COUNCILS NEW PLAN 'OLD HAT'

Leichhardt Council proposals to develop high rise flats in Balmain are 25 years behind the times, architect Mr David Chesterman told a public meeting on Monday night.

Large scale flat development will destroy the area as we know it," he said.

Mr Chesterman is a member of the resident group Leichhardt Planning Forum, which joined with the Balmain Association to discuss town planning and development in Balmain and Rozelle at the meeting.

More than 80 people at the Balmain Town Hall gave overwhelming support to the 1971-74 Outline Plan formulated under the previous council and stringly altered by the present

trigger off more dissent between council and those residents opposing present development ideas in the altered outline plan.

"If we are to have change in the area, it should not be too drastic or too fast," Mr Chesterman said.

"Balmain and Rozelle get their character from a harmonious scale, their many historic buildings, views and industrials, some of which are good neighbours, others which have undesirable side effects — but all of which provide employment for residents".

Threatened

Mr Chesterman said the things residents liked about Balmain were threatened by large scale flat development.

"At the same time this development will not bring the benefits that people sometimes believe they will," he

The population will not be increased unless Balmain becomes another Kirribilli or

Randwick.
"The Council's rate income will not go up, because a block of flats only pays the same rates as the house next door.

"And all ratepayers will be saddled with extra costs to pay for extra parks, road widening and

similar works."

Mr Chesterman said council seemed to be seeking more discretion to permit high rise development in many parts of the municipality and to be less demanding on developers in providing open space and setback

Out of date

"Its report to the Planning and Environment Commission on the Outline Plan also appears to relax industrial nuisance standards and to remove council's commitments to examine the areas' problems and to act to resolve them," he said.

The council, it seems. is still thinking along lines that are 25 years out of date - that redevelopment is a good thing and should be encour-

PM, bears beat Mort St gates

Balmain figured in a minor international incident last week which featured the Prime Minister Mr Gough Whitlam.

The crisis was over several bears brought from Asia for this week's Trade Fair in Melbourne.

But, after arriving at the Australian National Line terminal in Balmain early in the week, there they stayed.

An urgent appeal was made by Prime Minister Whitlam, to the Leichhardt Mayor, Alderman Les Rodwell, seeking special dispensation on the closing of the street gates surr-

ounding the terminal. The bears had been held on board ship for three days and had to be exercised each day.

But they could not be removed from the terminal because of numerous delays.

On Thursday, when it became apparent that unless the bears and other cargo were not moved from Mort Bay they would not get to Melbourne in time, Mr Whitlam made his move with his call to Alderman

Rodwell. It came through at 6.40pm — 40 minutes before the gates were to have been locked for the

Alderman Rodwell granted permission understanding they would be locked about an hour late. However, the last truck trundles along

Mort Street about 9.20pm.

The permission meant that the bears and the other cargo were in Melbourne on Friday, in time for Mr Whitlam's official opening on Saturday.

Any delay on Thurs-day would have kept them out of Melbourne until Sunday.

"I was on my way out to a regional meeting

when the message came," Alderman Rodwell said this week.

"It was put to me that the cargo had to get through that night or it would not arrive in time.

"I was told the gates would need only be kept open an extra hour, so I authorised this.'

Residents in Mort Street told The Link that trucks continued to roll along the street until 9.20pm — almost two hours after the official closing time.

Several rang the By-Laws Inspector, Mr A. R. Ward, about late trucks, when they were informed of the late decision because of the international flavour of the request and of Mr Whitlam's personal interest.

The State Government should establish a combined bus-ferry ticket system for a service feeding Elliott Street wharf Mr Roger Degen the member for Balmain said this week.

'Let's see some initiative," he said. "The State Government can re-introduce rail services. Why can't it restore ferry services.'

Mr Degen said the potential existed at Elliott Street worthy of a three month trial.

"All that is necessary is to extend the 440 bus down to the wharf," he said. "The bus terminates at Merton Street now.

"With a restored ferry service and a combined ticket system, the Government can find out public reaction instead of talking about it.

"There are many pensioners living in flats along Elliott Street near the wharf.

"There is also a hill problem, so most of them could not easily walk up and down to the wharf for

"But with a bus to take them down and back again on return, these pensioners could gain the advantage of a ferry service, patronise it, and escape some of the problems of road traffic."

Mr Degen said a combined ticket system would mean many other people could take advantage of the bus terminating at the wharf. 'By eliminating the need for the uphill climb,

the Government can get patronage for a ferry service," he said.
"We need government innovation. There are wharves around Balmain and Rozelle which are

retained for years now.' Mr Degen said it had never been necessary for the Government to wait until last December, when the road, rail and water transport systems were brought under one body, the Public Transport Commission, to consider zone fare schemes.

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Timber best in holiday homes

tunate that Australians, almost unanimously, can only think of a holiday house close to, preferably overlooking, water. If that water happens to be the sea. so much the better.

This unfortunate preference will mean that, in most cases, the site will have a considerable slope. This presents a problem with the footings if conventional timber framed methods coupled with brick footings are used.


There could be considerable work and expense involved with getting the bricks onto the site as well as the cost of laying.

As land values increase and availability decreases the holiday house will be on steeper, less accessible, sites.

All this points to the use of post and beam construction. The timber members are substantial enough to give a rustic look but still not so heavy as to require mechanical equipment for placement.

The open construction under the floor gives ample space for storage of all the recreation equipment such as surfboards, as well as garaging for cars and a boat.
