3/4 lb currants
3/4 lb suet
3/4 lb sultanas
2 ozs. skinned and coarsely chopped almonds
1/2 teaspoon ea. of grated nutmeg cinnamon & mace
3/4 lb sugar
Rind and juice of lemon and orange
2 1/2 ozs brandy or rum.

...and those of transportation

Bus stop changes envisaged

Balmain and Rozelle residents can look to a few minor changes in the positioning of their bus stop as a result of the Public Transport Commission's elimination of what it claims to be "duplicated" stops.

A spokesman for the Public Transport Commission told 'The Link' that the Balmain-Rozelle district superintendent has recommended two bus stop relocations in Darling Street, two in Birchgrove, and another two in Mullens and Roberts Streets.

Stations

Suggestions have also been made about "slight alterations" in the Saturday services on the 445 route to Canterbury Station between 12.30 and 5.30 pm.

The spokesman said details would be given as soon as the recommendations had been finally decided.

Road study requested

A board of inquiry is necessary to decide the future of the contentious North Western Expressway, Mr Alan Sorensen, convener of the Anti-Urban Radial Expressway Committee, claimed this week.

"Current overseas experiences with urban expressways, the energy crisis, and the transport needs of the people of Sydney demand a full and far-reaching public inquiry in which the people are deeply involved," he said.

(The North Western Expressway will cut through the heart of Leichhardt if it is continued, and, if ancillary plans are also adopted, a secondary expressway may run through Balmain Peninsula to a bridge across Parramatta River).

Discussion

Mr Sorensen said public discussion in such a far reaching inquiry should not be either "legal" or "court" based, nor should it be anything like a Royal Commission.

He advocated a four-man board, with representatives from the Commonwealth and State Governments, inner-city residents, and a transportation engineer.

Biased

Mr Sorensen said the NSW Commissioner of Main Roads and his department should be recognised from the outset as being biased in favour of the proposed urban radial expressways.

This required that he and his staff give detailed public evidence to the inquiry on the history of planning carried out on proposed expressways.

Land for parks

Leichhardt Council may purchase two small vacant blocks of land in Rozelle for use as parkland.

The town planner, Mr Arthur Kenna, said this week he was investigating the possibilities of obtaining unused land at the corners of Mullens and Beattie Streets and that of Mullens and Mansfield Streets.

The motorist pays

The average motorist who buys a \$4,000 family sedan pays the Australian and N.S.W. Governments between \$900 and \$1,500 in direct motoring taxes and charges by the end of the car's first year, says the N.R.M.A.

And of that amount, only about \$105 is returned to be spent on roads and traffic facilities.

In a revealing analysis of motoring taxes, the N.R.M.A.'s official journal says that, in subsequent years, the motorist pays governments more than \$210 a year. But, again, only \$105 of that is returned for roads and facilities.

Widow

Mr McFadden leaves a widow, Nola, and two sons, Brad, 14, and Greg, 10.

He became the foundation president of the "Scorpions" when the club reverted from a local coaching class club into one with junior league status.

He was the only life member of the club.

Friends have told 'The Link' his work for the club was "enormous" and that he spent every Saturday and Sunday watching his own boys playing and also following the fortunes of the club's seven full teams.

Mr McFadden had only recently taken up a new position as sales manager after having worked for a long period as project sales manager to another firm. He was a highly popular

employee and sportsman.

His administrative knowledge is said to have stood him in good stead as a member of the management committee of the Schoolboys' Rugby League Association of Ryde as well as an earlier period as secretary of the Southern Division.

About 250 people attended John McFadden's funeral recently.

They included his fellow club members, the State Rugby League president, Mr Kevin Humphreys, who had known him personally, and 12 boys from the club's senior teams, who formed a guard of honour.

He will be succeeded as Scorpion president by, his life-time friend, Mr Geoff Large, another club committee member.

Warning on day robbers

If you should see any "suspicious characters" in the streets of Balmain or Rozelle during daylight hours, the area's divisional detectives would like you to telephone them on 82-0777.

Detective - Sergeant Bill Hamilton said a sudden upsurge of daylight robberies have occurred in the district during the present week or so.

Happy

"If anyone sees anyone they are not 'happy' about, we want them to ring us," he added. "It is better to be sure than

sorry, but it is not better to be too late than never."

Sergeant Hamilton said the robberies being reported followed the "clean up" of a series of daylight robberies earlier this year.

"If anyone sees a young man with a large bag, particularly if he is getting into a car and

driving off with it, they should give us a ring," he said.

Sergeant Hamilton warned that delay could mean the thieves may escape. Such a call could also possibly mean that the observer was not robbed himself later on.

"The problem is serious," he said. "You could be the next on the thief's list."

Plans relating to the water-side lands below high water mark adjoining the City of Parramatta and the Municipality of Auburn are well advanced and will be available later this year. The Board's water-side lands are categorised into five different zones:

Zone A, coloured green on zoning plans, applies to the Board's water-side lands which are in a natural state and where no development will be permitted.

Zone B, coloured yellow on zoning plans, applies to the Board's water-side lands which are partially developed and which should be returned to a natural state, the timing of such restoration to be determined for each particular area, having regard to existing leasing arrangements.

Zone C, coloured orange on zoning plans, applies to the Board's water-side lands which are partially developed and where existing improvements would be allowed to remain, but where no further development would be permitted, except under special circumstances where certain improvements would be considered to be beneficial.

Zone D, coloured red on zoning plans, applies to the Board's water-side lands which are developed and on which further development will be considered.

Zone Special Uses, coloured purple on zoning plans, applies to those areas of the Board's water-side lands which involve defence or other special activities and which require special considerations.

VIEWS AND COMMENTS

Views and comments from the general public on the zoning plans will be received direct by the Board. All such shall:

- (i) be in writing addressed to the Secretary of the Board,
- (ii) contain the name and address of the offerer of such views and comments, if an individual, or if a community organisation, its name, address, number of members, date of formation and a brief description of its aims and objectives;
- (iii) set out details of the views and comments; and
- (iv) reach the Board by the 13th January, 1975.

Councils also have been invited to furnish the Board with their comments and to receive the views and comments of members of the public within their Municipalities.

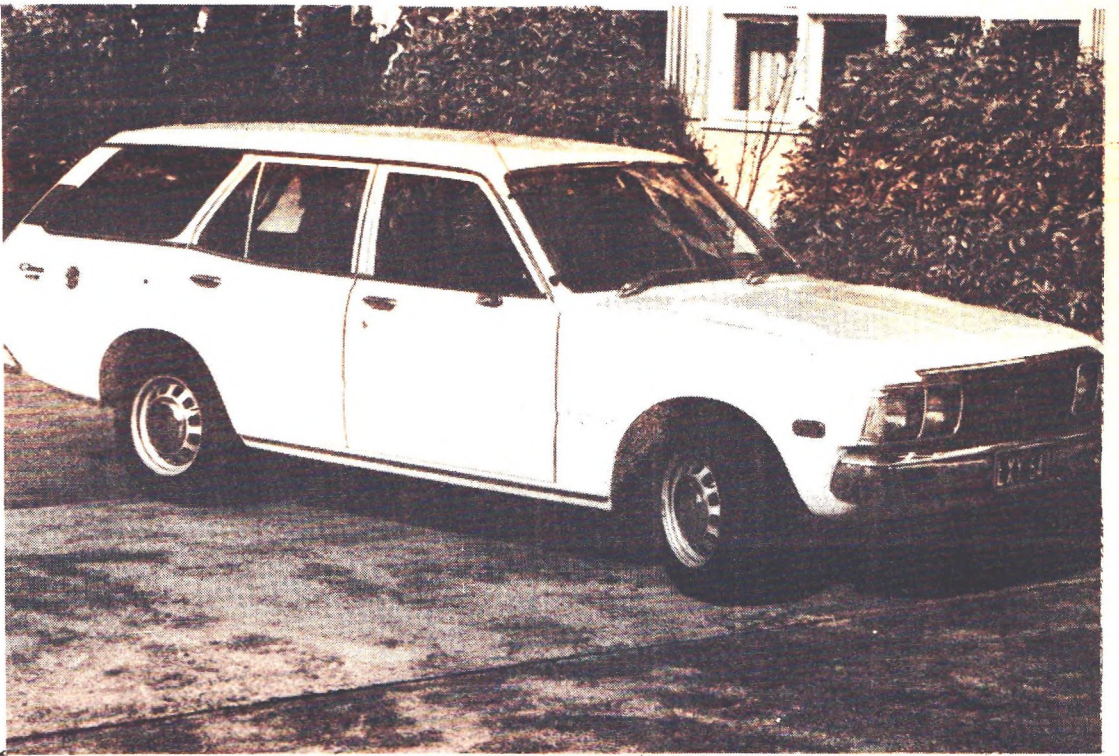
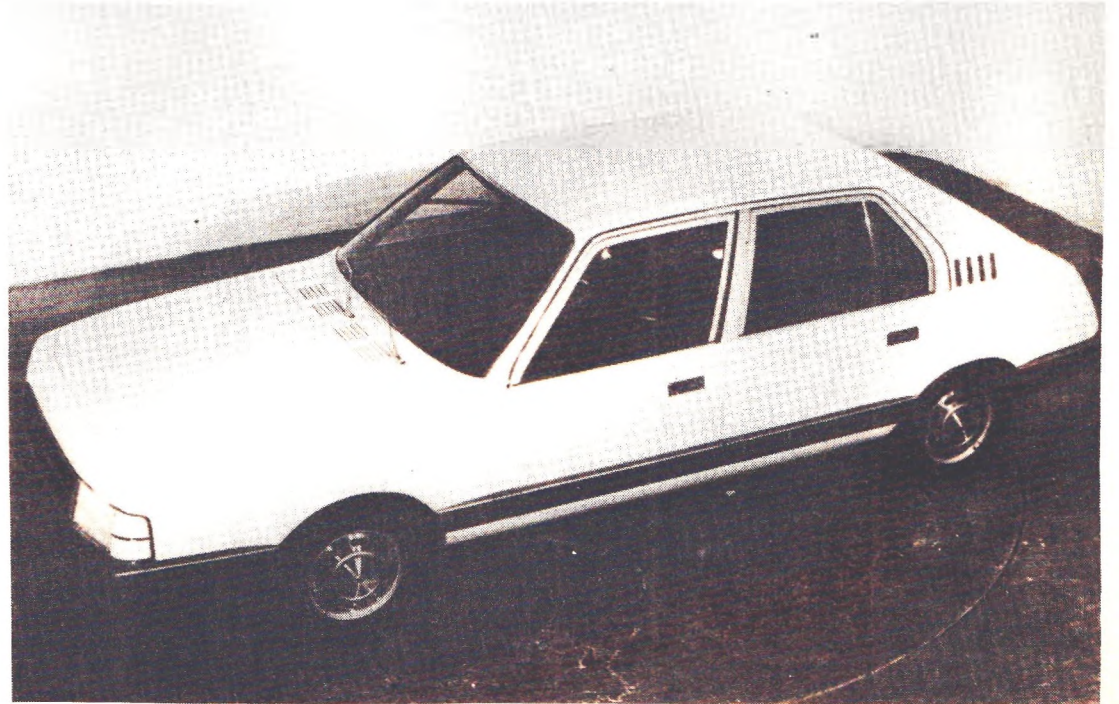
